National High School Activities Week Celebration Slated for October 14-20, 2007

The National Federation of State High School Associations created National High School Activities Week in 1980 to increase the public's awareness of the values and needs of interscholastic activity programs. During this special time, the nation's high schools are encouraged to promote the values inherent in high school athletics and other activities such as speech, music, drama, band and spirit squads.

National High School Activities Week is an opportunity to remind the public that already in place in every community is a comprehensive program addressing society's most current concerns, by:

- finding and nurturing the best effort of each young participant;
- encouraging students to stay in school, perform better academically and become better citizens;
- demanding respect for fair play and appreciation for the equitable application of procedures, rules and regulations;

- challenging racism, sexism and classicism through the active pursuit of teamwork and school spirit

"High school sports and activity programs provide one of the best bargains in our community and nation and will continue to do so as long as our nation supports them as an integral part of the



education of our young people. Not only do these programs teach the more than 10 million young people who participate in them valuable life skills lessons, such as ethics, integrity and healthy lifestyles, they also provide the best entertainment value in our nation.

"We have fundamental, empirical evidence that interscholastic activities provide a successful way in which to create healthy and successful citizens.

"Through National High School Activities Week, we have an opportunity to reflect on our participation as well as the participation of our children. Our nation must continue to support these programs and the life skills they provide America's youth."

High School Sports Participation Increases Again; Girls Exceeds Three Millionn for First Time

INDIANAPOLIS, IN (September 5, 2007) – For the 18th consecutive year, the number of student participants in high school athletics increased in 2006-07, according to the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS).

Based on figures from the 50 state high school athletic/activity associations, plus the District of Columbia, that are members of the NFHS, participation for the 2006-07 school year rose by 183,006 students to 7,342,910, according to the 2006-07 High School Athletics Participation Survey conducted by the NFHS. In addition, girls participation exceeded three million for the first time, with 3,021,807 females participating in 2006-07.

"This is certainly another great report on the interest of high school sports in our nation's schools," said NFHS Executive Director Robert F. Kanaby. "The girls participation figure is particularly exciting since this year is the 35th anniversary of Title IX. We are pleased that more and more girls are taking advantage of the opportunity to participate in high school sports. The results support the NFHS 2005-2008 Strategic Plan, in which the organization committed to providing stronger leadership and support for high school athletics and fine arts activities."

Last year, the NFHS began a new brand identity emphasis using a communications tag line of "Take Part. Get Set for Life.\textsupers" In addition to its chief task of writing playing rules for high school sports, the NFHS is striving to gain awareness and support from state and local governments, media, corporate partners, and especially students and their parents.

Golf Interpretations From the Sport Meetings

QUESTION: We had a situation at a conference meet where a girl recorded a 5 on her scorecard when she should have recorded a 6. The error was identified after the girl handed in her scorecard. before the conclusion of play and before the scores were officially announced and she did leave the scoring area. However, there was no committee to determine if a violation of USGA rules took place. The tournament director handled the matter. Should she have been disqualified?

INTERPRETATION: Yes, the girl should have been disqualified and the DQ stands since the tournament director identified that a violation of USGA 6-6 did take place and the final results were officially announced.

When running a tournament, it is best to identify a committee in advance of the start of the meet. However, when a complete committee is not identified, the tournament director or a coach, even a single coach can be considered to be the committee.

Conference coaches are encouraged to develop language for their Conference's By-Laws that reflect the individual's who should be members of the committee during conference golf matches.

QUESTION: Optimist International annually sponsors a golf competition, with winners at the district level advancing to the international competition in Florida in July. Anyone meeting the age requirements is able to participate. A discussion at our last district conference centered around local clubs paying the entry fees for their local winners to participate at the district level. I believe Optimist International pays the expenses for the district winner to compete in Florida.

Mv understanding:

If the only participation restriction is based on age, and local advertising is done throughout the community to attract golfers for a local contest, Optimist clubs would be able to pay the entry fees for their local winners to participate at the district level, without impacting eligibility. However, if only golfers from the local team are allowed to compete, or attempts are not made to attract non-high school team golfers, any outside compensation for advancing to the next level would rule the participant ineligible for the remainder of his or her high school term.

The key components are: Legitimate attempts are made to attract non-high school golf team members, participation is voluntary, an elimination event is held (a person is not chosen at random), and the recipient of paid entry fees at the next level (the winner) has the same chance as anyone else to win. If, after all this is done only high school golf team members show up for the elimination event and the team's best golfer wins, there wouldn't be any eligibility problems because the attempts were made.

Is this correct?

INTERPRETATION: The plan/understanding you outline – would be far and away the 'safest' plan to follow – from the perspective of removing all possible amateur status concerns – at least in so far as they would apply/be interpreted with regards to 'access to opportunity'...

Part of amateur status 'interpretation' arises from look-

ing at benefits and/or opportunities - and if an athlete has access above/beyond what is available to any/every student the potential for distress/distraction/allegation of violation are allowed a crack to enter. It can get more involved then that...but the paragraph above is an accurate/honest re-

QUESTION: There is a Future Collegians boys golf tournament scheduled for Whistling Straights in April of 2008. Can my son play in this tournament during the high school golf season?

INTERPRETATION: No, past experience with this tournament has it identified as one of many events on this or-ganizations calendar. It does not meet the criteria allowed by the WIAA membership for participation by student-ath-letes participating in high school regular season. A boy who competes in this tournament is not able to continue to compete in the remainder of the 2008 WIAA high school season.

QUESTION: Can my daughter continue to work with a PGA golf professional during the WIAA high school season?

INTERPRETATION: Yes, WIAA regulations do not prevent practice outside of the school team. However, I strongly recommend that you and your daughter discuss this additional practice with your high school coach. Due to additional risk of injury, loss of additional study time, and potential differences in coaching philosophies it is always best to discuss a student-athlete's practice away from the school team with the head coach.

QUESTION: Our boy's golf team members are interested in having "Captain's Practices" this fall. I told my coach I am checking with you but that it would most likely be okay as long as: 1. Neither our varsity nor JV coach provided any instruction to them - that this is to be a voluntary activity (attendance isn't taken, etc.). 2. The kids cannot receive any perks, such as free play at the course because they are members of the team (students who have their own membership/family membership, etc., at the course would have those rights to use, but others would have to pay greens fees). Please advise.

2007-08 Officials Accident Medical and General **Liability Insurance Program** For Licensed Officials of the Wisconsin **Interscholastic Athletic Association**

Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association Insurance Program for Officials

Today's game officials need the protection of a comprehensive program of insurance coverages. And it takes a strong team to provide those coverages! Who Is Covered?

Coverage is provided to all licensed officials while working regularly scheduled contests or scrimmages. The contest must be a sport sanctioned by the WIAA. The official must be licensed with the WIAA as an official for one or more sports. Coverage under these policies applies to those sports and activities governed or sponsored by the WIAA. The official is also protected while participating in related activities, such as meetings, seminars and clinics.

Coverage Territory:

Coverage applies to sponsored sports and activities in the USA. Direct group travel to and from sponsored activities is covered under the Base Accident Medical

Program Summaries:

General Liability Insurance

This \$1,000,000 per Occurrence/\$3,000,000 General Aggregate coverage is provided under the WIAA General Liability policy issued by Merkel Insurance Company. The plan is written on an Excess basis. The policy covers court judgements and awards, as well as legal fees and court costs. The policy also covers lawsuits for bodily injury, property damage and personal injury (i.e., defamation of character, libel, slander, and false arrest)

General Liability Limits: \$3,000,000 General Aggregate; \$1,000,000 per Occurrence; \$1,000,000 Products and Completed Operations Aggregate; \$1,000,000 Personal and Advertising Injury; \$5,000 Medical Expense; \$0 Deductible per Claim.

Eligibility Questions & Answers

Residence & Transfer

Q.: I had a young man come in to register for school. For the past two years he has attended another school district under open enrollment. His mother lives in our attendance area. The family has decided that it is time to come back to our school. I did some checking yesterday and learned that the young man received 1-F second semester of last year. I also learned that beginning August 6 the young man signed up and participated in 2-weeks of football practice. a) The student has the right to void his open enrollment by enrolling in his home school. b) Is the student eligible by virtue of his participation in another members program?

A.: As I understand this one, student is not eligible to practice or compete as result of transfer following post-4th semester. It is further complicated and even more unlikely - if the two weeks of practice was at another school.

Q.: I have a question about a recent transfer from out of state. He is 18 but still considered a dependent of his parents...who still reside in another state. They sent him here to live with his grandfather in order to assist him (since the grandmother recently died). He is interested in going out for baseball and I told him he is ineligible because his parents still reside out of the district and that the new transfer rule comes into effect because he was at another high school for at least four semesters. He wishes to know if he would be eligible if he became an independent 18 year old "cut free" from his parents...or...can he apply for some waiver since he is here as a type of care giver?

A.: This student would not be eligible. WIAA text provides that "whether an adult or not...a student is eligible only in the district where parents reside." The student has no status in the WIAA. He is not able to request relief on his own behalf. He has status in your school. Your school has status in the WIAA. Your school may request relief on behalf of one of your full-time students. There is no precedent that I am familiar with – that would support the request on the details as offered. This is a choice family made – does not encumber our membership.

Q.: I have a letter from my principal saying that two kids fall under a McKinney-Vento Homeless Education assistance Act of 2001 and we have to give them services. Does this include WIAA eligibility and or do I treat them like any other transfer?

A.: Get their stories and treat like other transfers. For eligibility purposes, the WIAA recognizes homeless families. Unfortunately, too often we have seen 18-yr. olds and their parents attempt to manipulate even that law, e.g., "Jeff - you are now homeless...move to Mossy Rock with your girlfriend so you can wrestle." Run this to ground the best you can document. Do a transfer student form. Where are parents? Have them write the circumstances and bring it here. If you find it credible and compelling, let us know. Our record with Katrina and other documented hardships will reflect that when/where there is legitimacy – there is also relief.

Q.: I have a question in regards to a transfer student that is now moving back into our district with his mother. He has been in a group home and attended another school/district. His credits earned are not very good and we would like to send him to our alternative educational system – this is in conjunction with several area districts. My question is can this young man participate in athletics? I have read the regulations and it looks as if he can participate, but I would like to be sure.

A.: A few questions to clarify – but it may be possible for a student in an alternative school student to be eligible. You would want to begin by verifying: Did he attend a day of practice anywhere this fall? Will he be enrolled as 'full-time' student and/or equivalent? Is he eligible for all other student awards/privileges (prom king, class president, valedictorian, e.g.) same as every other full-time student. Let's begin there and we can address any related questions.

Q.: A student attended private school as a 9th, 10th, 11th grade student. He has entered our public as a 12th grade student. Parents live here in our district – he is not attending the private school due to tuition hike. Would he be eligible to play here or is that considered a transfer?

A.: Student has no prior status at your school. This is a post 4th semester transfer. Student is not eligible to practice or compete. The new transfer rule still contains a waiver provision. There are times

when families are put out of work and financial hardship can be documented. It is most unusual, however, that if a student and family have made and met commitments to this private school, that the school simply - "put them on the street." (my words, not yours). I am mostly familiar with the private schools doing all they can to help families through hardship periods. Recommend you chat with their AD.

Q.: A student attended our school as a 9th grader – mom lives in the district. Attended our neighbor school in the open enrollment program as a 10-11th grader. Went to live with dad (divorce) and attended school the last quarter of her 11th grade in another state. Because of this they lost open enrollment in the other district. She now is enrolled as 12th grader at our school. Would she be eligible?

A.: As described this is another post-4th semester transfer; there has not been a complete total move by parent(s). Student not eligible to practice or compete unless a waiver would be provided. Unrestricted eligibility would require sending family and receiving family to document home life or extenuating needs and bring to you. In turn then if you/your school find the story compelling, then you can forward materials here along with your school's request for a waiver of the residence and transfer provisions. Sending school might also contribute some more detailed insights - either in support of, or opposition to eligibility. Always encourage detailed descriptions of events which family feels make a transfer 'NECESSARY.' Encourage clear chronology, and use any other sources of documentation that might help validate the story and need.

Q:: A student was expelled from school "A" in May and was sent to an alternative school. He attends alternative school May through June and is now being assigned back to school "A". This student will be a junior. My thought is that this student is ineligible for one year even though he was administratively transferred from school "A" and that the school he was transferred to was an alternative school. Is this correct?

A.: I believe your initial starting point is good/safe one. I would assume nothing in the area of new 4th semester transfer rule. Always safe to hold a student out until cleared. I would advise School A administration to document this story and if they wish to request eligibility, to process as waiver request. The fact that the expulsion does in a sense represent a forced/nonvoluntary change and that student wishes to return to same school he was forced to leave - have some degree of merit and hold prospect for relief. That the student 'didn't have a choice' might at times be seen as extenuating (granted, he didn't have a choice in the action the school took - but did have a choice in whether or not to participate in those things which got him expelled). Given the parenthetical perspective above, some schools have parents and student write and participate in the process of seeking eligibility. Have the student tell the story of why he left and why he's returned – and why the school should advocate for him regarding sports. What's he going to do differently this year?

Q.: Student attends school as a freshman. Gets home schooled her sophmore year. For her junior year she enrolls at one of our schools. Is home schooling considered a school, therefore, she is ineligible due transferring after four se-

A.: No...the new rule states 'transfer from any school into a WIAA member school.' We do not look upon home schooled children as coming from a school so upon entry into a member school we kind of welcome that. But as an upperclassman - FOR ELIGIBILITY PURPOSES, student is regarded as academically inelicent grade reporting period'... Not having a school report card, all students except entering 9th graders, it is the equivalent of 'all F's'... (first time/entering 9th graders get the 'free start', if you will.) For all other students eligibility is 'earn as you go,' i.e., not more then one F in most recent grade report. This student CAN practice - and provided meets all other eligibility requirements, residence e.g., CAN be afforded eligibility following 21 calendar days of ineligibility.

Q.: A 9th grade student whose residence is in A, open enrolled to B. He attended four days of football practice with the B team this month. He has now decided to come back to A and enter his freshmen year at A. He would like to

know if he would be eligible to compete on the A football team. On page 33 of the Handbook under Section 3 - Transfers: I find, "attendance at one athletic practice shall determine 'beginning of school year' and this would make him ineligible for varsity competition. Under #2) I find that because he attended the four days of football at B he would be ineligible to compete for the remainder of that school year. Question: Is that varsity or all levels of competition? Under #3 The rules indicate the possibility of a waiver for non-varsity competition only. Question: Is a waiver possible for this student?

A.: The fundamental rule provides that the student is not eligible. For a student who is within the first four semesters – If you do the transfer student eligibility form and there are 'no objections' indicated – you may provide non-varsity opportunities for the balance of this year. If student continues as your student next year, restrictions are removed.

Q.: I have an athlete that told me he was now living with his grandmother. His grandmother does not live in the district. The school district has his address listed still as his mother's (in the district). I do not want to get this kid into trouble with the school if he is not legally living in the district, but I don't want to violate eligibility requirements. What are my options for him?

A.: As I understand this: Parent/parents of student do in fact live in your district. If that's the case, student would still be eligible with you - based on parents residence. To paraphrase the residence rule: A full time student, whether an adult or not, is eligible only at the school within whose attendance boundaries his/her parents reside. So to put it another way - student is NOT eligible in the district where grandparents live. And another way, student could live at a friends house, e.g. but would still only be eligible in the district where parents reside (full time/primary residence).

Q.: I have been getting a lot of transfer forms to sign for juniors. On the bottom of the form it says "Do you have any reason to oppose this student being afforded some level of eligibility at our school?" If I mark "no" does that mean that junior transfer can play JV? I thought the new rule stated that any junior or senior transfer could not play or practice for one year. My second question is we had a transfer come in as a junior and she did not play sports as a sophomore. Does that one year still apply? What would a good reason for a waiver be?

A.: Marking "No" on the transfer verifi-

cation form only allows nonvarsity opportunity for students who transfer within first four semesters. Post 4th semester transfers - not eligible to practice or compete. You are correct that juniors and seniors are ineligible for practice and competition for one calendar year. That someone might indicate there is no reason to object - does not mitigate the applying of the transfer rules as they ought to be per each situation/circumstance. Not playing sports for part of their first four semesters does not change the rule - "unless the transfer has been made necessary due to complete total move of family student is not eligible to practice or compete/calendar year - unless a waiver is provided." **Documented extenuating circumstances** could include something like: The deer through the windshield and mom/dad passed away. The student then needed to go and live with grandma. Or, mom/dad are divorced, student lives with his father – who just received orders to deploy to Iraq. Student NEEDS to go live with biological mom. In these examples you can clearly see the involuntary force of change. There's no choice in the matter, these events have landed upon the student/family. Documented reason of home life betwill oftentimes terment include considerable documentation of abuse, negtypically available from courts, police, social service. These are not all inclusive but examples which are fairly typical.

Q.: I am a head wrestling coach. A student has inquired that he would like to transfer to my school, and I was wondering how he might apply for a waiver. There are many unique specifics to his situation. Where do I get started?

A.: Ordinarily a coach should always direct parents/students of prospective transfers to school administration and admissions. Immediately. Using something along the lines of: "Mr. Smith, I will be glad to sit down with you and your son and answer all your questions about our wrestling program - as soon as 'Tommy'

becomes our student. Please set-up a meeting with our principal or guidance and they'll introduce you to our AD. Between them they should be able to answer all the questions you need to know if you really want to join our school." A member school may request relief only on behalf of their own full-time students.

Q.: We have a situation where an open enrolled football player practiced with us on 8/8/07 and did not return to us. We were contacted by his home district and were told he practiced with them on Thursday 8/9/07. What is the WIAA rule governing this?

A.: Student anchored his unrestricted eligibility at your school by virtue of attending a day of practice at 'A' as an approved/open enrolled student. Fundamental rule provides student is not eligible at 'B.' Best case, if both schools agree and because student is a sophomore, he could be allowed nonvarsity opportunities for remainder of this year.

Amateur Status

Q.: Can students who receive free or reduced lunch have participation fees waived without risking eligibility?

A.: Yes – Amateur status provisions allow students to be "reimbursed" for costs directly associated with competition. When a school 100 percent and uniformly waives fees for students on free/reduced – and with no bearing on grade or team level..or not based on athletic ability/potential/performance, we consider it from the perspective that they are costs associated with the school's competition season.

Q.: We had a senior high school girl get a hole in one at our Booster Hockey Golf Outing. Can she accept the prize, a two-year lease of a car, or would that impact her high school eligibility this year?

A.: Answer's "no." Student may not accept, receive or direct to another....a cash or merchandise award ... Would end her high school career. See Rules At A Glance 2C.

O.: I am a member of the largest running organization in Wisconsin with about 1500 members. We have an interest in starting a program to help disadvantaged high school athletes who are involved in cross-country or track and are in need of shoes/equipment. My initial thought is to run the program through the high school coaches and the local shoe/sport equipment stores; perhaps giving the coaches forms that they could fill out and give to the athletes to use at local stores to purchase the needed equipment. Our organization already has a working relationship with many of the shoe stores in southeastern Wisconsin so I don't believe it would take much convincing to get their participation. The stores could collect the forms and "cash" them in through our organization. am certainly open to other suggestions but I believe the heart of this program would need to be the coaches themselves because they would need to identify those in need and provide them with the necessary forms.

A.: There may be a way to achieve your interests and ends without peril to a student athlete. It is not the course you've initially identified. But an alternate path might deliver the results you hope to achieve, nonetheless. WIAA Amateur status provisions prohibit a student from accepting/receiving cash and/or merchandise. Simple plan you might consider, is to contact member school ADMIN-ISTRATION. Have them identify those students who receive free/reduced lunch and if you wish to GIFT THE SCHOOL with cash or coupon - for them to use/administer in providing for there students as they then determine, your desired result might be achieved without peril to student, member school, school coach and with no uninbacklash toward organization's intended generosity. Always remember - these are the school's programs, not any one coaches.

Competition & Practice

Q.: Is it permissible for a varsity reserve team to schedule a game with another schools varsity team? We have 16 conference games and one non-conference game once back in Wisconsin. We'll play three non-conference games while in Florida for a total of 20 regular varsity games. There is a small Christian school in Florida that has inquired about scheduling a game with us while we are there. I don't have any games left to play him. But knowing this school from previous years down there I have no doubt my reserves would compete just fine with them. By making sure 10 of my reserves do not play in at least one of the games in Florida (which is not a problem as they would

not play anyway), would they then be eligible and could we play this game? We typically bring about 20-22 players on this trip. I guess the question is can a team schedule a varsity contest with another teams reserves and count it as a varsity game for one team and as a reserve game for another?

A.: Simplest answer is 'yes'...WIAA rules would not prevent your JV team from competing against another school's varsity team. It would count as one of the allowed maximums within both teams schedules clearly enough. I am not able to comment on other state's rules in this regard with much more then speculation. Most of us are similar - your opponent ought to know. I can assist if needed. This happens often enough, e.g., a wrestling team doesn't show for Saturday's invite and the AD scrambles to bring in the local HS 's JV team...to fill brackets and provide competitive opportunity. Some larger schools send their JV's to provide a non-conf. game to a small school's/emerging varsity program. No problem in those scenarios on the surface. In so far as you are concerned - make certain the contest is clearly indicated on your JV and/or reserve schedule and within the permitted maximums. Do not in any way have it appear on your varsity schedule or as a 21st varsity game. There is a second dimension that as a State office we (and you would want to know about) - if a WI team played several JV programs out of state and then took the number one seed from your team - you'd be miffed to find out. I would advise that you explain and document in the contract you are playing/providing a non-varsity team as the opponent, and in WI that would not be allowed for seeding and playoff purposes. I would copy the respective state office.

Q.: We are trying to organize our baseball Florida trip and making sure we cover all of our bases and get things done right. Our AD was looking through the WIAA Bylaws found this excerpt - "Except for events held in bordering states (MN, IL, MI, IA) no school shall play more than one out-of-state competition, and/or scrimmage per team each school season." Is this new and how does it now pertain to our baseball trip? Can we only play one game if we

A.: Rule is new – approved by the member's just this past April (2007) at the Annual meeting. The quote you've provided is not complete. Complete text is on p. 27 /Bylaws, in Sr. High Handbook, "...no approval shall be provided for more then one out-of-state competition, event and/or scrimmage..." Interpretation: Spring break trip – is your 'event', i.e., your one-time out of (non-bordering) state excursion. You may play as many contests and have your scrimmage as your schedule and season regulations will allow during this event

Q.: I have had some soccer parents approach me to see if they could do a soccer team trip to Costa Rica over spring break during which they would play some games. I thought I would start with you to see if it is even legal for the team to compete outside of the country.

A.: There is no WIAA provision that would specifically prohibit this. We would advise review and conformity to all other requirements as outlined – Sr. High Handbook, p. 27 (G1-7). As they relate to interstate competition. In addition, remember that WIAA season regulations specifically prohibit soccer competition v. nonschool/club teams.

Q.: Last Friday our varsity football game was suspended due to an electrical problem that rendered us without a scoreboard and no lights. The game was suspended at half-time. The game will resume and be completed on Monday at 5 p.m. My question pertains to "individual participation limitations." With the suspended game being played on Monday we will have the following contests next week: Monday--varsity (completion of 2nd half); Tuesday--9th grade game; Thursday--JV game; Friday--varsity In applying the "individual participation limitations", is the suspended game considered part of the week? Could a "border-line" JV-varsity player see some action in the Monday game, Thursday game AND Friday game? I have instructed my coaches, that unless we hear from you differently, we should consider the most strict interpretation.

A.: The 'letter of the text' provides an athlete may not appear in three different levels of play in the same calendar week.

Under the circumstance as you identify it, a student might have role in two varsity and one JV contest within the same week. Technically, that is not prohibited. However, you are wise to recognize this is an exposure/athlete well-being provision and your question, a valid one. You and your

coaches will be wise to recognize and take into consideration weather/environmental conditions and have a 'plan' for allowing kids to take part, if that is your desire...but I advise having a firm plan for use/exposure and sticking with it. Pay particular attention to your larger/less conditioned athletes. If there is any questions about any of your athletes, do not put in all your contests. You might also modify your periods in the JV game (or the varsity game for that matter). NF playing rules allow any period to be shortened. Lastly, coaches will need to pay attention to when/where they get the day of rest accounted for (one day off after six of practice/competition).

Q.: Can WIAA varsity level teams compete against non-sanctioned teams, commonly referred to as "club" teams?

A.: If certain caveats are met, yes. Except for club soccer teams. WIAA member schools are prohibited from competing vs. club soccer programs.

Participation Issues

Q.: My son was a starting quarterback and was kicked off the team for lying. Kids make mistakes. I have not seen anything that I have read about the coaches having the right to take this action. I believe it was not fair. Am I wrong?

A.: Determinations of this kind are a local decision. Traditionally, coaches have been afforded considerable authority in determining who makes a team, who is let go and/or disciplined.

Q.: Could you point me in the direction of where I might find information to respond to the middle school parent who wants her son to be able to play on the fall volleyball team (girls).

A.: You will find this on the WIAA website under gender equity Q&A. The following is taken from that information: Question – boys are not afforded the opportunity to play interscholastic volleyball or to participate in gymnastics within the sanctioned sports programs of the WIAA. Must a boy be allowed to participate on a girls' team? Answer - The courts have generally held that because of past inequities in girls' sports programs it would jeopardize participation opportunities for girls to permit boys to compete on girls teams. The U.S. Department of Education has interpreted the law to be permissive in this regard; that is, state athletic organizations may permit boys to play on girls' teams. However, the WIAA holds a philosophical position that agrees with many courts: Boys, because of many more years to develop skills and strength, will in many cases take over girls' teams and girls' opportunities will be limited.

Nonschool

Competition/Participation

Q.: A parent asked me a question about eligibility that I couldn't find an answer to. He has a daughter playing varsity tennis. He had hired a coach this summer to work on her game. He was wondering if she can continue going to this coach DURING the tennis season. I really couldn't find where that would be a violation. But just to be safe and sure - can he still hire a coach to work with his daughter during the tennis season?

A.: WIAA rules would not prevent the student from continuing to receive private instruction. See III-D of attached. Having said that, experience shows it is something which ought to be done with school/AD/coach understanding and approval. It is not unusual to see more problems arise by continuing the relationship than good come about, e.g., private coach shows up at match and can't help, but coach pupil (compliance/coaching contact problem – plus hurt feelings etc.). Athlete is placed in position of not knowing which coach to 'listen to,' etc.

Coach Contact

Q.: One of the levels of our youth football program is really struggling. The coach is well meaning, but just doesn't have a football background. The level is 7th grade. Would there be anything prohibiting myself or any of my high school coaches from attending a practice to try to offer some direction? I want their experience to be positive. Right now I fear we might lose these kids from the sport.

A.: In Rules At A Glance, Article I provides that JV and varsity coaches can have contact with student's until they actually enter 9th grade. So - from a coaching contact standpoint, I see little peril. The potential boomerang in this might be if this team is made up of both public and private school students - some room for asserting recruitment/undue influence. If team is made up 100 percent of students from your feeder religious school, I see little concern. If team is made up of both public/private middle level students, then

the solution I'd recommend is 'inviting' your public school counterparts to donate some of their time/attention to this struggling group of youngsters.

Q.: My daughter attends a member high school. In the past two fall seasons, girls at the school have participated in a nonschool softball league. The varsity softball coach is restricting the players on this team based on her choice. Is this OK? If not, does my daughter risk ineligibility if she plays?

A.: If accurate, the coach is more likely putting the school's <u>program</u> in jeopardy – and thus indirectly, the individual athlete who would potentially be impacted if the school program was determined to be in non-compliance.

Q.: May a varsity girls soccer athlete assist a junior varsity coach in coaching a youth team, or would that be inappropriate contact? The youth team season is this fall.

A.: Outside of the actual school season and/or during the five unrestricted days in the summer, this would be considered out of season coaching contact. Student could coach the team or coach could coach the youth team...Never together.

Q:: I may be coaching middle school volley-ball this fall. My son is a high school volleyball athlete and expressed a desire to assist, and work with his little brother's 8th grade team. He would volunteer when other commitments allow, and assist with the running of drills and techniques at practice. Since this is not associated with his high school, and is not a coaching situation for him, is this OK? I do not coach at the high school level, and am not involved in a high school program in any way.

A.: From your description, I see no obvious peril from a WIAA perspective - for your son or his school team - if he wished to assist you in the manner you describe.

Out-of-Season Concerns/Equipment

Q.: Our boys golf team members are interested in having "Captain's Practices" this fall. I told my coach I am checking with you but that it would most likely be okay as long as: 1. Neither our varsity or JV coach provided any instruction to them - that this is to be a voluntary activity (attendance isn't taken, etc.). 2. The kids cannot receive any perks, such as free play at the course because they are members of the team (students who have their own membership/family membership, etc., at the course would have those rights to use, but others would have to pay greens fees). Please advise.

A.: Current rules and interpretations would prohibit this. Rules of Eligibility Art. VI, Section 2 - Out-of-Season, p. 38/ C-2. Indicates there are no restrictions against student's voluntarily assembling - in the summer time. This is the specific text that allows for "Captains" practices. From there then, go back and read Section 2, Pream-('may not resemble school's team practicing/competing'). Also then read over Bylaw Art. II, Section 1 and 2. This text and interpretation may be coming to the membership in April for some revisions. Bottom line, I must advise great caution and diversity of athletes when assembling during the school year, outside of the season.

Q.: My volleyball coach would like to put together a league team for the park and rec. winter league. The team would consist of himself, a few adults and two or three high school players. The coach says that other coaches from other schools say they have done this. I am not so sure it is legal.

A.: First, I must request that you please identify those schools and coaches – who have done this, to me. Second, if the players have any remaining high school eligibility such coaching contact would be viewed as a violation.

Health & Behavior

Q.: Is the product/line out there called Advocare a supplement we should be aware of? I was asked about Advocare and went to some websites for information. However, is this a line of products that should be on the WIAA's banned or questionable list?

A.: In my opinion - ves/absolutely Have not heard or read recently about the product - at one time it was my understanding that they sold one product line to NCAA - that was creatine-free, in order to allow college strength coaches to 'endorse/promote'...and to conform to NCAA rules - And that the high school product line they market - did in fact, contain creatine. Our restricted list is not able to ever be 100 percent all-inclusive, the market changes literally every night and day. As a result that's why we provide some examples of what is/are supplements which are fundamentally categorized as 'restricted' by our member's policy. Look at the list - if the product/supplement contains creatine, more caffeine then a normal can of soda

and/or any of the other types of supplements as identified out in the policy trifold consider it restricted. If you're not certain send me a list of the ingredients and the claims. With the marketing of this stuff ever-changing and always trying to grip the athlete and especially adolescent athlete market - is exactly why we try to always indicate - READ THE LABEL. In some parts of the state coaches were actually targeted for recruitment as sellers (their spouses) and a pyramid gig, much like Amway was born. We advise caution.

Q.: I have a runner who will be taking a drug for a nasal problem, it is "Veramyst" (fluticasone furoate- which is a man-made corticosteroid). Will this be a problem with the WIAA?

A.: If this is a prescription medication and if it is used by the student it is prescribed to – in accordance with the prescribed use/dosage, there will be no eligibility concerns registered here. Our medical advisory members concurred: "Absolutely no contraindications to participation for this young man. He has a prescription for this medication to treat his allergies. Also, the nasal steroids are not performance enhancing like an anabolic steroid. I applaud the coach's knowledge of the athletes (and their medical conditions) on the team."

Q.: Here in western Wisconsin we are on the border of Minnesota and Wisconsin. So when athletes bring in their physicals, some go to a physician in Minnesota. My question is: Is it ok to accept a Minnesota High School League physical form or are we to require that the green Wisconsin physical form be filled out? First year physical in Minnesota gives an in depth exam with both the doctor's signature and the parents. The subsequent year only a follow up form was given with no signatures. Please let me know what we are to accept.

A.: YES* (SO LONG AS THE FORM IS SIGNED BY A MD AND/OR APNP and the date coincides with WIAA requirements. WIAA members have not approved any other medical professionals to perform school sport physicals in WI, e.g., chiropractors have not been authorized by our members. The form is provided as courtesy to members. You may accept any recognizable form that indicates a physical exam has been provided. You could accept another form..from military physical..from foreign country as will accompany most exchange students, e.g. But still must have MD or APNP's signature/credential. Would recommend using/providing a WIAA alternate year card though, parents still must sign.

Q.: I was recently asked a question if a school nurse can administer the skinfold test for wrestling. Our school has a full time nurse presently, would she be able to perform the skinfold test instead of us having to pay an outside person to perform the test? If not, what would she have to do to become certified in this area?

A.: No. Only skinfold measurers trained by the WIAA are authorized to do wrestling minimum weight measurements. With all involved, there's more to it then just pinching...that is a key part of our training. We identify/select and train new measurers every other year. We will be seeking new measurers next spring (2008) for next fall's class. You or your candidate can get back in touch next spring and we'll be glad to get an application out.

Q.: If our school policy is stronger/stricter than WIAA (we have a no F policy) and if someone is deemed ineligible, then are we as a school bound to implement the WIAA penalties of the 21 days starting on the first day a game/match can be played?

A.: When it is 'your' academic policy that has made the student ineligible, it could/should be your policy that identifies when eligibility is restored. Understand that with a No-F policy, you could return the athlete in less then the WIAA's prescribed timelines and periods. BUT DO KEEP IN MIND that you must have in effect, a two tier policy, because if/when a student gets more then one F, the WIAA suspension (or your own, if it is more strict) must then be applied.

Q.: Is there a distinction between a varsity and non-varsity athlete as to when someone is serving the 1/3 games penalty? Or doesn't it matter. Just wondering because for example what if a senior athlete plays JV tennis would she be following the varsity schedule for game dates when indeed there might be one or only two JV games during that stretch of the probation.

A.: If a student is purely a JV player, apply the JV schedule. Some folks get into trouble when they try to apply both JV and varsity schedules to creatively get student returned, sooner. Recommend apply the schedule that student actually plays at. ÷

Tennis Interpretations

QUESTION: Due to the realignment we have 10 teams in our conference this year. Would you have any recommendation regarding where to put the pig tails when setting up the brackets for the conference meet? For example, feeding into the middle brackets, or the top and bottom, or one on the top/bottom and one in the middle? Thought I would ask before bringing this up with the other coaches.

INTERPRETATION: The WIAA Fall Season

Regulations for the WIAA Tennis Subsectionals do provide a bracket that has been designed to meet the needs of the WIAA membership tennis schools for a nine-person draw in Flight #1 for D2 programs. In this design, the pig tail matches feed to the third line of the top bracket as coaches have indicated they prefer to seed the top two (or three) players/teams and then have the remaining players/teams placed in a draw at this level. In this way the two players who draw the pig tail match play another player/team who was/were placed and then meet the winner of the #1 seed vs. a placed player/team.

A similar design could be used for a 10-team bracket with the addition of the seven and ten placements also playing a pig tail match. In this situation, I would have the winner of the seventen pig tail placement match play in the top bracket and move the eight-nine pig tail placement match to the bottom bracket.

Again, these decisions need to be made by the conference with the conference protocol for making these types of decisions followed. Conference regulations supercede WIAA and USTA regula-

QUESTION: Can the girls take private lessons during their season?

INTERPRETATION: The general philosophy of additional practice or lessons during the school season is one that is placed on local schools and coaches. Since WIAA membership language indicates that student-athletes owe their loyalty and allegiance to their school team during the school season and it remains silent regarding studentathletes receiving additional instruction outside of the practice sessions held during the school tennis season, school administrators and coaches are encouraged to monitor student-athletes and their training outside of the normal school practice normally scheduled on a regular

As tennis players practice, train, develop their skills, etc., it is important that communication take place between players, their parents and their school coaches regarding any additional in-struction and/or practice they may become involved in. This additional practice beyond the school program does add significant risk to the health and well-being of developing adolescents. In addition, instruction outside of the school team may be different philosophically than that being provided with the school team. As classes begin in September, there is also the element of school time for homework that needs to take pri-

I mention these elements as many times parents and others will view these additional instructional opportunities as positive training for student-athletes. Please do not take this to mean that these are not positive opportunities, it is simply that many times these other elements are not taken into consideration when additional training opportunities are decided. In addition, this information helps me provide some background information to respond to your questions of which I have provided in "black" underneath each question found below.

WIAA regulations do not prevent student-athletes from receiving additional instruction during the school season. Student-athletes should talk with coaches to make them aware of this additional instruction and be aware of additional risks for injury, differences in instructional philosophies and the need to schedule time for studies once the school year begins.
QUESTION: Can they take group lessons?

INTERPRETATION: Yes, with the cautions identified above.

QUESTION: Can they participate in non-recorded

shortened matches in a tennis social?

INTERPRETATION: NO, any match/competition with non-school competitors is a violation WIAA membership regulations resulting in loss of eligibility for the remainder of the tennis season. Matches like these are only allowed outside of the WIAA regular season. QUESTION: Can they rent a court and play each

INTERPRETATION: Renting of courts and playing/competing with a fellow teammate during the school season is allowed.

QUESTION: If there are two pretty good tennis players going to high school at a school that doesn't offer tennis, do they have any options for playing in

INTERPRETATION: The WIAA membership requires all student-athletes to be full-time students at the school they are enrolled in order for them to participate in a sport program. Consequently, the answer is a "no," student-athletes are not allowed to participate at another school in a program that is or is not offered at the school they are enrolled.

This regulation does not prevent a studentathlete from participating or competing in non-school programming (USTA tennis, a program at a local club, Park and Recreation League, etc.)

during this time.
QUESTION: Mid-way through a multi-team meet the meet was ended (it will not be rescheduled) as a result of the rain. As a result of the meet ending without completing it, are we able to add another meet to

INTERPRETATION: No, since some of the matches had been completed, these matches must count and be used for individual records for this year. The match is considered to be suspended and can be concluded at a later date. Teams involved are not able to schedule another meet unless they do not have 14 meets on their current schedule.

QUESTION: We played in a 8-team invite yesterday (Saturday) at School AAA. It was a team tourna-ment and we played School BBB in the first round and lost, after that we played School CCC and were in the middle of the first sets and the rain came and washed our match out. We were trying to go indoors but no courts were available since the other teams were using all the indoor facilities in the area. Both School CCC and us would like to finish this match. My question is can we finish this match at a later date? We both tentatively agreed to play on Wednesday depending on

INTERPRETATION: In tennis, schools have been allowed to complete multi-dual matches with the permission of school administrators following a rain out or suspension of a multi-dual meet for another reason. There have been times when these matches have had to take place at a different site. The site is determined by the schools involved if school administration approves of continuing the meet.

All matches that have concluded are completed matches and need to be part of a player or team's Season Record for consideration by the State Seeding Committee. Matches that were suspended should continue from the point of the suspension using the score at the time of the suspension.

OUESTION: I have question about girls' tennis, in regards to a special education student. I have a sophomore player out with an IQ below 50. Because of this, she has trouble with the scoring procedure and memory of the score. She is enrolled in the special education courses in the high school and has documentation to show her intelligence level.

Her mother asked me if it would be possible to have a coach/parent/spectator help with the scoring during the matches. I was unsure of the answer, so this is my email to you. How much assistance can they have in the scoring and are there are guidelines for special education athletes?

INTERPRETATION: The WIAA Fall Season Regulations indicate on page 51, 15., c., (4), that non-varsity players while playing in a non-varsity competition may accept verbal and hand signal advice from their school's designated coach only. The designated coach is allowed on the court as identified by current rules.

This language does allow coaches to provide help with scoring during non-varsity competitions. Assistance for situations like this is only allowed by the designated coach. It is only allowed at the non-varsity level. When a player competes at the varsity level, they are not able to be provided additional assistance beyond the coaching opportunities provided in 15., c., (1), (2) and (3).

QUESTION: I am a high school tennis coach in Palos Hills, Illinois. Illinois does not allow the athletes to participate in non-school competition (such as USTA or ITF tournaments) during the tennis season. What is the rule in Wisconsin?

INTERPRETATION: Virtually the same. See III-D of the WIAA Rules at a Glance.

QUESTION: We held a triple dual at our high school on August 18. We were able to play the first 2 rounds before the rain came. Can we play the final round on Wednesday and would that still be considered one multi-meet date or is it a date added onto the schedule? Which would then put us over the limit. Please let me know where this continuation of the tourney would be counted.

INTERPRETATION: When a match gets suspended, it is allowable for it to be continued at a later date with the permission of the school administration of the schools involved without adding a date to the schedule. This is due to the match being a continuation of the suspended match.

Singles and double matches should be continued from the point of suspension. The site of the continued meet can be determined by the schools

QUESTION: I just had a teacher in my school come and ask me a question about eligibility that $\ensuremath{\mathrm{I}}$ couldn't find an answer to. He has a daughter playing varsity tennis (we do not have tennis here). He had hired a coach this summer to work on her game. He was wondering if she can continue going to this coach DURING the tennis season. I really couldn't find where that would be a violation. But just to be safe and sure can he still hire a coach to work with his daughter during the tennis season?

INTERPRETATION: WIAA rules would not prevent the student from continuing to receive private instruction. See III-D of WIAA Rules at a Glance.

Having said that, experience shows it is somewhich ought to be done with school/AD/coach understanding and approval. It is not unusual to see more problems arise by continuing the relationship then good come about. E.g., private coach shows up at match and

High School Sports Participation

Not only is participation at an all-time high, this year's increase of 183,006 participants from last year is the largest one-year jump since a rise of 225,168 between the 1994-95 and 1995-96 school years.

"Although we've had increases in participation for 18 consecutive years, a jump of $183,\!000$ makes a strong statement that students want these programs,' Kanaby said. "We must do all we can to keep these programs alive in our nation's high schools. We can demonstrate that participation in athletics and activities helps students succeed in life."

In addition to the overall numbers, the boys participation total of 4,321,103 is the highest participation in the past 29 years. This year's boys participation figure is second only to the record 4,367,442 in 1977-78.

Soccer gained the most female participants in 2006-07 with 16,077, followed by volleyball with 15,798 and cross country with 7,422.

Eleven-player football gained the most participants among boys sports in 2006-07 with 32,773, followed by soccer with 19,064, outdoor track and field with 10,195 and basketball with 9,934.

Basketball remained the most popular sport for girls with 456,967 participants, followed by outdoor track and field (444,181), volleyball (405,832), fast pitch softball (373,448), soccer (337,632), cross country (183,376), tennis (176,696), swimming and diving (143,639), competitive spirit squads (95,177) and golf (66,283).

In boys sports, 11-player football once again topped the list with 1,104,548 participants, followed by basketball (556,269), outdoor track and field (544,180), baseball (477,430), soccer (377,999), wrestling (257,246), cross country (216,085), golf (159,747), tennis (156,944) and swimming and diving (106,738).

Texas held its title as having the most sports participants with 763,967, followed by California (735,497), New York (350,349), Illinois (334,358), Michigan (321,400), Ohio (315,473), Pennsylvania (276,911), New Jersey (247,332), Florida (230,312) and Minnesota (220,241).

The participation survey has been compiled since 1971 by the NFHS through numbers it receives from its member associations. The complete 2006-07 Participation Survey is available on the NFHS Website <www.nfhs.org>.

QUESTION: I was wondering if there is a limit to how many matches you can play in a two day tournament?

INTERPRETATION: WIAA regulations remain silent regarding the number of matches a tennis player is allowed to compete in on a daily basis. USTA regulations limit players to to two matches per day when three set matches are played. This can be extended to three matches per day when a match tiebreaker or modified sets are used. These decisions are to be made by the host school if a meet/tournament is a non-conference event. If it is a conference match or tournament, the conference needs to determine the number of matches per day.

QUESTION: Can a freshmen girls tennis player

report late to the high school team?

INTERPRETATION: Yes, WIAA Sr. High School Handbook, page 37, Section 1, A., 2),

indicates: A student who was a member of a school team in a given sport during the previous year may not delay reporting for the school team beyond the school's official opening day of practice in order to continue nonschool training or competition, except in the fall-sponsored sports of tennis, golf, and swimming and diving, provided the delay does not extend beyond the first interscholas-

QUESTION: Our #2 player was injured and has not played most of the season. She was able to play in more than three matches. Is she eligible to play the #3 position during the WIAA tournament?

INTERPRETATION: Yes, WIAA Season Regulations, page 53, 3., g., (1), indicate: A singles player shall play in a minimum of three singles matches (Flights 1, 2, and 3 only) during the regular season in order to be entered in the subsectional tournament. Coaches have the discretion of placing players in rank order. If opposing coaches object to the rank of a player, an appeal can take place at the coaches seeding meeting. +



INTERPRETATION: The only regulations that I am aware of where equipment for vision is not allowed are those that have electronic measuring equipment installed. Other implements and devices to help improve a person's vision are allowed &



Swimming & Diving Interpretations

Question: We are hosting a swimming meet and the visiting team has divers. We do have a diving board, but what constitutes if that diving board is worthy for use? Who determines if diving should be held? The meet contract indicates that the meet will be a swimming meet

Interpretation: WIAA Fall Season Regulations for Girls Swimming, 15., h., (4), indicates: If a school, however, has a legal facility but is not sponsoring diving because of lack of a coach or athletes, diving must be conducted in meets with schools sponsoring diving and appropriate points for diving forfeited to opponent(s).

Question: What should the temperature of the water be for a swimming and diving meet?

Interpretation: NFHS Rule 2-5-2 indicates: It is recommended that the water temperature be no less than 78 degrees Fahrenheit (26 degrees Celsius) and no more than 82 degrees Fahrenheit (28 degrees Celsius).

Because this is a recommendation, swimming and diving competitions can be held when the water temperature is below or above these temperatures.

Question: Can divers participate in a meet that is just a diving meet?

Interpretation: Yes, however, please keep in mind that WIAA individual participation regulations require that each student-athlete may only compete in 14 meets. If a student-athlete only competes in the diving event of the meet, this does count as one of their 14 allowed competitions. Coaches need to keep record of the number of meets each student-athlete competes in.

Question: How many meets does a diver need to compete in to be eligible for diving in the WIAA sectional meet?

Interpretation: WIAA Season Regulations, 3., c., indicates: A diver must have participated in a minimum of four meets during the current season before she is eligible for entry into sectional diving competition. At least two of the required

four meets must have had a championship format of 11 dives. Note: Exhibition performances will count if verified by a signed official diving

Question: We have 14 meets on our varsity swimming and diving schedule. We were just invited to attend another meet. Can we send a JV team to one of the meets and include this new meet on our schedule?

Interpretation: No, WIAA Season Regulations, 6., Maximum Allowed Meets, a., indicates: The maximum number of meets is 14. This means that the varsity schedule can have no more than 14 meets on it. The addition of this meet would be a violation of WIAA regulations.

more than 14 meets on it. The addition of this meet, would be a violation of WIAA regulations. Sending a JV team to a meet on a varsity schedule does reduce the number of meets on

the varsity schedule.

Question: Are lifeguards required to be on duty
during swimming and diving practices?

during swimming and diving practices?

Interpretation: Yes, Chapter HFS 172 .23 of the Wisconsin Administrative Code requires that lifeguards be on duty during use of any pool with 2,000 square feet or more. Coaches certified as lifeguards have been used by many schools to meet the requirements of this regulation.

Question: Do lifeguards need to be on duty during a swimming and diving competition?

Interpretation: Yes, both Chapter HFS 172.23 and WIAA Season Regulations require a lifeguard(s) to be on duty during a swimming and diving competition. WIAA Season Regulation, 15., State Association Regulations, f., indicates: During competitive meets (swimming and diving) there shall be a lifeguard (minimum age of 16) on duty before the visiting team may enter the pool or diving well and until the last member of the visiting team leaves the pool/well. The lifeguard shall be someone who is not responsible for any other duties during this time.

Question: We are hosting a relay meet for the new conference in two weeks. Originally it was 6 teams and a JV and varsity meet. Therefore, we had

one heat of JV and one of varsity. With 9 teams we would need to go to two heats of JV and two heats of varsity. Which will double the time of the meet, being held during the week. I decided to have each team enter 2 relays (A and B) and use 16 place scoring. This changes the meet a lot as far as scoring goes (not separating JV and varsity), but keeps the time closer. Can you run heats with JV and varsity relays mixed in one heat? Or is this the best solution.

Interpretation: First, understand that this may or may not be a conference matter. If this is a conference meet, the conference needs to determine how the meet should be designed. This may require some input from swimming and diving coaches, followed by conference athletic director/principal approvals.

Sometimes, conference relays are handled as "invitationals" with the host school determining the design of the meet. If this is the case, keep in mind you are able to design it as you wish. If I were the A.D., however, I would include information to visiting schools in the contract sent out. If this hasn't been done this year, please consider doing so in the future so that all teams are familiar with the format right from the time they sign the contract.

they sign the contract.

Obviously, the best way to handle situations like this is to separate the JV meet from the varsity meet. There are events like the 500 free where you may be able to put competitors from the JV competition together with the varsity competitors to save some time.

Question: First meet of the season and already a question about the false start rope. We were at an 8-team relay meet Friday night in Town A and requested (required) that they put up a false start rope. We took some "flak" for it by nearly every one of the 8 teams represented. According to them - it is recommended - not required - as per last year's video. Well, the rule-book definitely states on page 15 (or maybe 18 - I have it highlighted) that a recall rope/device is required. It is a question on this year's test as well as

last years. (It was TRUE last year). More than one coach said that since the new "no recall on a false start" rule went into effect they haven't used their recall rope in 2 years. I don't like to start out a meet with a controversy - so can you reaffirm what I am reading in the rule book? I DID show them my highlighted rule book - but to no avail.

Interpretation: As you can see from NFHS Rule 2-7-4—A recall device or a recall rope shall be required for all swimming events at all meets. Due to concerns and problems with recall ropes, the NFHS and the WIAA have been encouraging use of alternative recall devices now for the past two years. Use of the starting "beep," an air horn, or other means can be used in place of the

recall rope.


Question: Also - a thought for a recommendation to coaches who have swimmers who have a medic alert bracelet. It would be a NICE courtesy if the coach would inform the referee prior to the start of the meet that "Suzi" is swimming in the MR, 200 IM, 100 free and 400 FR and is wearing a medic alert bracelet that is taped to her left wrist (for example). That waywhen I see the tape on a swimmer's wrist I will know I do NOT need to be distracted by writing down on the heat sheet (for MY benefit) what leg of the relay she swam and what lane she was in as the race is in progress and I will not need to take time after the completion of the event to give a possible warning about illegal jewelry. I know it is not required as per rules - just that it be taped on. But it would be a nice courtesy. Also - a great safety factor, too, as if Suzi would experience distress while swimming I would immediately know that it is not, perhaps, just out of shape fatigue but a real possibility of a medical situa-

Interpretation: Having swimmers with medic alert bracelets report to the referee could be viewed as a discriminatory act toward that swimmer. Please keep in mind that it is only

medical alert bracelets that can be taped to the swimmer. As officials review swimmers and divers prior to their competition, this is one of the things an official needs to be looking for along with jewelry, rubber bands, hair re-straints, etc. In this way, officials can be proactive and prevent violations from taking place.

Question: I'm confused. Would you please explain the difference between rule 3-1-2b and rule 3-2-1. Interpretation: NFHS Rule 3-1-2b identifies

the number of team entries each team can have for an event during a meet. Consequently, in 3-1-2b, when a six-lane pool is used, each team gets to put three entries in per individual and

NFHS Rule 3-2-1 identifies the number of individual entries each competitor can compete in during a meet. As indicated this is a maximum of four events, no more than two of which can he individual events.

Question: What is the correct scoring system for a triangle meet. Three teams 2 entries each. The offical insisted that it was 7 5 4 3 2 1 and double for relays. I thought it was either 6 4 3 2 1 and 8 4 2 or 4 3

1 and 6 3 1 for relays. Can you help?

Interpretation: When determining scoring procedures for swimming and diving meets, conference regulations, meet contracts and coaches agreements often times supercede NFHS regulations. If any of the above regulations apply, then it is this language that needs to be followed.

NFHS regulations indicate in Rule 7-1-2ftriangular meets with two or more entries per team per event; scoring shall follow 7-1-3a; only two relay entries per team shall be scored. NFHS Rule 7-1-3a indicates that the scoring should be:

Individual Events (6 places)-7-5-4-3-2-1 Relays—Double the individual points possible for that place.

The use of scoring 6-4-3-2-1-0 that you are thinking of per NFHS Rule 7-1-2b is for triple duals, dual meets or double duals where a maximum of three entries is allowed per team. The use of scoring 6-3-1-0 and 4-3-1-0 per NFHS Rule 7-1-2a is for triple duals, dual meets or double duals where a maximum of two entries per team are allowed.

Question: What is the policy for conducting a swim meet indoors during a thunder/lightning storm?

Interpretation: WIAA and NFHS regulations remain silent regarding policies for indoor swimming and diving meets. When storms may be present for indoor meets, coaches need to provide swimming and diving officials with their school policies as these events are local/conference contests. During the WIAA sport meetings we have encouraged school officials to review information found through the National Weather

Question: Dual confirmation is recommended for all relay exchanges. Most dual meets have two officials

and there is some confusion on the mechanics. 1. Should both officials remain at the start end for dual confirmation?

2. Should an official remain at each end to box in the swimmers as they seperate and to not use dual

Interpretation: In "other meets" where we have two officials, one official has to cover the strokes and turns while the other handles the relay exchange. The official working the stokes and turns should not move away from the turning end as this is one of the most important areas officials must observe during a dual meet. This rule is put in the NFHS rule book presuming qualified turn judges are available. We do not

have that luxury in our school dual meets here in Wisconsin. Consequently, a disqualification of a relay exchange can be determined without dual confirmation during a dual meet.

Question: In a dual girls high school meet, 5 lane pool with 2 officials, in the 400 Free relay, where should the officials be positioned after the start? My concerns deal with being able to dual confirm early starts at the transition of the swimmers. I don't believe the swimmers will not touch the wall, for they are flip turning and want to push off. Not dual confirming take offs was a concern for me.

Interpretation: See response to question

Question: Is there a way for a swimmer like myself to swim in the WIAA Championships without my high school having a swim team and if there is a way how would I go about qualify for the meet?

Interpretation: WIAA membership rules as determined by the 500 plus public and religious/private schools indicates in the WIAA Sr. High School Handbook, Rules of Eligibility, Article II. Section 1. A., indicate—A full time student. whether an adult or not, is eligible for varsity interscholastic competition only at the school within whose attendance boundaries his/her parents reside, within a given school district. This means that, in your situation, you are eligible to practice and compete on teams provided and approved at Praire du Chien High School for WIAA regular and tournament series. Unfortunately, swimming and diving is not one of the sports provided for at PDCHS.

If your community has USA Swimming or YMCA Swimming programs, you are able to join one of these programs for their competitive programs. Should a neighboring community offer similar non-school opportunities, these programs are also available to you.

Question: I thought I saw in the rules last year where a team was allowed as many "exhibition" swimmers as they wanted as long as both coaches agreed to it. What IS the rule? Can we or can we not have unlimited (within reason, of course) exhibitions by prior mutual consent?

Interpretation: Before responding directly to your questions, let's take a careful look at the WIAA language regarding exhibition swims and dives. The language for exhibition opportunities is found on page 39 of the Fall Season Regulations. Here it indicates, there must be prior mutual agreement among the involved schools facilitated prior to the day of the meet. Officials need to be informed prior to the day of the meet. Most importantly, the number of individual exhibition entries in an event should not exceed the maximum allowed for the meet and exhibition performances should not adversely affect the length of the meet. This means that if a school is allowed three entries per individual event, the maximum allowed for exhibition is three.


Now, the number of exhibition entries can be increased; however, it is vital that host schools obtain approval from visiting schools and from the officials well in advance. All too often other schools and officials are not informed and these additional entries are brought to their attention just prior to the start of the meet. This causes numerous problems and often times, very unhappy coaches and/or officials, not to mention spectators. Use of the contract between schools and officials can be the communication device to help identify these exhibition entries well in advance of the meet when emotions do not run quite as high. +

Volleyball Questions & Answers

The WIAA has received reports that coaches are standing along the sideline to coach while the ball is in play. In Vol. 1 of the Q & A's it was explained that coaches are to be near their respective benches when the ball is in play. Coaches who stand along the sideline are interfering with the line judges and umpires ability to clearly see out-of-bounds plays and hinder the communication between the line judge and the umpire. Officials should address this issue during the pre-match conference and may warn coaches if they are impacting sightlines. A yellow card may be issued if they persist.

Question 1: With regards to the new rule allowing coaches to stand during play, may the coach stand behind the bench?

Answer: No. Although Wisconsin is experimenting with standing during both live and dead ball, Rule 12-2-6 which states "...may stand in the libero replacement zone...to coach his or her players..." is still being followed. This would be interpreted to mean in front of the bench.

Question 2: Are there any rules prohibiting ball handling of any kind prior to timed warm-ups for regular season/tournament play?

Answer: Because the warm-up protocol is for 20 minutes, it is implied that no ball handling would occur prior to the official 20-minute segment. The Volleyball Coaches Advisory Committee has discussed some type of penalty for violation but felt there were too many additional problems that would need to be addressed; who is responsible for supervision, time limit prior to competition, penalty, among others. Schools are expected to follow the rule and police themselves.

Question 3: Are board shorts allowed?

Answer: Yes, provided Rule 4-2-1b (no buttons, zipper, snaps, fasteners, etc.) is followed.

Question 4: Are players allowed to warm-up in different shirts prior to the game or must they warm-up in their game increase.

Answer: There is not a rule that would prohibit wearing a different shirt/t-shirt for warm-ups. Coaches should keep in mind that the NFHS does prohibit changing shirts/jerseys in the playing/bench area. Athletes should use a locker room for changing both before and after the match.

Question 5: Is there a specific roster limit for the regular season? WIAA tournament season?

Answer: During the regular season there is not a limit as to roster size. Each school or conference may set their own limits. During the WIAA tournament the maximum number of eligible players in uniform is 15 with a maximum of 20 bench personnel. You would be allowed, for example, to have 12 players in uniform and 8 other bench personnel (coaches, managers, statisticians, etc.).

Question 6: What is the penalty if the coach interferes with play while standing in front of his/her bench in the libero replacement zone?

Answer: Rule 2-3-1e; "The ball is out-of-bounds and becomes dead when it: Touches a nonplayer who is not interfering with a player's legitimate effort to play the ball." If the coach assists his/her player Rule 2-4-1b is applied; loss of rally/point to the opponent.

Question 7: What is the penalty if the coach, when stand-

ing to coach his players, comes into the substitution zone?

Answer: Rule 12-2-6, Penalty: "Unsporting conduct; a) warning (yellow card) for first minor offense, b) unsporting penalty (red card) for first flagrant offense, second serious offense; or third minor offense and loss of rally/point award to opponent." Also results in loss of privilege to stand and coach.

Question 8: Does the new hair control rule for Wisconsin allow for the scrunchie with 20 or 30 little ribbons tied around the scrunchie? May they have as many hair control devices as they want?

Answer: Legal unless you determine that the hair control device is dangerous (pieces falling out/off), too long to be safe or does not meet the provision of

Question 9: May a team be announced as one unit? (In-

troducing East High School Volleyball...)?

Answer: No. While it is understood that their are times when a coach is attempting to develop more of a team concept the traditional introductions and prematch protocol should be followed as per WIAA Volleyball Season Regulations, page 62.

Question 10: Our team wears black spandex. We have 2 players who would prefer to wear the traditional boxer style shorts. Is this allowed?

Answer: Yes. Case Book, 4-2-1, Sit. A; "Uniforms on Team A are alike except; d) Style. Ruling: Legal."

Question 11: If JV players are shagging balls during

warm-up must they conform to the no jewelry rule?

Answer: From the NFHS office; The ban on jewelry only applies to players on the roster eligible to play

in that game."

Question 12: Is it legal to wear different logos on uniform shorts (Mizuno vs Nike)?

Answer: Legal provided Rule 4-2-9 is followed.

Question 13: Where can I find information on statistics?

Answer: NFHS Rule Book, page 55 has definitions of key stats.

Question 14: Where can I order scorebooks?

Answer: The NFHS sells scorebooks. See pages 77

and 78 of the NFHS Rule Book for information.

Question 15: Is it permissible for an official to wear black shoes with white socks?

Answer: The correct uniform would be black shoes and black socks with black pants or white shoes and white socks with black shorts. You may also wear black shoes and black socks with shorts.

Question 16: Could you clarify the rule on foot violations with the center line?

Answer: Rule 9-5-7; "A player may touch the floor across the center line with one or both feet/hands provided a part of the foot/feet or hand(s) remains on or above the center line. Contacting the floor across the center line with any other part of the body is illegal."

Question 17: With the new rule of the libero serving....could a libero serve every single time? A libero could serve one point, sub out and the player serve one point and sub back in and serve another point? Libero can sub in and out to serve every rotation? If she is serving she doesn't have to wait for a dead ball?

Answer: When a libero and a player exchange places it's called a replacement not a substitution. A libero may serve only in one place in the serving order. If she serves in position #2 that is the only position she may serve in for that particular game. The libero and the player she replaces may alternate serving. If the libero is already on the court, in the game, she does not need to leave for one deadball if she is the next scheduled server. If she is not serving then she will need to be out for one deadball.

Question 18: At what point is the starting game line-up considered official and unchangeable? For example; the coach submits the roster, which is required 10 minutes before the match begins. Along with the roster she/he submits the starting line-up. The coach then wants to change the line-up, can she/he do so before the 2 minute deadline?

Answer: As per rule 7-1-2; " ...the written line-up shall not be changed except to replace a starting player who is injured/ill prior to the start of the match...."

Question 19: Team A placed their 3 tallest players at the net and in very close proximity. The serve sailed over their heads and Team B's RB had a difficult time seeing the serve as she reacted very late to the serve. The captain of Team B asked us to have the 3 girls put

their hands down so they could react to the serve. I, acting as the umpire, went to the middle of the court and asked the girls to put their arms down to prevent a possible screen. Was this the correct call?

Answer: Without observing the actual play it is difficult to give an exact answer. Please refer to Rule 6-4-1, also Case Book 6-4-1a & b. Comment: "No player on the receiving team is entitled to a specific position on the floor. If a player on the receiving team cannot see the server, that player should move. If, after that player moves, the serving team's player moves to take another position which blocks that player's view of the server, the referee shall call screening."

Question 20: If Unnecessary Delay is called and a time-out is charged does the offending team receive the entire 60 seconds they would normally receive?


Answer: Yes. Rule 11-1-1; "Charged time-outs are those requested by a team or charged to a team by the referee or umpire." No restrictions on the length because of the Unnecessary Delay call.

Question 21: Team A serves the ball which is misplayed by Team B and goes out-of-bounds. Both the umpire and scorekeeper discover that Team A's server is out of service order and was the wrong server. The umpire realized that the wrong server was about to serve. Should he/she have whistled the play dead prior to the contact of the ball? Team A's coach was upset and exhibited poor behavior claiming that the umpire should have noticed the wrong server was at the line. Should she have been carded?

Answer: Preventative officiating is always preferred but the ultimate responsibility rests with the athletes and their coach. In this case, if the umpire felt he/she was aware and certain of the incorrect server in time to make the correction it would be appropriate. If uncertain or the signal to serve

has been given by the referee, the umpire, along with input from the scorer, should make the call. Coaches should be penalized for improper behavior.

Question 22: At our most recent game, the officials allowed only 1 player to be present at the captains/coaches/officials meeting prior to the game. Is this correct?

Answer: Rule 1-6-3; "...shall be conducted with the head coach and the captain from each team." This is in place to reinforce that there is one floor captain for each team and to familiarize the officials with the captain.

Question 23: Would you call breaking the plane on Team A if Team B had contacted the ball once and it appeared to be an overpass and Team A hit it down (not allowing the ball to break the plane) even though Team B was not even attempting to make a play on the second ball?

Answer: Its difficult to comment on plays that I have not observed myself but I believe from the description you have given that Rule 9-6-3 would be applied. "A player shall not contact a ball which is completely on the opponent's side of the net unless the contact is a legal block." You described an attack not a block.

Question 24: Official called "illegal contact" several times on our attempts to play a hard driven attack; sometimes, just making minimal contact with one hand, but getting the ball up to play. I am talking about using their hands, even beach sets, etc., on defending hard attacks.

Answer: What you may see as minimal contact, officials may see as prolonged contact. During a time-out or between games you could ask the officials if they are calling prolonged contact; this is always illegal. Multiple contact is allowed on first contacts. This is a judgment call.

Question 25: If a team is wearing royal blue uniforms with red numbers can the libero wear a light blue uniform with white num-

bers? To me this is in no way a contrasting color and yet the libero was allowed to play in a match.

Answer: Questions regarding jersey colors are usually handled by requesting a digital photo of the two jerseys so that I can actually see the colors in question.

Question 26: Is it a possible illegal alignment for the center back to be the closest person to the net, the center front or the right front to be the farthest from the net?

Answer: As per Rule 6-3-3b; alignment applies to corresponding back-row player. Therefore illegal alignment would not apply to the CB and RF. For the CF & CB: "The front player shall have at least part of one foot touching the floor closer to the center line than both feet of the corresponding back-row player."

Question 27: I know that the rules state that all players must be properly attired both for the match as well as during warm-ups. What about the coaches? Do they also have to be free of any and all jew-

Answer: No. Rule 4-1-6 applies only to players on the roster.

Question 28: Can a player run between the scorer's table and the benches to play a ball?

Answer: The area between the scorer's table and the benches is not a playable area. If the player contacted the ball while in contact with a playable area and then followed through into the non-playable area it would be legal. (Rule 2-

Question 29: I know that the scorer's table is a non-playable area, however my question is; if after a player makes contact with the ball first is he then allowed to contact the scorer's table?

Answer: Rule 2-4-1b; "The officials shall stop play when: A players gains an illegal advantage by contacting any floor obstacle (team benches, officials' table, bleachers, etc.) wall or

another player." See also the Case Book; 2-4-2, Sit. A. This will be a judgment call by the official as to whether an advantage has been gained or not.

Question 30: Can a player be on the roster for JV and varsity? Is there a limit as to how many games the student may play?

Answer: From the WIAA Volleyball Season Regulations: b. "It is strongly recommended that a student participate at only one level (varsity or nonvarsity) on the same day." c. "A student who participates at multiple levels on the same day may not play in more than the equivalent of five games if the varsity match is a three-out-of-five game match."

Question 31: Is it allowable for the coach to pace the length of the bench while the ball is in play as long as they are in the libero replacement zone?

Answer: Legal. Our experimental rule does not prohibit this.

Question 32: Is a line judge responsible or do they have the authority to make a call as to whether the ball hit the ground or not on a hard serve or spike? Can an official change their call because a line judge ruled it hit the ground?

Answer: Rule 5-8-3a-f does not include this responsibility.

Question 33: Is it legal for girls to stretch their arms with a partner using volleyballs (such as bouncing the ball to each other) prior to the official twenty-minute game warm-up time?

Answer: Players are prohibited from using a ball in any manner prior to the 20-minute warm-up period.

Question 34: Is it acceptable for an official to wear their shirts outside of the slacks?

Answer: Officials should keep their shirts tucked

in. Definitely a more professional look.
Question 35: Is the libero allowed to attack the ball behind the attack line if the ball is lower than the height

of the net?

Answer: Rule 9-5-6; "A libero shall not: a) complete an attack from anywhere if, at the moment of

contact, the ball is entirely above the height of the net."

Question 36: Where in the Rule Book does it state the correct procedures for flipping the coin? I believe that you

it to the captain.

Answer: The correct procedure is to only flip the coin in the air. You would not repeat the process after catching the coin. Page 57 of the Case

Book/Manual.Question 37: Can a player have ribbons attached to their shoes during warm-ups and or competition?

Answer: If the ribbons are decorative and do not serve a function (used in place of laces) they would be illegal. (Rule 4-1-6)

Question 38: After the referee has blown the whistle and motioned for the server to begin the serve, the server throws the ball in the air, but does not complete the serve. Before the referee motions for the re-serve, the coach notices an improper serving order and has the proper server pick up the ball to serve. What is the correct ruling?

Answer: Rule 8-1-5; "A re-serve is considered to be a part of a single attempt to serve. ...no requests, e.g. Time-out, serve order, lineup substitution, libero replacement, etc., may be recognized until after the ball has been served." Penalty: Loss of rally/point.

Question 39: Please review the new procedure/sequence for indicating a point.

Answer: Official's mechanics, Signal #17 Point.

1. Whistle 2. Signal violation 3. Point mechanic (Indicate point by extending the arm in the direction of the team that will serve next, palm perpendicular to the floor). Officials should scan the bench area and make eye contact with their partner prior to signaling for serve.

Question 40: Please review Rule 9-4-8b (multiple contacts) and when this is allowed.

Answer: Rule 9-4-8b; "Multiple contacts are more than one contact by a player during one attempt to play the ball. Multiple contacts are permitted only: b) On any first team hit, whether or not the ball is touched by the block. See also Case Book; 9-4-8A-E. Officials are reminded that the multiple contact is only allowed on the first contact not second and/or third contacts. Prolonged contact is always illegal.

Question 41: Do officials have to adhere to the no jew-

Answer: From Joan Gralla, Official's Department: "No. As long as it is not excessive jewelry it is permitted."


Question 42: Can a team run around the entire gym as both teams enter the court?

Answer: Legal. There is not an NFHS or WIAA rule that would prohibit this.

Ougstion 43: May officials wear white shoes and white

Question 43: May officials wear white shoes and white socks with black pants?

Answer: From the WIAA Guide for Sports Officials; black shorts with white shoes and white socks. It is intended that when wearing black pants the NFHS Rules will be followed. Rule 5-2-1c; "Solid black athletic shoes and black socks." ÷



Football Questions & Answers

Q.: About the new 2 yard line all the way around field - both fields I worked so far this year did not have the line on the field. Am I to tell game management that they need that? Or, to let WIAA know witch fields they are?

A.: You should do - BOTH. Let contest administration know field is not legally marked and let me know in order that we may follow up with the member and seek clarification of their circumstance.

Q.: In regards to the 6 foot restraining line all the way around the field: 1. On the end lines too? 2. Is it permissible to just paint a solid line all the way around rather than a broken line? When we went to the suggestion of keeping the chains 6 feet off the sideline I had my guys paint a solid line on that side of the field, so the chain guys have a straight line to set up on and it gives a better point of reference for the referee when "eye-balling" a first down decision. Can they just paint a solid line now - it would make it much easier for them, especially when it comes to re-painting each week - so they don't have to worry about hitting the dashes each time.

A.: Yes, include the end lines. We would likely not see an enormous problem with your proposal so long as the line would be distinctly different — perhaps in color and/or some other manner (width?). In order that it be less likely it could ever be confused/mistaken for solid sideline of field. The 'fundamental' here is safety related, i.e., keep the 2-yds. around the field clear. A solid line provides a visual barrier / separation and could do that as effectively as a dashed line. On this one I am more interested in the end result - a clear, set-back/buffer area being assured/pro-

Q.: Regarding Rule 1-2-3d (restraining line), an area head coach told me after the meeting that they just finished installing their new artificial turf field last week. They didn't include the $4^{\prime\prime}$ wide broken restraining line around the outside of the field. He said they do have the soccer field marked as well, which has a yellow line located approximately 3-yards outside the football field. This is a solid line. To add the restraining line for football would of course be quite difficult at this point. He was going to discuss this with his school administrators today. You may receive a call to see if the yellow soccer line is acceptable. Your thoughts?

A.: WIAA Position: Field modifications of this sort, to turf fields is an involved/costly process. Would be unreasonable in my opinion to require retro-fit. Mr. Chickering agrees. Schools will be allowed wide administrative range to address the essence of the new rule as best as they are able. E.g. In some settings a PA will remind media and/or others of set-back. Schools may use other existing lines which might approximate 2 yd. belt. Some may choose to use diluted water base white, for playoff games..e.g. We will be open to other ideas and inquiries that members might bring to us. Bottom line: An other-wise legal field will not be considered 'illegal' and/or not able to host WIAA playoff contests as a result of not having this setback line. Just keep the apx. 2-yd. area, clear.
Q.: Is there any mention in the football book in regards to

placing bleachers along the end zone of the field? I can't access the football rules and regulations for some reason and thought I would check with you before we do any moving of bleachers

A.: The National Federation playing rules are silent on this question. By and large, seat locations are left to each school. About the only perspective that could come into play would be if low-level, end zone seats were used in/for counting purposes in order to make the 1000 for approved site status and ability to host in the playoffs. We would likely hear concerns about that. Also, be certain that if you place seats there, keep them back far enough so that an athlete running a long pass play and looking back - would not collide. And that officials have an abundance of clearance to cover this sort of play as well as FG's.

Q.: I was working a lower level game, when I noticed Under Armor chin straps on Riddell helmets. It appeared that the chin strap was a complete unit made by Under Armor. Is the chin strap legal equipment?

A.: As described , I would say, 'sure, not a problem.' Provided it is a 4-point strap and otherwise unaltered/unadorned - and would be seen as a 'legal' chin strap so long as it was properly worn. While I have admittedly been conservative in the interpretation of how helmets (especially) are worn, I have not gone so far as requiring only Riddell straps be worn on Riddell helmets, Bike chin straps on Bike, Schutt on Schutt, Adams on Adams, e.g. - only and

exclusively. Q.: Are chin strap covers legal to use?

A.: My interpretation continues to be, 'no.' A chin strap is required equipment. Required equipment, by rule must be worn as designed/intended and unaltered. You can purchase chin straps that are manufactured to be more ab-

sorbent, more protective, etc.
Q.: Prior to a game last week, an official approached an assistant coach and told them a player(s) could not play because they were not properly equipped. They are wearing knee pads similar to the ones worn by volleyball players. Coach feels they do a better job protecting the knee because they do not move when a player hits the ground. With the regular knee pad/pants configuration, when a player hits the ground or another player, the pants 'ride up' and expose the knee. Where the question comes in, is that the official told the assistant coach, "Dave Anderson from the WIAA said at a rules meeting that the knee pads have to be in a pocket in the pants." With that being said, Rule 1-5-1d says, "Knee pads worn over the knee and under the pants and at least 1/2 inch thick or 3/8 inch thick if made of an approved shock absorbing material." Rule 1-5-1e states, "Pants which cover the knees and knee pads." If you could let me know your thoughts we would appreciate it. Coach thinks he will have the same officials officiating one of his games in the future and would need some type of rule support so that his kids can play. His next game is scheduled for next week.

A.: I do not recall making that statement. First I have heard - either of the rule/interpretation - or it being attributed to me. If I did, I will accept responsibility for having provided an incorrect interpretation. As your rule reference makes clear, there is no text within current rule which require a traditional/in the pocket knee pad.

Q.: We had a scrimmage and noticed during the warm-ups a player had a special, clear mouth guard. He informed us that his dentist has prescribed him this mouth guard and the manufacturer does not have one made of color available. The coach has docu-

mentation from the dentist that the player needs this special mouth protector and using any other tooth/mouth protector would jeopardize the dental work he is doing. The rule (1-5-2f1i2) is very clear. At the annual meeting it was very clear. Does common sense prevail here or are we steadfast to this rule?

A.: As you have done - advise coach and contest administrator of rule. If the equipment is otherwise legal let student play..report to us. But make no mistake - this is an 'athlete well-being provision." Rules that are intended to 'protect kids'... Should not be taken casually. Must advise student to speak with dentist and see if soaking protector in food coloring or any other safe agent - or other strategy could get the protector in compliance. Ironically much of this rule came as a result of dental professionals arguing/lobbying that the former rule allowed kids to be inadequately protected and get away with it. My understanding and to the best of my knowledge, there is no reason the protector can not be made in a color(s) to comply with the National rules. In good conscience we must direct the student to seek all avenues of getting this piece of required equipment to conform to rule.

Q.: One of our players has a medical condition which makes him sensitive to direct sunlight and was wondering if he could where a tinted visor on his helmet. I advised him to get a note from his doctor explaining his needs, while I asked you guys what was legal and illegal equipment and if exemptions exist. So I guess this is basically a heads up message until we find out what specifically the doctor says. With the Dr. explanation will this be possible?

A.: "No - not in competition. In order to be legal equipment, eye shields must be "molded, rigid and 100% clear. (NF Rule 1-5-3n. Page 20) Technically – rules govern competition – thus you could allow the student to wear a tinted shield in practice if you wish (not recommended). Otherwise, it IS legal for the student to wear tinted sport glasses/goggles UNDER a 100% clear shield (glasses/goggles can be removed with a needle nose pliers, allowing for an eye exam w/out need to cut off face mask/helmet from unconscious

Q.: I did some searching for our coach and couldn't find the specifics for him. We had a very supportive father of a football player pass away last

year and our coach was thinking of doing a commemorative vinyl stick on with his initials for the helmet. Can you email me where I can find the rules on the specifications for acceptable sticker size and color.

A.: While the WIAA and National Federation have some specific rules regulating what can be put on a jersey, (we subscribe to the 'clean shirt' rule) there are no rule specifics, WIAA or NF, for this. You could embroider initials or numerals on your socks, or hip of your pants for example. Regarding helmet decals of this type, typically you will find most commemorative patches/stickers of this type to be somewhere between 3/4's of an inch to maybe as tall as inch and a quarter. Call a provider/manufacturer and see what they do most. There are no rules for color, most memorial stickers are

Q.: Our football coach was approached by some players about purchasing a long sleeve undershirt for the football season. Not all players would be purchasing these shirts (voluntary). The question is regarding the color of the sleeves. The item in question is a long sleeve undershirt, with different colored sleeves (one sleeve white, one sleeve purple). Would the different colored sleeved undershirt be legal?

A.: So long as undergarment is not sticky/tacky or slippery – or 'ball colored.' I don't see anything in NF text that would prohibit sleeves of two different colors. I ran this past two veteran white hats and they concurred.

Q.: Question: Regarding Rule 1-2-3g and 9-8-3, one coach said you told him he could have a trainer(s) and statistician(s) in the coaches box during a game. Rule 1-2-3g says they should be in the team box. Rule 9-8-3 says a maximum of three coaches may be in the coaches' area. We have not allowed trainers or statisticians in the coaches box in the past. They have to be in the team box when between the 25-yard lines. And as we discussed, they can be outside the team box but behind the restraining line. Please let me know how you would like this enforced.

A.: We had a sideline issue or two related to this. As I recall, medical support was not cooperating or had a disagreement with the wing official about standing on, too near, or across the side line. Can't recall for sure how this one started. And another in-



stance where the medical crew were believed to be signaling down and distance back to the coaches. My response at the time was - keep them in the team/coach box area. Admittedly, a knee-jerk. I brought the matter to our Medical Advisory this past May - They strongly supported allowing team medical staff to follow the ball - I respect and support the wisdom of our SMAC . 2-3

Medical team members may be allowed to follow the ball...but they are to be outside the 2-yd. restraint belt...and only engagement to be observing players...not incorporated into 'scouting.' Same with media/cameras, et.al.

O.: I question the correct answer listed for Question 85. There are two instances where the ball may not be advanced following a scrimmage kick. First a try may never be advanced, and second the kick may not be advanced by R if anyone on R has given a fair catch signal. Both circumstances are listed as exceptions in 6-2-2.

I say it does because the succeeding spot is the 10-yard line of the overtime. You can also see the text at the bottom of page 90 in the rule book.

Q.: For officials crew that wear shorts, do they wear black stripe socks?

A.: One-piece stockings (with the modified "Northwestern stripe": 1/2-inch white, 1/2-inch black. 1-inch white, 1/2-inch black, 1/2-inch white -- as opposed to the NFL sox) should be worn even if white shorts are worn by the entire officiating crew. (Officials' Manual, page 9-10.)

REMINDER - NATIONAL FEDERATION ALLOWED ADAPTATIONS

The following rule regarding the use of run-

ning time must be used:

After the first half any time the score differential reaches 35 points or more, beginning with the ensuing kickoff the following changes, and only these changes, will be made regarding rules determining when the clock will and will not be stopped.

will run continuously except for the following situations when it will be stopped:

- (a) Time outs charged to a team.

- (e) Any time officials determine it is necessary for safety reasons.

Note: 1) Normal clock operating procedures resume when a team scores to make the differential less than 35 points. 2) The use of this rule does not preclude the use of Rule 3-1-3 which reads: "A period or periods may be shortened in any emergency by agreement of the opposing coaches and the referee. By mutual agreement of the opposing coaches and the referee any remaining periods may be shortened at any time or the game may be terminated." +

Cross Country Questions & Answers

Please note that once again this year the Cross Country Sectionals, which may be held on Saturday (Oct. 20) will conflict with the WSMA State Marching Band Championships. Question 1: Is it legal for runners to hold hands during a race or when finishing?

Answer: Illegal. Last fall when this occurred in a race the officials did not disqualify the runners as they did not feel the runner received assistance as described in Rules 9-7-2 & 4. The NFHS office was contacted at that time and they agreed with the interpretation. Since that original interpretation the NFHS has notified the WIAA that grasping hands at any time is illegal. Rationale: Officials should not be held responsible for judging intent.

Question 2: I recently officiated a meet where an had a religious bracelet taned to their wrist this legal?

Answer: Illegal. Rule 9-6-7b; "Religious medals are not considered iewelry and must be worn under the uniform and taped to the body."

Ouestion 3: Our conference meet will run and score 8 runners. Do we need special permission?

Answer: Yes. Since Rule 9-2-2 states that only 7 team members retain their order of finish the WIAA will provide a waiver for meets wishing to score 8 team members. Hosts must contact the WIAA office to request a waiver.

Question 4: A member of my team wishes to participate in a fun run/walk during the cross country season. Is this allowed?

Answer: A cross country athlete may only walk in a fun run during the cross country season.

Please impress on this athlete that at no time should he/she jog or break into a run. The athlete jeopardizes their eligibility if they participate in an out of school running competition during the sea-

Question 5: We are participating in the Roy Griak Invitational later this month. Do we need special permis-

Answer: Yes. Your athletic director should contact Dave Anderson and request permission to participate in this out of state event. Please review the Senior High Handbook, page 27, for details.

Question 6: We can only afford to have chips on one shoe of each competitor in our meet. Is this legal?

Answer: Legal for timing, but not acceptable to determine all finishes. Rule 9-3-3 requires chips on both shoes so that the chips determine the finish not the torso. When using only one chip the torso determines the finish. Therefore, an official must be positioned at the finish line to determine the order of finish. The chip is then used to record the In some close finishes a review of may be needed for accuracy.

Question 7: One of my athletes was found wearing iewelry during a race. How is this administered?

Answer: The meet referee should contact the athlete and the head coach at the meet and issue a warning. Then the meet referee fills out a jewelry violation form found on the Official's Center and submits it to the WIAA. The WIAA contacts the offending athlete's school and informs them that if a violation occurs in the next scheduled competition the athlete will be disqualified. WIAA staff then contacts the meet referee at the next scheduled competition and provides them the name of the athlete and their school, informing them that if this athlete violates the no jewelry rule they will be disqualified. (3 violations so far this season!). +

EDITORIAL

Internet Streaming Eyes High School Sports Market

We could see it coming on the horizon awhile back with the advent of digital images and their interaction and potential with computer technology.

Today, the digital video and webstreaming era is upon us, introduced by the WIAA's launching of wiaa.tv earlier this year that brought high school sports enthusiasts live coverage of State Tournaments through their desktop and laptop computers.

The new-age media has exploded on the scene recently and, based on initial dialog at recent Area Meetings, member schools are engaged in discussions about the issues pertaining to the new media strategy and those hoping to capitalize on this technological opportunity.

With internet streaming technology improving at light speed, it was only a matter of time before opportunities would avail themselves--enter Prepsonthenet.com. The site is creating quite a stir around the state in its efforts to deliver live streaming of regular-season high school contests to schools and subscribers of the service. While streaming of video on the internet is no longer a new concept, the Prepsonthenet.com approach and blueprint has gained local, state and national atten-

Questions and concerns have surfaced regarding the WIAA's involvement, the process and the techniques used by representatives of Prepsonthenet.com when introducing the program.

Following a meeting with the leadership of Prepsonthenet.com and having reviewed their strategic plan, we determined their desire to work with member schools did not conflict or infringe on any existing agreements the Association has with existing media partners for post-season tournament media rights. The policies the WIAA has in piace regarding media coverage has tradi tionally been reserved for tournament

From those initial meetings, we also established Prepsonthenet.com had a legitimate interest in providing financial assistance for athletic programs through a percentage of subscription fees and through an additional advertising option.

The WIAA is interested in introducing opportunities that could possibly financially assist all member schools maintain strong and viable athletic programs within the

philosophical framework of interscholastic activities. This interest was elevated further following comments at the membership's Annual Meeting a couple of years ago. A representative from a member school declared we should seek additional financial opportunities for schools. With this as an incentive we permitted the use of the WIAA logo to facilitate an initial introduction for schools to Prepsonthenet.com, and to forward the acknowledgement that we have met with their leadership and found no particular reason to obstruct dialog and negotiations with member schools.

It was made clear during its initial meetings with Prepsonthenet.com that the WIAA would not endorse nor denounce a program that has little or no involvement with the administration or content of the program. WIAA's neutrality would permit this program to succeed or fail on its own merits with decisions made by local school administration. The WIAA emailed athletic directors in the entire membership in June stating the WIAA's position on the venture with notification a representative from the company will be contacting the school.

Unfortunately, early in their contacting of schools, Prepsonthenet.com indicated an endorsement by the WIAA, which has caused some consternation with a number of our member schools. However, when we addressed the concern, Prepsonthenet.com promptly made the changes to their marketing language.

A silver lining of the issue becoming a hot topic is a general awareness of what to expect in the not-too-distant future. Recently, others have surfaced interested in streaming high school events with no financial benefit to schools associated with them.

More evidence of the transition on how collect our information today and will tomorrow is clearly evident on the websites of traditional media--newspapers, radio and television. Each are developing methods to ensure their niche on the web-streaming highway.

For the immediate future, the new-aged media prospects will continue to increase. It's presence in the media marketplace can evolve by applying existing rationale and guidelines consistent with traditional media practices. In the meantime, stay tuned for further developments. +
