Board Ratifies Spring Co-ops and Realignment Fast Tracks at May Meeting

The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association Board of Control approved spring cooperative teams and eight conference realignment fast track recommendations at its meeting on May 17.

Three of the nonfootball conference realignment fast track requests ratified by the Board is for all sports. Osseo-Fairchild will move from the Cloverbelt Conference to Dairyland Conference beginning this fall, and Elk

Mound will exit the Dunn-St. Croix to enter the West Division of the Cloverbelt Conference starting in 2025-26. St. Augustine Preparatory Academy will leave the Lake City Conference to play an independent schedule in 2024-25.

Two of the fast tracks passed by the Board impacted conferences for girls golf only, beginning in 2024–25.

Board Approves Conference Realignment of Previously Remanded Plans

The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association Board of Control voted to approve Conference Realignment Task Force recommendations of the nonfootball plans remanded by the Board at its meeting in April.

After hearing appeals to the revisions the Conference Realignment Task Force made to the remanded proposals, the Board approved the recommended revised plans, which will be implemented beginning with the 2025-26 sports seasons.

The new construct of a seven-team North Shore Conference will include Cedarburg, Grafton, Hartford, Homestead, Nicolet, Slinger and Whitefish Bay. A new seven-team conference, yet to be named, was formed

Board Acts on Conference Plans; Advances Amendments; Approves Official & Worker Pay Increases

The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association Board of Control approved several of the Conference Realignment Task Force recommendations for conference realignment, advanced three Constitutional amendments to the Annual Meeting, and increased tournament officials' and State Tournament workers' pay at its March meeting on March 5.

After reviewing six appeals of the conference realignment plans recommended by the Conference Realignment Task Force, the Board approved 14 of the 20 plans and remanded seven back to the Task Force for further evaluation and consideration. All of the plans approved by the Board will be implemented in the Fall of 2025. Membership Approves Two Amendments; Proposed Name, Image, Likeness Voted Down

The membership passed two amendments, defeated a much-deliberated Name, Image, Likeness (NIL) proposal, and conducted other membership business at the 128th Annual Meeting at the Sentry Insurance Theater on April 24.

The membership voted 170-219 to reject the proposed NIL language that would have allowed student-athletes to engage in promotion and revenue opportunities and activities not associated or identified with their school team, school, conference or the WIAA, which included a number of prohibited NIL activities.

Executive Director Stephanie Hauser indicated the failed vote does not end the discussions on NIL. "We will continue this conversation with our membership in response to the trend across the nation with other high school associations allowing some

opportunities for Name, Image, Likeness," she said. "The Annual Meeting vote is evidence of the ownership the membership has in the democratic process.

"The WIAA staff provides information, rationale and possible unintended consequences," she added, "but it's ultimately up to each member school to determine how to cast its vote."

The two amendments that passed by the membership affect the membership's Bylaws. The first allows schools to use their resources and coaches to conduct developmental programming during the school year but outside the designated sport season for students in eighth grade or below, which remains prohibited for students in grades 9-12. The membership approved the amendment by a 381-9 vote.

The second Bylaw amendment permits member schools to submit one unedited video clip for review by the executive staff if a school believes the wrong player has been identified in an ejection and to assist in identifying the correct student-athlete to serve the ejection suspension. The amendment passed by a 387-1 vote.

In the Director's Report, Hauser expressed the focus of the membership will be moving education-based athletics forward and adapting to changes in the interscholastic athletics landscape. She said by working together on existing and future plans, continuous improvement is encouraged and expected.

She highlighted recent achievements to reinforce what has been accomplished by the mem-

The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association announced the resignation of Kate Peterson Abiad as assistant director on the executive staff today, effective May 24, 2024.

Peterson Abiad departs to pursue other career opportunities.

"Coming to the WIAA was a lifechanging experience, and I have truly enjoyed my time here and am grateful for the opportunities and experiences that I have gained during my

tenure." Peterson Abiad said. "Working alongside such a talented and supportive team has been an absolute pleasure, and I will always cherish the memories and friendships that I have made."

"We are supportive and excited for Kate as she transitions to this new endeavor," WIAA Executive Director Stephanie Hauser said. "We are so appreciative of the work she has done for the membership over the past six years, and our team will miss her."

Peterson Abiad began her position as assistant director on April 1, 2018. During her tenure on the executive staff, her responsibilities have included the administration and coordination of duties for the sports of basketball, cross country, soccer, tennis, track & field, volleyball, and boys and girls lacrosse. In addition, she oversees officials' services such as licensing, the Officials' Advisory Committee, and the recruiting and retention efforts of licensed officials. She also served as the executive staff contact for coaches' education and conduct.

Prior to joining the WIAA, Peterson Abiad acquired a wealth of basketball experience with 27 years as a collegiate coach. She served as the head women's basketball coach for 15 seasons from 2003-04 through 2017-18 at Cleveland State University. She also served six seasons as an assistant at the University of Wisconsin from 1997-2003.

A search to fill her position vacancy will begin immediately. A vacancy notice for the assistant director position is available on the WIAA website with anticipation to have the successful candidate begin duties in mid-July.

An increase in Tournament Series officials and State Tournament workers pay was approved by the Board. Beginning in the fall of 2024, officials' pay will be increased \$10 a game with a \$.10 per mile increase for regional, sectional and State travel expenses. An analysis of State Tournament workers compensation will result in an increase in pay to a level consistent across all sports. In addition, the executive staff has established a four-year cycle for a regular tournament pay review.

The Board also took action to approve the winter sports cooperative teams for 2024-25 and 2025-26.

Other topics of discussion included staff reports on the competitive balance process, ongoing efforts to recruit and retain licensed officials; plans for the 2024 NFHS Summer Meeting in June; and updates on the Student Athlete Leadership Team initiative.

The Board received liaison reports from Dan Rossmiller of the Wisconsin Association of School Boards, Paul Manriquez of the Department of Public Instruction, and Eric Plitzuweit of the Wisconsin Athletic Directors Association.

Non-school Participation (In-Season) Rules

What are the rules?

Individual student-athletes, with school approval, may participate in up to two non-school contests during the regular season in the same sport. The non-school opportunities will not count against the individual maximum in that sport.

The exceptional athlete provision recognizes only invitations to international competitions sanctioned by each sport's identified National Governing Body (NGB) and Olympic Development Programs (ODP) in representing the USA as eligible for an exceptional athlete waiver. This waiver allows non-school competition for a qualifying exceptional athlete during the regular season and during the WIAA Tournament Series.

Are the two mutually exclusive?

Yes. Any student with prior school approval may participate in up to two non-school competitions during the school sport regular season. If the student qualifies by National Governing Body and/or Olympic Development standards and meets WIAA exceptional athlete rules, the student may participate as an exceptional athlete representing their country in international competition with school approval.

Is a WIAA waiver necessary?

Yes, for the exceptional athlete waiver involving international competition representing the National Team or NGB. No, for the two regular season non-school competitions. School approval is required for both.

Two per year or two per sport season?

Per sport season during the regular season. A student may play in two non-school volleyball contests, two non-school basketball games, and two non-school softball games in one school year.

Does a skills contest count as a non-school competition?

No. A student can participate in two non-school competitions and a skills contest. le: two non-school basketball games and a free throw

What happens if an athlete participates in more than two non-school competitions or participates without school approval?

The athlete becomes ineligible in the sport for the remainder of the season.

How are the non-school competitions and tournaments that the student competes in counted?

The rule has been directed at students participating in non-school games, meets, or contests. Non-school competitions shall be counted the same manner as provided in the season regulations of a given sport. The sports of tennis, volleyball, and wrestling provide team tournaments. All other sports count contests, meets, or games on an individual basis.

Nonschool competitions do not count against a student's individual maximum allowed competitions as part of a school team.

Does participation in non-school competitions count against the individual maximums in either exceptions?

No, nonschool competitions do not count against a student's individual maximum allowed competitions as part of a school team.

What is the difference in the <u>middle school</u> rule change and the high school rule change?

There is one word different. But the difference does affect the method to count the non-school competitions. In the high school, the competition is counted the same as in the season regulations. The middle school rule, the change was:

It is the philosophy of this Association that a student owes loyalty and allegiance to the school and team of which he/she is a member during the season of a given sport. Athletes may compete in not more than two non-school events with school approval during each regular sport season. The event(s) will not count against the individual maximum for the athlete in that sport. A student becomes ineligible in a sport for the remainder of the season for competing in more than two non-school events non-school game, meet, or contest in the same sport during the season of practice and competition established by the school. The penalty may be reduced upon request of a school.

The word difference is competition in the high school rule and events in the middle school rule. Therefore, a middle school tournament will count as one event. A middle school non-school event may include more than one game, meet, or contest such as a softball tournament which may have 2, 3, or 4 games included in the event.

Can school funds be used for the non-school event?

No. If school resources are used, then it must be added to the school schedule.

Can the student go to the Nike National meet?

Yes, if it is open to any and all students (not an all-star contest) and all other rules followed.

Can a student compete in a Special Olympic competition during the regular season and WIAA tournament?

Yes. The event must be a Special Olympic sanctioned event. A waiver is required.

What amateur status rules apply?

All. The student may only be reimbursed for actual costs associated with transportation, food, lodging, and entry fees. No more than those costs.

From the Rules at a Glance:

- F. EXPENSES TRAINING AND COMPETING
 - Students must pay 100% of their own expenses, including transportation, to any non-school (out-of-season) camps, clinics, or specialized training. Schools may pay expenses and provide transportation to similar in-season activities in that sport and during unrestricted contact days in the summer.

As we complete the 2023–24 licensing season, the WIAA wants to genuinely thank the 10,182 officials who licensed over the course of this year. Without your licensing, training and willingness to work high school athletic competitions, we would not be able to provide opportunities to our high school student-athletes in Wisconsin. Your service is deeply appreciated.

This year's total number of WIAA licensed officials (10,182) is an increase of 345 officials over last year. Incredibly, this is the highest number of licensed officials in recorded history. While this is positive news, the WIAA is still hearing about difficulties that AD's, conference commissioners, and assignors are having in filling games.

Hartford's Turner Recipient of WIAA Spirit of Sport Award

Michael Turner of Hartford Union High School has been selected as the 2024 Wisconsin recipient of the Spirit of Sport Award presented by the WIAA, the Dairy Farmers of Wisconsin (DFW) and the National Federation of State High School Associations.

The Spirit of Sport Award program was created by the NFHS and adopted by the WIAA in 2018 in partnership with the Dairy Farmers of Wisconsin. The award recognizes individuals who exemplify the ideals of the spirit of sport that represent the core mission of education-based athletics.

During a WIAA Level 2 football playoff game versus Homestead on Oct. 28, 2022, Turner's life story was redirected in traumatic fashion. After the junior cornerback made a tackle on a play, the Orioles' coaching staff observed something abnormal with Turner during a subsequent timeout and removed him from the game.

As the team doctor and athletic trainer were examining him, Turner collapsed and experienced a seizure that required life-saving procedures by the emergency medical technicians on the sidelines and as he was transported and treated at the local hospital. Hours later, he was moved to Childrens' Hospital, where he underwent emergency surgery two days later to have the right side of his skull removed to relieve pressure on the brain.

Turner was diagnosed with Secondary Impact Syndrome and was placed in an induced coma for 10 days. To further complicate his recovery, he developed blood clots in his lungs. The medical team was able to resolve the blood clot issue, and Turner spent 15 days in the intensive care unit. He spent seven weeks recovering at the hospital. Turner was able to return home after a month of

intense rehabilitation therapy, but recovery remained challenging.

Experiencing life without the right side of his skull required 24-hour home care for the two months prior to surgery to have that portion of his skull reattached.

Following his surgery, Turner struggled with his short-term memory. He made tremendous progress and was able to return to school and assist with the football program, cheering on his teammates during practice and games, as well as providing pre-game pep talks and encouragement.

Turner continues to work hard in recovery, and he still experiences memory loss. He is prohibited from participation in sports that would pose a threat of another concussion. He has handled his road to recovery with appreciation for life and a fun sense of humor.

As the Wisconsin recipient of the Spirit of Sport Award, Turner will receive an award sponsored by the Dairy Farmers of Wisconsin. He will be presented with the award and recognized at the 2024 WIAA Annual Meeting on April 24.

In addition to Turner, finalists for Wisconsin's nomination for the Spirit of Sport Award include Adam Backus of Mishicot High School, Zoe Coder of West Salem High School and Dodge Shore of Hillsboro High School.

bership working toward a common goal, including tripling girls wrestling participation in three years, the first-ever WIAA lacrosse championships this spring, the launching of the WIAA Student Leadership Team, the establishment of a number of ad hoc committees, as well as the reinstatement of the Media Advisory Committee. Hauser also identified a number of membership challenges that will be reviewed and addressed, including season lengths, game maximums and coaching contact; the retention of WIAA-licensed officials; and the continued exploration of establishing a WIAA Foundation.

The executive staff responded to 12 presubmitted requests addressing seven open forum topics, including inquiries about 8-player football; basketball divisional placements; competitive balance performance factor; NIL; impact of code violations on tournament eligibility; and the current study of season lengths, season game maximums, and coaching contact.

Michael Turner of Hartford Union High School was recognized as the Wisconsin Spirit of Sport Award recipient, sponsored by the Dairy Farmers of Wisconsin. Also recognized were the representatives of the 30 schools that received the WIAA Award of Excellence in 2022-23.

In the 2024-25 Board of Control elections. Nathan Lehman, the district administrator at Stratford was elected for a three-year term on the Board as the District 2 representative. Kurt Cohen, the superintendent at Potosi, was elected to serve a three-year term representing District 5. Jill Stobber, the athletic and activities administrator at Waterford, was re-elected to a three-year term as the gender minority at-large representative. Brian Nadeau, the principal and superintendent at Plum City High School, was voted onto the Board with a special election, which was conducted to fill the District 3 vacancy. He serves the remaining two-years the position following the resignation of Greg Doverspike, the former superintendent at Durand-Arkansaw.

In the 2024-25 Advisory Council elections, James Darin, the principal at Mukwonago, was re-elected to a three-year term as a large school representative. Jon Vollendorf, the principal at Stevens Point Area Senior High, was also elected to a three-year term representing large schools. Michael Foley, the principal at Platteville, was elected to serve a three-year term as a medium school representative. The two small school representatives that will begin three-terms are Turtle Lake Superintendent Kent Kindschy, who was re-elected for a second term, and Brian Zacho, the superintendent at Randolph. Peggy Larson, the superintendent at Winneconne, was re-elected to serve as the gender at-large representative on the Advisory Council, and Michael Lambrecht, the principal at Columbus Catholic, will serve a three-year term as the nonpublic school at-large representative on the Advisory Council.

Approximately 453 representatives from 393 schools attended the meeting. ●

WIAA Salutes 32 State Scholar-Athlete Award Recipients

The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association has selected the 16 senior boys and 16 senior girls to receive the prestigious statewide 2024 Scholar-Athlete Award, presented by the We Energies Foundation and the Wisconsin Public Service Foundation.

To determine the top 32 award recipients, four boys and four girls were selected based on both athletic and academic achievement from each of the four WIAA divisions. This year, 836 seniors were nominated for the award by 422 high schools throughout the state.

"Each of these remarkable student-athletes has excelled in academics and athletics," WIAA Assistant Director Tom Shafranski said. "Seventeen of this year's 32 WIAA Scholar-Athlete finalists have a grade-point average of 4.0 to date.

"When you combine all 32 scholar-athlete GPAs; the average is 3.9," he added. "This year's honorees have already earned a total of 323 varsity letters during their first 3 1/2 years of high school. That's an average of 10 letters per athlete, and we have not yet completed our spring sports season."

The award recipients will be recognized at the 2024 WIAA Scholar-Athlete Ceremony Sunday, May 5 at SentryWorld in Stevens Point. Joe Delagrave, a two-time Paralypmic medalist and current head coach of the U.S. Wheelchair Rugby Team, will be the keynote speaker. A live stream of the awards program will be available on the websites of the State Television Network stations, including WKOW, WAOW, WXOW, WQOW, WVTV and WCWF at 1 p.m. A delayed telecast of the ceremony was aired on Sunday, May 12.

Fall Sports – Academic Ineligibility

A reminder: When the earliest allowed WIAA game/meet takes place before the first day of classes at a member school, "the maximum ineligibility period shall be the lesser of: a) 21 consecutive calendar days <u>beginning with the date of the earliest allowed competition</u> in a sport; or b) one third of the maximum number of games/meets allowed in a sport (rounded up if one-third results in a fraction)."

In those instances where a member school has begun fall classes on or before the date of the earliest allowed WIAA game/meet in a sport, ineligible students in these situations are subject to the standard rule applied when school is in session (15 scheduled school days and nights). In this situation, eligibility is regained

on the school day following the period of ineligibility (16th school day). Note 1: An interschool scrimmage does NOT count as a game or meet for purposes of this rule. Note 2: If a multi-school meet is counted on your schedule as one meet, it also counts as one meet as it applies to the number of meets an ineligible student must sit out. Note 3: Games/meets at different levels of competition (varsity, JV, freshmen) may NOT be combined to reach the number of meets an athlete must sit out.

When your school year begins <u>after</u> the earliest allowed game/meet you may use this chart to determine the period of ineligibility:

WIAA Eligibility – Summer Reminders

Now is a good time to download updated versions of all eligibility forms from the WIAA website.

There are a few the things that athletic directors might want to review relative to WIAA rules, as students participate in their summer activities.

- Remind those that might need to know, the rules affecting transfer students. Download and distribute the Transfer Rules and Waivers Quick Facts (available on the WIAA website) to the appropriate people including your guidance and admissions staff.
- 2) Review with coaches as necessary, the out of season coaching contact rules for their sport. Provide coaches with the summer contact form so they can provide you with a schedule of their planned contact days in advance. Remember that volunteer coaches are the same as paid coaches for purpose of this rule and that the second time someone shows up at practice to help coach they are considered a school coach.
 - a) All WIAA sport coaches are allowed up to 5 days of sanctioned school coaching contact in the summer, between the end of school and July 31. (11-player Football coaching contact ends July 27 in 2024.)
 - b) A reminder that any high school coach can have coaching contact with 8th grade students on down up until the point of those 8th graders actually starting their 9th grade year.
- 3) Remember that schools cannot be involved in out of season sports activities for students in grades 10-12. The only exception is during the summertime within the sanctioned school coaching contact period. School facilities are sometimes used by nonschool groups for out of season camps and clinics. If this is to be done Board of Education policy for nonschool use of the facility must be followed. This may involve rent, and it is advisable that those conducting the activity have insurance protection.
 - a) If conducted, a nonschool camp should be available to students from surrounding areas and not just returning athletes at your school. An acceptable non-school program may not be restricted based on school and/or team status.
 - b) Out of season coaching rules apply.
- 4) Schools cannot conduct summer school classes in sports fundamentals, etc. in excess of the sanctioned school contact days and community education is a school program with the same restrictions and exceptions.
- 5) Schools may issue uniforms and/or protective apparel for nonschool activity, only with formal approval of their school board or governing body.
- 6) Students must pay their own way to any camp, clinic, or specialized training. Nonschool groups can pay expenses related to actual competition, such as entry fees into summer leagues, e.g. The school cannot have any involvement with out of season camps, clinics or competition unless the activity is part of the sanctioned school contact opportunity, is school sponsored and available to all interested students on a voluntary basis.
- 7) Open gyms can be conducted in the summer but open gym rules apply including restricting students from other schools from attending.
- 8) Remind students of amateur status and all star rules. You may wish to ask students to contact you prior to participating in all summer sport activities so you can assess the activity and help protect their eligibility.

- 9) Remind students they must limit their nonschool activity when the school season in that sport starts. Rules allow a student to compete in not more than two nonschool competitions with prior school approval during each regular sport season. Another exception is that during the season, athletes may participate in a skills contest with approval of the school. Specific skill contests (punt, pass, and kick, shooting contests e.g., free throws, 3 point, drive, chip and putt) isolate separate skills outside of the traditional competition setting. The skill contest may not include physical contact or extreme fatigue as the actual sport competition. Fun runs are not considered skills contests. There can be no school coach involvement. All other eligibility rules including amateur status apply.
- 10) It is important to remind students and coaches that out of season and summertime activities must be voluntary. Taking or requiring attendance, providing incentives or connecting playing time and/or lettering requirements to out of season programs is prohibited.
- 11) A reminder that the academic eligibility requirements apply to spring tournaments and an athlete can become academically ineligible and miss the opportunity to play in a state tournament. Also, the period of ineligibility for the fall is 15 scheduled school days or 21 calendar days, depending on when school starts. The WIAA publishes a chart each spring to help you determine when eligibility is regained.

These rules apply to high schools. Some may also apply to middle level but the rules at the middle level are significantly different. These are not all-inclusive but hopefully will serve as a reminder in a number of important areas. Working to prevent the loss of athletic eligibility is always worth the effort.

Transfer Rule Summary

Keep in mind, the transfer rule applies to transfers that are not made necessary by a total and complete change in residence by the parent(s) that the student lived with when establishing eligibility.

The Essentials of The Transfer Rule*

A transfer made necessary by a total and complete change of residence of the parent(s) – unrestricted.

Transfers with no change of residence of the parent(s) at the beginning of:

9th grade - unrestricted

10th grade - unrestricted

11th grade – nonvarsity for calendar year

12th grade – nonvarsity for calendar year

Transfers with no change of residence of the parent(s) during the school year:

9th grade – nonvarsity for remainder of year

10th grade - nonvarsity for calendar year

11th grade - nonvarsity for calendar year

12th grade - nonvarsity for calendar year

*Provided the student meets residency requirements

NFHS Volleyball Rules Changes – 2024-25

4-2-3a, 7-1-1 NOTE: Allows a player to change uniform numbers without penalty when a uniform is damaged in addition to when a unform has blood on it.

Rationale: Adds language to Rule 4: Uniforms regarding the proper procedure for a legal uniform number change and expands to include a damaged unform as a legal reason for changing a uniform number. Aligns language in Rules 4 and 7.

5-4-3c(1): Allows all players on the roster, not just starting players, to stand on their respective end lines prior to the first set.

Rationale: Encourages the inclusion of all players in the prematch announcements.

5-9-2b NOTE (NEW), State Association Adoption Chart: Requires line judges to switch sides of the court between sets when, by state association adoption, teams remain on the same benches throughout the match.

Rationale: Aligns with the original intent of the rule allowing line judges to alternate between each set to promote fair officiating.

11-4-1b: Allows teams to substitute during an injury time-out for the libero replacement if the libero is injured or ill.

Rationale: Allows for the immediate substitution of the libero replacement who may be playing out of position due to the injury to the libero. ●

Split-Season Sports (Golf, Soccer, Swimming, Tennis)

WIAA rules prevent coaches from having coaching contact with their athletes outside the season, during the school year, in any sport. The rules further prevent schools from offering a sport season, except as outlined in the WIAA Season Regulations. An athlete working as a clinician, under the direction of his/her coach, is considered to be coaching contact.

This means, for example, that boys' tennis players cannot serve as assistant coaches, clinicians, instructors, etc., during the girls' tennis season, in the school program. Obviously, girls' tennis players are similarly restricted during the boys' tennis season. Boys' tennis players cannot practice with the girls' tennis team because the boys' tennis season is defined in Season Regulations and the school cannot make opportunities available outside the season. Again, girls' tennis players are similarly restricted. Swimming, soccer, and golf are other sports with split seasons where these rules apply.

WIAA Winter Team Tournament Sportsmanship Awards Chosen

The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association, in cooperation with Rural Mutual Insurance, has chosen the recipients of the team Sportsmanship Awards for the 2024 winter State Tournaments.

The winners of the prestigious sportsmanship recognition are Lakeside Lutheran in boys basketball, Cuba City in girls basketball, Cumberland in team wrestling, West Bend West in gymnastics, the Sun Prairie West Co-op in girls hockey and Tomahawk in boys hockey.

Lakeside Lutheran returned to the tournament field in boys basketball for the second straight season, and the sportsmanship demonstrated by the players, coaches and school community earned the Warriors the Sportsmanship Award. As the #2 seed in the Division 3 bracket, they finished runner-up after falling 65-54 to top-seeded St. Thomas More in the championship game. They defeated previously undefeated Kiel 57-55 to advance to the final. It's the first time Lakeside Lutheran has been selected as recipient of the award in boys basketball and its second overall. The Warriors also received the award in girls volleyball in 2021. The schools receiving honorable mention are Aquinas, Kiel, Neenah and West Salem

The award winner in girls basketball is Cuba City following the Cubans' runner-up finish in the State Tournament. As the #3 seed, they defeated second-seeded McDonell Catholic 48-45 in the Division 4 semifinals to advance to the championship game. The Cubans lost to top-seeded and defending-champion Laconia 47-43 in the final. The team and community was determined to have exhibited the best sportsmanship throughout the tournament. It's the eighth time Cuba City has received the sportsmanship award and the first time in girls basketball. The previous recognitions were awarded in gymnastics as a co-op in 2003, 2004, 2006 and 2009, and in girls volleyball in 2003, 2007 and 2009. The schools receiving honorable mention are Clear Lake, Franklin, West Salem and Xavier.

Cumberland was named as the recipient of the award following its appearance in the State Team Wrestling Tournament. The Beavers' enthusiastic fan support and sportsmanship efforts by coaches and participants were on display in their 50-21 Division 3 semifinal loss to Fennimore, which advanced and won its third straight title. It's the first time Cumberland has won the award overall. Honorable mention for the award was extended to Arrowhead, Menomonie, Prairie du Chien and St. Croix Falls.

The sportsmanship evaluations and staff observations at the State Gymnastics Championships led to the selection of West Bend West as the Sportsmanship Award winner for 2024. It's the first time the Spartans have been bestowed the honor in any sport. West Bend West displayed positive enthusiasm and finished eighth in Division 1 at the team championships. Also receiving consideration for the award were Ashland/Drummond/Mellen, Hartford and Chippewa Falls/McDonell Catholic.

The Sun Prairie West Co-op, consisting of six schools, including Sun Prairie West, Sun Prairie East, DeForest, Madison East, Madison La Follette and Waunakee, won the award in girls hockey. The Cap City Cougars, the #4 seed in the State Tournament, fell to top-seeded and eventual-champion D.C. Everest Co-op 4-1 in the semifinals. The Co-op claims its first sportsmanship award recognition. The River Falls Co-op received honorable mention.

It's the first time the Sportsmanship Award has been presented in boys hockey since 2021, and it's the first time Tomahawk has earned the recognition in any sport. As the fourth seed, the Hatchets' modeled sportsmanship both on and off the ice at the State Tournament before, during and following their 8-4 loss to top-seeded New Richmond in the Division 2 semifinals. The River Falls Co-op received honorable mention.

The WIAA/Rural Mutual Insurance Sportsmanship Award is presented to one school and community in each of the State team tournaments that exhibits exemplary sportsmanship. The award recipients are determined by the sportsmanship displayed by athletes, coaches, cheer and support groups, mascots, bands and spectators. Additional consideration is given for the effort of school administrators and chaperones to ensure support for their teams are positive and that the highest ideals of sportsmanship are showcased. Award winners receive a trophy and banner in recognition of the honor. Schools receiving honorable mention are acknowledged with a certificate of recognition.

The selection process includes contributions and evaluations from contest officials, tournament management, police and security personnel, crowd control and ushers, WIAA staff members, area hotels and restaurants. Rural Mutual Insurance has been a sponsor of this award since 1965, and their partnership contributes to the promotion of sportsmanship in education-based athletics as a valued corporate partner of the WIAA. •

Coaches Participating Against Athletes in The Off-Season

Except during Board of Control approved coaching contact days, WIAA rules indicate that coaches may not provide sport instruction to, or have coaching contact with student-athletes during the off-season. The present interpretation allows coaches to participate against their athletes in league competition, organized by a non-school entity, during the off-season. This means a volleyball coach, for example, could be participating in a volleyball league which included his/her volleyball players as members of other teams.

It continues to be a violation of WIAA rules for coaches to participate on the <u>same team</u> as their athletes, in out-of-season play, and to be involved in playing pickup activity with their athletes during the off-season except in school sponsored Open Gyms. The other obvious exception to this is in the non-school unlimited contact window in all sports except football, during the summertime, when school is not in normal session.

Please take this opportunity to acknowledge, celebrate and promote the qualities of administrative excellence that the award represents.

Please submit the application between the completion of your spring sports season and the deadline of Sunday, June 30, 2024. The application for the Award of Excellence is available on the WIAA website at: www.wiaawi.org. The application form, once completed, requires the signatures of the school's athletic director, principal, superintendent and the school board president to verify their school has achieved the required criteria.

In addition, note that a number of criteria were added last year, including submission of the online season Schedule/Results Verification Form by the established deadlines for basketball and football; completion and submission of the accurate enrollment count on the Enrollment Form by the established deadline; completion and submission of accurate data on the online Sports Participation Form by June 30; and submission and completion of the online Fan Ejection Form within three days following the event for each fan ejection that occured.

Recipients will be presented with the Award of Excellence or at the next fall's Area Meetings and will be recognized for the achievement on the WIAA website, Bulletin and at the Annual Meeting.

The criteria applied toward the 2023-24 Award of Excellence include:

- Athletic Director maintains and updates all information in the WIAA School Directory appually
- Athletic Director does due diligence in striving to achieve staff compliance with all WIAA coaching requirements (i.e. rules video, exam, officials' rankings)*
- Athletic director conducted regular occurring meetings with a Captain's Club/Team Leadership Council/Etc.— sportsmanship, ethics and/or integrity is on the agenda and is discussed
- Athletic director conducted regular occurring meetings with coaches - sportsmanship, ethics and/or integrity is a topic that is on the agenda and is discussed
- Athletic director conducted at least one infor-

- mational meeting with student-athletes and their parents - sportsmanship, ethics and/or integrity is a topic that is on the agenda and is discussed
- Athletic director attended conference meetings sportsmanship, ethics and/or integrity is a topic that is on the agenda and is discussed
- Coaches and student-athletes attended a sportsmanship summit/leadership conference/etc.
- There was school representation at one of the seven WIAA Fall Area Meetings
- There was school representation at WIAA Annual Meeting in April
- Athletic Director made the student body aware of sportsmanship initiatives through school assemblies, announcements, posters, etc.
- Three or more athletic teams gave back to their school or community through volunteerism
- Athletic director has taken the Free NFHS Sportsmanship course

NFHS Soccer Rules Changes - 2024-25

4-1-4d: Clarifies there is not a limitation on the color of tape or sock worn at or below the ankle.

Rationale: Athletes have the flexibility to modify socks within the existing regulations. Frequently, they remove the foot of one sock to layer another underneath, enhancing comfort or grip inside their shoes and fastening the top sock around the ankle. Any tape or similar material used above the ankle must match the sock's color, while at or below the ankle, any color is allowed. Referees are no longer required to oversee socks below the ankle.

Rule 12: Reorganized the rule for clarity and consistency.

Rationale: The Fouls and Misconduct rule has been revised to eliminate duplicate language and improve usability. The main changes involve reorganizing the existing rule for clarity. Sections have been rearranged to enhance ease of reference, and a new section addressing Stopping a Promising Attack (SPA) has been included. Certain general language in the rule has been modified to align with other rules codes. Section 6, Ejections, provides an ordered list of offenses by severity to allow associations more flexibility for determining post-game sanctions for misconduct. Additionally, an article has been added to clarify that all necessary conditions must be met for DOGSO (Denial of an Obvious Goal-Scoring Opportunity) to be applicable.

Recruiting Restrictions

WIAA rules prevent the recruitment of students for athletic reasons. The specific rule in question states: "No eligibility will be granted for a student whose residence within a school's attendance boundaries, with or without parents, or whose attendance at a school has been the result of undue influence (special consideration due to athletic ability or potential) on the part of any person, whether or not connected with the school."

It's important to note that persons not connected with the school can violate this rule, resulting in a loss of eligibility. Schools are ultimately responsible for the eligibility of all of their students and the school needs to communicate rules and pay close attention to the circumstances that bring students to the school.

Obviously, public schools and private schools encourage students to enroll and this certainly can be done without violating the undue influence rule. The following gives some examples of acceptable and unacceptable practices. This list cannot be considered all-inclusive, but should be helpful as an example.

Acceptable

- High school personnel visiting a middle school/elementary school to explain programs and encourage all interested students to attend.
- Inviting all interested students from a middle school/elementary school to visit.
- Providing game tickets to all interested students and/or team members from a middle school/elementary school or area youth teams.
- Providing informational pamphlets which describe the high school to all interested students at a middle level/elementary school.
- Providing tuition reduction to prospective students, based on need and/or scholastic achievement.

Unacceptable

- High school personnel visiting a middle school/elementary school sport team to encourage players to attend.
- Inviting selected students, because of athletic potential or ability, to visit.

- Providing game tickets to selected students, based on athletic potential or ability.
- Providing promotional pamphlets to selected students, based on athletic potential or ability.
- Providing tuition reduction to selected students, based wholly or in part on athletic potential or ability.
- Community or booster club member(s) contacting a potential student, because of athletic ability or potential, and encouraging attendance.
- Providing items of apparel and/or other incentives to students.

Additional Examples

- Interpretation of this provision now allows youth athletic teams to receive invitation/complimentary admission to high school sporting events and to be acknowledged or introduced at those events.
- Teams may also perform and/or scrimmage in connection with a high school event
- Under no circumstances may a youth team be introduced, etc., at more than one contest per season.
- This interpretation provides for admission, acknowledgment and performance and/or scrimmage opportunity.
- These events may not extend or prolong the contest or periods beyond the limits provided by rule.
- Participating in the high school team's game preparations is not permitted (e.g. pregame, halftime, sidelines, locker room).
- Under no circumstances will it be considered acceptable to single out any individual youth/middle level student athlete separate from or disproportionate to the remainder of the team.

It is the responsibility of schools to contact other schools and report any possible violations of WIAA rules. The WIAA is always willing to provide rules clarifications and, where necessary, will impose sanctions on schools and programs. It is far better for schools to provide leadership and control to prevent problems than to have to deal with these issues after the fact.

Open Gyms

Coaches and schools cannot be involved in out-of-season practice for athletes. However, open gyms do not violate WIAA rules if they are conducted according to the following guidelines:

- The open gym is made known and available to all students in the designated population of that school that is interested in attending. Open gyms may be gender specific. It is also acceptable to include adults from the community. Schools may conduct "open gyms" in any activity. It is not acceptable to include athletes from another school, public or nonpublic.
- 2. There is **no instruction** during the open gym **by a coach or anyone else**.
- Coaches may supervise open gyms, but they may not instruct, organize drills, etc. Coaches can also recreate with students in school sponsored, open gym settings that are purely recreational in nature, i.e., there is no instruction by the coach or anyone, sport skill demonstration, organized

Summer Contact

All sport coaches have five days of **sanctioned school coaching contact** opportunity during the summer, between the end of school and July 31; the days do not need to be consecutive. Sanctioned school opportunities allow you to use school support and facilities as you would during the season. Sanctioned school coaching contact means teams can assemble with coaches, school monies and resources can be applied, and schools can sponsor the events/activities. The 5 contact days must be the same for all levels within a sport program. Sanctioned school contact days are open to any and all interested students in your school from the last day of school to July 31. They are not allowed during the school year.

NOTE: In 2024,11-player football practice and equipment/fitness testing may be done on August 6. Sanctioned school football coaching contact must end on July 27 in order to meet the dead week rule. 8-Player football coaching contact must conclude by July 31. Football must follow the acclimatization plan if school resources are used.

For coaches in all sports except football, **non-school program contact** may be used by coaches during the summertime provided, such non-school programs are not limited to students on the basis of school or team affiliation. The **summertime** being defined as when school is not in normal session (the last day of school to the first day of school).

An 'acceptable non-school program' is a program which is not limited based on school and/or team status and no school monies or resources can be applied. Schools cannot sponsor these non-school events/activities. Use of school support and facilities must be done in the same manner as any other non-school group such as 4-H, boy scouts, or local rotary.

Nonschool programming must be **open to any** and all interested students in your community and other communities along with being **voluntary**. Nonschool programming is not an opportunity for a high school program in disguise. An outside organization coordinates and secures facilities, staff, rosters, schedules, etc. and is not representation of the school.

During the summer and school year out of season, athletes may assemble in any manner they wish without school or coach involvement (other than the five contact days). The booster club is considered non-school.

Sanctioned SCHOOL Coaching Contact

• Sports: All sports

- Time period: Last day of school to July 31 (except 11-player Football: July 27, 2024) in summertime
- Duration: Five days (does not have to be consecutive)
- School Equipment: May be used
- Funding: School funds may be used (Fund 10, 60, 80 and activity accounts)
- School Transportation: May be used
- School Facilities: May be used (as can nonschool facilities)
- Participation: Open to any and all interested. May not be mandated.

NONSCHOOL PROGRAMMING Contact

An acceptable nonschool program or activity is one which is not limited to students on the basis of a school affiliation, athletic experience, team status, etc. and no school monies or resources can be applied.

- Sports: All sports except football.
- Time period: Last day of school to First day of school in summertime
- Duration: Unlimited during the time period.
- Equipment: with Board of Education permission and following school policy.
- Funding: School funds may NOT be used (Fund 10, 60 and activity funds).
 - ° Community Ed and School District Recreation funds may be used (Fund 80).
- School transportation: May NOT be used, but may be rented.
- School Facilities: May be rented by nonschool organization following school policy (as can nonschool facilities).
- Participation: Open to any and all interested. May not be mandated.

Examples of Nonschool organizations:

- Booster clubs (monies not in school funds)
- Lion's Club
- Rotary
- American Legion
- AAU basketball
- Youth athletic clubs
- Hockey associations
- School district recreation (fund 80)
- Joe's Pizza
- USAV (club volleyball)

Notes

 NONSCHOOL team is not a code word for SCHOOL team. Amateur Status rules apply. Athletes may retain items of wearing apparel which are worn for nonschool athletic competition as a part of a team uniform provided for and worn by the student during competition.

Using Athletes As Clinicians

During the school year, you may only use your athletes as clinicians during the sport season. In the summertime, a school may conduct a clinic for students in grade 8 and below, where high school varsity and junior varsity coaches may use some or all of their athletes as clinicians. Individual students may be used as clinicians a maximum of 6 days during the summer (when school is not in session). Using students as clinicians in such a manner must conclude no later than July 31.

drills or resemblance of a practice being conducted.

- There is no organized competition, such as established teams participating in roundrobin competition, etc.
- 5. A member school is permitted to supervise conditioning programs under the open gym provisions, which may include weight lifting, speed, agility, and/or fitness. The program must be limited to non-sport and non-sportskill-specific instruction. Basic 'instruction' e.g., safe lifting, safe spotting, training regimen and rationale, are permitted. No sport implements and/or sport specific movement/drills should be part of the open gym or weight room. These conditioning programs must be made known and accessible to all interested students and must be voluntary.

Schools and coaches must clearly understand that the philosophy of the open gym is that youngsters from that school may attend, for wholesome **recreation**, or for purposes of improving their skills if they choose, but it's something they do on their own. It would be a violation of WIAA rules to mandate attendance at open gyms, or to provide incentives for athletes to attend open gyms, or to limit participation based on athletic status, or to allow athletes from other schools to come and work out or compete against your school's athletes. (BL – Art. II and RE – Art. VI, Sect. 2)

with Kettle Moraine Lutheran, Kewaskum, Plymouth, Port Washington, Sheboygan South, West Bend East and West Bend West.

Waukesha North and Waukesha South will move from the Classic 8 into the Woodland Conference, joining Brown Deer, Cudahy, Greendale, Greenfield, Milwaukee Lutheran, New Berlin Eisenhower, New Berlin West, Pewaukee, Pius XI Catholic, Shorewood, South Milwaukee, West Allis Central, Whitnall and Wisconsin Lutheran to form a 16-team league with two divisions. The schools that will be assigned to each of the divisions will

be determined by the conference's 16 member schools.

In the modified seven-team version proposed for the Southeast Conference, Oak Creek moves from the Southeast Conference into the eight-team Classic 8 Conference with Arrowhead, Catholic Memorial, Kettle Moraine, Mukwonago, Muskego, Oconomowoc and Waukesha West. The remaining seven teams in the Southeast Conference are Franklin, Kenosha Bradford, Kenosha Indian Trail, Kenosha Tremper, Racine Case, Racine Horlick and Racine Park.

WIAA Winter Performance Factor Results in Divisional Movement

The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association performance factor initiative has advanced through the process for the second time with a review of the winter sports for implementation in 2024-25.

An ad hoc committee consisting of 11 superintendents/district administrators, six athletic directors, one principal and one principal/athletic director proposed the performance factor process, which was approved by a 265-115 membership vote at the 2023 Annual Meeting for implementation in 2024-25. The initiative promotes school programs that reach a threshold of tournament success based on a performance point system allocated over a three-year period.

School programs reaching the sixpoint performance factor threshold during the past three seasons are placed in the division containing the next largest set of enrollments from where the schools' enrollments would place them for each respective sport other than track & field and swimming & diving—which do not have a team component to advancement in the Tournament Series—and sports with only one division. Schools are restricted to moving up a maximum of one division from the previous year's placement

This new initiative affords schools the opportunity to request to move down a division with lower enrollments. The Classification Committee reviewed 15 such requests for winter sports, including eight for girls basketball, six for boys basketball and two for boys hockey. The committee approved three requests in girls basketball, two in boys basketball and two in boys hockey. Additionally, five schools requested—and were approved—to move to a division of higher enrollments, including three in boys hockey, one in boys basketball and one in girls basketball.

The school sports programs that have accumulated at least six points to engage a promotion to a division with higher enrollments—if their 2024-25 tournament placement enrollment doesn't initially move them up a division—are listed below.

Please note that programs reaching the performance points threshold to be promoted and are initially assigned to a lower enrollment division—based on their 2024-25 tournament assignment enrollments—will be promoted back into the division they competed in during the most recent season's Tournament Series.

The performance factor process affords schools the opportunity to appeal their promotion to the division with the next largest enrollments based on performance points. Of the 37 programs listed above that compiled the threshold of points to engage in a promotion, 12 appeals were submitted. The Classification Committee reviewed and evaluated these with one approval. It is also noteworthy that 13 of the 35 programs that achieved the six-point threshold competed in Division 1 in 2024 and will be promoted only if their enrollment places them in a division with lower enrollments

The WIAA will release the Tournament Series assignments for all 2024-25 winter sports later this spring.

Calendar and Contact Ad Hoc Committee Begins Membership-Initiated Study

The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association Calendar and Contact Ad Hoc Committee developed a defined purpose and reviewed objectives at its meeting at the executive office on May 8.

The established purpose of the ad hoc committee is to represent the diverse voices of the membership in evaluating season lengths, game maximums, and coaching contact with the primary goal to promote a balanced, education-based athletic experience for student-athletes.

Members of the committee elected Janel Batten, athletics/activities director at Pulaski High School, and Jake Beschta, principal at Denmark High School as co-chairs

The committee first met in-person on April 18 and then virtually on April 30. During the first three meetings, the Calendar and Contact Ad Hoc Committee worked to review the directive of the Board of Control; orient and align members to the purpose of the group; establish familiarity with committee members; learn how others identify and perceive the issues pertaining to season length, coaching contact, and game maximums; identify information and resources required to fully understand and address the issues; review Area Meeting feedback; and to agree on a timeline for the committee work.

Addressing the three major, interrelated topics of season lengths, game maximums and coaching contact is the focus of the group. These topics directly impact all WIAA member schools, and the committee is committed to studying the topics comprehensively to formulate and propose viable solutions to best serve the membership and their respective communities.

The committee will develop a communication plan for sharing information and

has been due to the efforts of our member schools. Many high schools have taken the initiative to create an officiating course, and offer it to their students. The number of schools teaching courses has grown from 12 in 2021-22 to 42 in 2023-24. This has impacted our officials' registrations immensely. Nearly 1400 high school students have registered this year. The hope is that these students find a love for officiating and become the next generation of WIAA Officials who officiate our contests and State Tournaments.

Sport Licenses are active from August 1 – July 31 each year. We are nearing the close of one season and preparing for the next. The window to register is NOW OPEN and we are hopeful that we will see registration numbers continue to improve.

The WIAA is offering three registration windows. Athletic Administrators begin their hiring process well before the seasons begin – so we encourage all officials to license during the FIRST WINDOW.

- May 1 June 30
- September 15 30
- January 1 15

The cost to register, during these windows, is \$35 registration fee + \$15 per sport. Outside of these dates, there is an additional \$30 processing fee.

Once again, officials will be able to choose whether they want ELEC-TRONIC Rule Books, or paper rule books this year. The opportunity to have your rule book on your phone or tablet is a great step for those who no longer want to carry a book. We look forward to providing this option again.

As we celebrate the strides we have made in the number of licensed WIAA Officials, let's also remember that our high school sports are still experiencing a shortage. Encourage others to explore the opportunity to officiate high school athletics.

Recruitment and Retainment of Officials

The shortage of high school officials continues to be a focus for state high school associations across the country. NASO (The National Association of Sports Officials), in a new comprehensive survey, has reported that the average age of officials in every sport is getting older! A high percentage of officials will be hanging up their whistles (etc.) in the next 5 years. Not only are these officials nearing retirement, but they are also our most experienced and some of the best officials working in high school athletics.

We need to be intentional about preparing the NEXT generation of officials! How do we do that? The simple answer is that inexperienced officials, need experience. They need to officiate games, so that they can learn and grow. Our schools, our spectators, our coaches, players, and our administrators need to provide a sports environment where officials can gain valuable experience without being ridiculed on the court/field/etc. This means backing off the number of assignments we give to our veteran officials to provide opportunities for the next generation of officials. This means creating an environment at the middle school and junior varsity level where young officials can improve their mechanics, learn how to make correct calls in a fast-paced game, and develop communication skills with our coaches. Without protection, officials' careers end quickly. The need for the next generation to learn the skills needed for officiating becomes more important with every passing day.

Remember, NASO reported that 8 of every 10 newly licensed officials quit within the first two years. That information is staggering! Addressing the retention of officials is critical, and something that we must do together. It starts with adult behavior before, during, and after games!

Over the course of this past year, we have seen via social media, the difference that high schools, their athletes, students, and the community, are making to show their gratitude toward officials. Fall, Winter, and Spring Sport Officials Appreciation Weeks have been a big hit with officials! We thank our member schools that have planned special events around these dates and honored the officials at game time. The WIAA has received messages from schools and officials with photos and positive feedback. We thank you for making a greater effort to support our officials.

The greatest strides being made by our membership, as it relates to officiating, are the High School Courses on learning to Officiate. High school students who are registered as officials are leading us into the future. This school year we have licensed over 1400 high school students. Some are taking an officiating course, offered as part of the high school curriculum. Over the past 3 years we have seen the number of high schools that are offering an official's course grow exponentially. From 12 high school classes being taught in 2022 to 42 today is an amazing accomplishment! Efforts like these from our member schools are producing tangible results in the recruitment and retainment of our WIAA Officials. Thank you to the teachers and coaches who are making this happen.

School Involvement in Out-of-Season Activity

A reminder that schools cannot be involved in conducting out-of-season competition during the school year or during the summer. This means a school cannot conduct 3-on-3 basketball tournaments, co-educational volleyball tournaments, softball tournaments, etc., outside the designated school season for that particular sport. The one exception is in the summertime during the Board of Control approved unrestricted contact period between the end of school and July 31 (5 days for all WIAA sports). This does not prevent outside organizations, such as recreation departments which are not a part of the school, service clubs, etc., from renting school facilities and conducting these types of competitions, but the school itself cannot be directly involved.

A further reminder that the WIAA has a rule which states "A school may not conduct intramural programs which involve athletes with past status on a school team (varsity, junior varsity, sophomore, freshman), except during the established school season of a sport." A school cannot, for example, conduct intramural volleyball during the spring, with girls' volleyball players participating. It wouldn't make any difference how many were on a given team,

or whether it was co-ed volleyball, if girls' volleyball players were involved, it would be a violation.

WIAA rules do not prevent students from participating in nonschool outof-season competitions. However, school facilities cannot be used for students to practice for these competitions, unless a nonschool group or organization has made arrangements through normal procedures, to use these facilities.

WIAA Bylaws state that schools, including their administrators, athletic director and coaches, shall not become involved directly or indirectly with the coaching, management, direction, and/or promotion of any kind of all-star game or similar contest involving students with remaining WIAA high school eligibility in any sport, if such all-star games or similar contests are held during the established school year.

Note: Coaches are prohibited from having coaching contact outside the designated sport season with any eligible student-athlete while school is in session.

Adams-Friendship moves from the South Central Conference to Wisconsin Valley Conference, and Lake Country Lutheran transitions from independent status to the Woodland Conference. In addition, Wonewoc-Center moves from the Scenic Bluffs Conference to the Coulee Conference for boys golf only.

Following the Board's approval, Assumption will move from the Marawood Conference to the Coulee Conference for girls tennis only in 2024-25, and Providence Academy will join the Packerland Conference in boys soccer, girls cross country and boys cross country in 2024-25 after competing as an independent.

Other action items approved by the Board include the spring co-op teams for 2024-25 and 2025-26, the 2024 Annual Meeting transcript, a revision to the WIAA Licensure & Royalty Policy (Senior High Handbook Appendix L) and the general fund statements and payments for April.

Non-school Participation Rules from page 2

- A student may be reimbursed actual and necessary costs associated with competing. This may include transportation, food, lodging and entry fees.
- A school may not become involved financially, through transportation or any other way in a student's nonschool participation outside the sport season and the five Board of Control approved unrestricted contact days in the summer. (BL – Art. II, RE – Art. IV and Art. VI) Note: Funds kept in school activity accounts are considered school funds.

Awards must meet the WIAA amateur status rules as well. From the Rules at a Glance:

C: AMATEUR STATUS

A student may not accept, receive and/or direct to another, reimbursement in any form of salary, cash, or share of game or season proceeds for athletic accomplishments, such as being on a winning team, being selected for the school varsity team, or being a place winner in an individual tournament, etc. A student may receive: a medal, cup, trophy or plaque from the sponsoring organization regardless of cost; school mementos valued not more than \$200; an award valued not more than \$100 retail for participation in an athletic contest in a WIAA recognized sport; and may retain nonschool competition apparel worn by the student as part of the team uniform.

ball practice, she collided with a truck heading the opposite direction on I-90. She suffered a traumatic brain injury and numerous broken bones as a result of the crash.

After months of rehabilitation at a facility in Colorado, Coder returned home in April of 2023. The toughness she displayed on the softball field resonated through her recovery to relearn how to speak, walk and eat. With her dedication and hard work, she returned to school with her classmates and teammates to graduate this spring.

Adam Backus - Mishicot

Backus is a standout in football and track & field at Mishicot High School, and he played the lead role in the high school musical as well as solo ensemble.

This fall, Backus received Associated Press All-State High Honorable Mention at defensive back. He also earned Wisconsin Football Coaches All-State Honorable Mention as well as First Team All-Packerland Conference honors. The senior team captain in 2023 was voted the team's Most Valuable Player. He has advanced to sectionals in the pole vault, 400-meter, 800-meter and 1,600-meter relays.

In October of his junior season, Backus suffered a life-threatening injury during football practice. While making a play to defend a pass, he collided with another defensive teammate and was slow to get back on his feet. What appeared to be the equivalent of having the wind knocked out of him was something far more serious.

He sustained a grade 5 splenic rupture and was transported to the hospital. While in the hospital room for observation, his vitals crashed. After he was stabilized and underwent a procedure to repair the rupture, Backhus immediately asked when he could return to the field with his teammates. After rest and recuperation, he returned to participation last fall.

Dodge Shore - Hillsboro

Shore is a senior manager for the boys basketball team at Hillsboro High School, a role he has embraced for six years.

He dreamed of playing college basketball when he was in elementary school, but on July 21, 2017, those aspirations took a different path when Shore and his two siblings were involved in a head-on automobile collision. He sustained injuries that caused him to lose use of his legs and confined him to a wheelchair.

The challenges to fulfilling his dreams did not deter his drive to participate in basketball. Shore has been an active member of the Mad City Badgers wheelchair basketball team for a number of years, traveling around the country participating in tournaments. He recently accepted an offer to play for the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater men's wheelchair basketball team.

The NFHS Spirit of Sport Award was started in 2008. Including this year, 15 individuals and three teams have been chosen as national award recipients. Nominations for the award are generated

through NFHS member state associations and reviewed by the NFHS National High School Spirit of Sport Award Selection Committee composed of state association staff members. A national winner will be recognized in June at the NFHS Summer Meeting in Boston, Mass.

The WIAA Spirit of Sport Award was implemented in 2018 to determine a nominee to be submitted to the NFHS for section and national Spirit of Sport Award consideration. Recognizing Unsung Heroes of Sports Competitions

As another year comes to a close, there have been so many memorable moments that have taken place on the courts, courses, fields and pools all around the state.

It's a fact that none of these memories, or any indelible moments in the past 128 years in high school sports in Wisconsin, could or would have been possible without one essential group of contributors to every interscholastic competition – licensed officials. What should be abundantly clear, without officials, there are no games.

We celebrate and extend our gratitude to all licensed officials that give of themselves to allow others to participate in interscholastic athletics, not only the student-athletes that play the game, but also the coaches employed to guide the school programs.

Who are these unsung heroes? They are husbands and wives; they are moms and dads; they're grandparents, as well as brothers and sisters. And most recently, a large number of high school students. On top of that, in most cases, they are someone's coworker. That's right. High school officiating is a part-time gig. After work at their career job, they put on their officiating gear to serve our member schools and the teenagers that participate in school-based sports.

Let us all consider these things before expressing an often-biased frustration and discontent with officials, who sacrifice their time and effort to do their best to fairly arbitrate high school sporting events. A bit of respect, empathy and a perspective of "walk a mile in my shoes," – attributed to Mary Lathrap's poem Judge Softly – goes a long way.

As obvious as this may appear, it may not be resonating as much as needed to eradicate the shortage of sports officials we are experiencing in our state and throughout the country. Recent research by the National Federation of State High School Associations indicated the top reason officials leave the ranks was because of the unsporting behavior of adults, many of those would logically be the parents of participating student-athletes. Consider the irony of this. Individuals that believe a child's participation is so important that they act out in an uncivil manner towards officials, who are the essential element for all interscholastic participation. Doesn't this seem quite counterintuitive?

However, we can't overlook the role coaches have in setting the tone for either a respectful or hostile environment. It has been suggested that partisan spectators take cues from what they witness on the sidelines. While everyone is responsible for their own behavior, it's responsible to avoid contributing to someone allowing their emotions in the moment to get the best of them.

We recently announced the number of licensed officials has exceeded 10,000 for the first time, which is a positive trend. However, in recent conversations with conferences and athletic directors, scheduling officials at all levels of competition continues to be challenging in most sports. Therefore, the efforts to recruit and retain our licensed officials continues. Perhaps the most effective way to continue this effort is to resist taking officials' contributions for granted, and to extend appreciation and hospitality at every opportunity.

In March, the Board of Control acknowledged the importance and commitment of licensed officials by approving an increase in officials' pay during the Tournament Series. While surveys indicate that pay is not necessarily the reason why they began or continue to officiate at the high school level, the acknowledgement and additional compensation is appreciated. Also, in this edition of the Bulletin (pp. 3, 14-17), we recognize those officials that have been licensed for five or more years. Furthermore, we highlight officials that receive State Tournament assignments and those that receive Official of the Year Awards in the Bulletin throughout the year.

We continue to share how veteran and new officials can register and recognizing the positive impact officiating courses in our members' schools have had on the number of licensed officials. Our collective efforts are beginning to pay dividends. Student groups have been organized to provide officials with tokens of appreciation upon arriving to a contest site, and officials have reported positive experiences at events to the WIAA office by submitting the Sportsmanship PLUS report form. In addition, much of the gains we've experienced in reaching the 10,000 milestone has been the registration of young student officials, more than 1,400 in the past couple of years. This bodes well for the future.

As the sun sets on another year of high school sports, recall all the special moments and all the benefits that this year has provided for so many. Also keep in mind licensed officials made them all possible.
