Fall Team Sportsmanship Award Winners Selected

STEVENS POINT, Wis. – The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association, in cooperation with Rural Mutual Insurance Company, has selected the team Sportsmanship Award winners for the 2008 Fall Championships.

The winners of the prestigious award are Edgar in football, Notre Dame in girls team tennis, Wisconsin Heights in girls volleyball, Marquette in boys volleyball and Columbus in boys soccer.

It is the second time Edgar has won the Sportsmanship Award in football. The Wildcats also received the honor in 1998. Stratford defeated Edgar 7-3 in the State Division 7 championship final last month. Receiving honorable mention for the award in football were Colby, Kimberly, Reedsburg, and the Wautoma/Faith Christian co-op program.

The sportsmanship efforts of Notre Dame at the Girls State Team Tennis Tournament earned the school its third Sportsmanship Award overall and its first in girls tennis. The Tritons other recognition came in girls soccer in 2002 and in boys soccer last year. Notre Dame defeated University School, 5-2, in the title game to win the Division 2 championship. Marshfield and University School received honorable mention for the award.

The positive community and student support Wisconsin Heights received at the State Girls Volleyball Championships earned the Vanguards their first sportsmanship award in any sport. They won the Division 3 championship this fall, defeating Shoreland Lutheran in the semifinal and Grantsburg in the title match. Receiving honorable mention for the award are Brodhead, D.C. Everest, Grantsburg, Manitowoc Lincoln, Newman Catholic, Potosi, Rosholt and Waupun.

Marquette earns its second sportsmanship recognition in boys volleyball and its fourth overall. The Hilltoppers also received the honor for boys volleyball in 2002, for summer baseball award in 2006 and for boys tennis in 2008. They won the State title with a three-game sweep of Nicolet in the title match. Honorable mention for the award went to Middleton and Kaukauna

Columbus is the selection for the sportsmanship award at the Boys State Soccer Tournament. It is the second sportsmanship award presented to the Cardinals. They also received the honor in boys basketball in 1992. Columbus defeated McDonell Central/Regis, 3-2, in the title game to win the Division 3 championship. Madison West, McDonell/Regis and New Holstein received honorable mention for the award.

The WIAA/Rural Insurance Sportsmanship Award is presented to one school and community in each of the State team tournaments that exemplifies outstanding sportsmanship. Award winners are determined by the conduct and sportsmanship displayed by athletes, coaches, cheer and support groups, mascots, bands and spectators. Additional consideration is given for the effort of school administrators and chaperones to insure support for their teams are positive and that the highest ideals of sportsmanship are upheld.

Award winners receive a plaque and banner in recognition of the honor. Schools receiving honorable mention are acknowledged with a certificate of recognition. The selection process includes contributions and evaluations from contest officials, tournament management, police and security personnel, crowd control and ushers, WIAA staff members, and area hotels and restaurants on occasion. ÷

Middle Level Council Openings

Openings on the Middle Level Advisory Council still exist in the following positions for the 2008-09 school year. District 1 representative, District 6 representative, Ethnic At-Large representative and Non-Public School At-Large representative.

The Middle Level Council includes a representative from each Board of Control District, an ethnic at-large, gender at-large, and a non-public school at-large representative along with liaison representation made available to the Department of Public Instruction, Wisconsin Association of Middle Level Educators, Wisconsin Athletic Directors Association and the Wisconsin Athletic Trainers Association.

For the Ethnic At-Large position the candidate would have to have origins in black racial groups of Africa; Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race; Asian; Pacific Islander: American Indian; or Alaskan Native.

Membership on the Council is open to administrators, or building administrators and/or athletic directors of WIAA

member middle level schools containing Grades 6-8 students (or any combination thereof).

An election does not take place for Middle Level Council representatives. A listing of interested candidates is pro-

vided to the Board of Control who then appoints an individual to fill the position. The position is for a three-year term.

Swimming & Diving Question Interpretations

Amateur Status Regulations

Question: Can a swimmer purchase a new high-tech suit for a discounted price?

Interpretation: No, WIAA Amateur Status regulations, B., 3) indicates: "A student shall be determined to be in violation if he/she: Receives compensation or benefit, directly or indirectly, for the use of name, picture, and/or personal appearance, as an athlete. This includes but is not limited to: receiving free and/or reduced rates on equipment, apparel, camps/clinics/instruction and competitive opportunities that are not identical for all other participants."

Simply put, a swimmer jeopardizes their high school eligibility if he/she purchases any swimming suit at a discounted price.

Question: Can a coach purchase high-tech swimming suits using funds from his/her budget for the school team at discounted prices?

Interpretation: Yes, school administrators and coaches have a duty to their school to find the best prices possible for apparel and other purchases. Once purchased by the school, the school has responsibility for the swimming suits and can distribute them as they wish.

Question: Can a school team have a fundraiser that raises money to purchase high-tech swimming suits?

Interpretation: Yes, there is a way that fundraisers can be used to raise money for the purchase of swimming suits, equipment or for other purposes. The key to these purchases is that money must be donated to the school program and the

school can then purchase the suits or other items.

Every school has or should have a gift acceptance policy for receiving donations from the community. Utilize this process in accepting donations of any kind prior to using the donation.

Question: Can a booster club purchase high-tech swimming suits for a school team?

Interpretation: No, a booster club may not purchase suits and then provide them to individuals or a group of swimmers. Money raised by any booster club for use by a school team needs to be donated to the school, through the school's gift acceptance protocols. Once it is accepted, these funds or the gift can then be applied to budget accounts by the school administration.

Scrimmages & Alumni Meets

Question: Can I schedule a scrimmage for my school swimming and diving team and allow it to count as a meet for another team?

Interpretation: No, scrimmages can only count as the one scrimmage each school swimming and diving program are allowed. One school cannot count a scrimmage as a scrimmage while another school identifies it as a regular season meet.

WIAA Season Regulations now have a NOTE that reads: If either school counts a scrimmage as a game, it must be counted as a game for both programs, schools or teams.

Question: Can we have more than two school programs attend a scrimmage we are hosting?

Interpretation: Yes, more than two school swimming and diving programs can participate in a scrimmage.

Keep in mind, the scrimmages must be modified and altered so that they do not have the appearance of a meet.

Question: Can a non-school program participate in a scrimmage?

Interpretation: No, WIAA Winter Season Regulations, page 31, 4., a., One scrimmage, over one day, with another school or schools may be conducted in addition to the maximum allowed meets...

If a non-school team participates, it must be considered to be a "meet" that counts toward one of the school team's 14 regular season meets.

Question: The last edition of the WIAA Bulletin indicated sophomores, juniors and seniors could not delay reporting to the school swimming and diving team. Is this true for a sophomore boy who is going out for swimming for the first time?

Interpretation: No, WIAA Sr. High School Handbook, page 37, Rules of Eligibility, Article VI, Section 1, A., (2), indicates a student who was a member of a school team in a given sport during the previous year may not delay reporting for the school team beyond the school's official opening day of practice in order to continue nonschool training or competition...

Question: Our high school has an alumni swim meet over the Christmas break. It's just a fun meet (T-shirt relays, etc.). My question is: Can current members of the girls HS swim team take part? Our girls' coach is very con-

cerned about any of her swimmers running afoul of the rule that prohibits girls from practicing with the boys team.

Interpretation: There are a number of issues involved with your question. First, alumni can participate. As a safety precaution, those alumni who are currently swimming for collegiate programs may want to check with their coaches and/or their compliance officers to be certain they are able to participate as I am not familiar with the specifics of NCAA or other collegiate regulations.

Next, alumni meets have to be counted as a part of a school team's 14 allowed meets when members of the boy's team are involved.

In addition, any girls with remaining eligibility in swimming and diving are not allowed to compete as this will mean they have participated in two seasons of swimming and diving during a single school year. Girls with remaining eligibility who participate in this alumni meet will jeopardize their eligibility for future participation in high school athletics.

I encourage you to discuss this meet further with the athletic director at your school as he/she is your direct contact for issues like this.

Records and Seed Times

Question: Can you tell me if there are any guidelines as to whether or not a school can give a school or pool record to a swimmer based on a relay split when they were not the lead off?

Important Reminders for all WIAA Licensed Officials

Officials Center - Added to the Officials Center homepage is a listing of up-coming deadlines and recently posted information. This has been added to help officials keep better track of deadlines and new postings. It is extremely important that all officials check the Officials Center on our website regularly for up-dated information. Many officials are finding out that their classification level is being affected because they missed filling out a required form, missed a due date, missed sport meeting/video viewing notifications, etc.

Sport Meetings - When face-to-face meetings are offered, attendance is required. When these meetings are not offered there will be an online video on the Officials Center. The viewing of this video is required, not only so that you are familiar with any rule changes but for classification advancement credit. Once your have viewed the video, you will be required to fill out the video verification form that is also on the Officials Center. Once you submit this form, you can check the listing that is titled "Video Verification Forms Received" to make sure that your official's number is listed. If this is not completed properly or by the due date listed, your classification level will be affected when you re-license for the following school year.

Exams - Remember to make a copy of your exam before you send it to our office. Corrected exams are not returned. Access the Officials Center for scores. Once the due date to submit the exam has passed, answers and rule references will be placed on the Officials Center.

Rankings - If coaches are to give accurate rankings at the end of the season it is important that they can read an official's signature in the scorebook. Please write legibly. Provide the head coach with a copy of the ranking card that is available to print on the Officials Center.

Number of Officials - Contests are not to be started without the required number of officials. This applies to all levels of competition i.e. varsity, JV, freshmen, etc. The required number of officials listing for all sports can be found on Page 6 in the Guide for Officials, which is on the Officials Center.

Rule Adaptations - Wisconsin Adaptations to NFHS playing rules for each sport are on the Officials Center and should be printed and placed in the rule book for easy access.

Ejections - All ejections are to be reported immediately following a contest. The ejection form is an online submittable form that is on the Officials Center.

Independent Contractor - Officials are acting as an independent contractor and not as an employee of the WIAA or its member schools when seeking and accepting officiating contracts.

Guide for Officials – Please read the Guide for Officials, found on the Officials Center. This publication will help officials understand the classification process, ranking process, etc.



Swimming Q&A's

Question: I have a question for you regarding eligibility. We have a senior boy who transferred to our school from School BBB this year. It seems the School BBB swim program has a fun holiday event where alumni come and swim with the current team. They have asked this swimmer to join the event this year and swim with the alumni since he is no longer a student there. Evidently after the swim, there is a dinner/picnic for families and friends. I want to get your approval prior to having him attend.

Interpretation: First, as far as allowing him to attend and be involved in the dinner/picnic, WIAA regulations do not prevent this. He is able to attend the alumni event and the dinner/picnic without consequence to his eligibility.

However, since he is now participating with another school swimming and diving team and this event is during the WIAA swimming and diving season, participation in the event must be monitored. If it is an event where there will be competition of any kind, he may not compete. Best for him to not even consider getting in the water.

If this is an event where alumni are getting together, it is open to anyone to use the pool, swim and have some fun, there are no races, events, etc., just open swimming, then it is OK for him to participate. Remind him to be careful if he decides to attend this event. It is situations like this that are often brought to the attention of the WIAA office during the tournament series. We are required to investigate. Situations like these can be very distracting to student-athletes during the tournaments.

Dual Confirmation

Question: In a non-championship meet, is it necessary for dual confirmation of a false start to be made in order to disqualify a swim-

Interpretation: Yes, WIAA Season Regulations, page 33, 15., g., indicates: In all meets (championship and nonchampionship) there must be dual confirmation of a false start by the referee and starter before a school swimmer or relay team is disqualified.

<u>Fundraisers</u>

Question: I was told to contact you regarding a potential fundraiser for our school's swimming team. The idea of the fundraiser is to solicit individuals to pledge at least a dollar for every meet the varsity gets over the 14 meet regular season. The team wins 10 meets that translate into a 10 dollar donation. This is much like a free throw-a-thon only instead of paying per free throw made they are paying for each win. The reason I like the idea is because I am in a smaller community and they are hit with many fundraisers and get products they do not need. This is a unique idea that the community would have fun following. The negative is if we win no games then we have no money in our account. I am prepared for all scenarios.

My question to you is if this is legal according to the WIAA? Interpretation: In simplest terms - "no".

The WIAA's Board of Control and the other advisory committees which guide the Board, have taken a clear, firm position opposing any/all fundraisers which are based either on performance within a competition and/or based upon the outcome of a competition.

Both from the sportsmanship perspective as well as for the "flavor" of "gaming/gambling" which accompany fundraisers based on performance in competition/outcomes of games... our membership has zero interest in embracing this style of fund-

Fundraisers based on - yards rushed, takedowns, shots on goal... free throws/assists, etc., ...etc., any/all of these (and others) are not acceptable/appropriate school/program fundraisers when connected to performance in a competition with another school. +





The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, in cooperation with Reebok-CCM announced a voluntary recall of their RBK and CCW brand hockey helmets. Consumers should stop using recalled products immediately unless otherwise instructed. Below you will find a list of the helmets that have been recalled and colors of helmet shells:

"Hazard: The helmet's chinstrap can unexpectedly disengage while in use. If this happens, the helmet can fall off, posing a head and neck injury risk to consumers."

It also notes that this involves "about 1,000 units," and that no incidents or injuries have been reported thus

Rule 3-4-7 states:

"An immediate whistle must be blown when a player's helmet or face mask becomes dislodged during play. That player must leave the ice for equipment adjustment and cannot return until after play resumes." The penalty is a minor penalty.

While no injuries for this particular helmet have been reported thus far, we want to do everything we can to ensure that remains the case and bring this to your attention.

Wrestling **Questions & Answers**

Q.: When we calculate the "days to weight " based on the weight they weigh-in at for the body fat test, we don't count the day of the initial weigh-in and skinfold, correct? This is different than how things work during the season with being able to count the day you weigh-in for competition. I think some coaches get confused by this. I think we don't count the body fat weigh-in date because it is the first time they weigh-in that season. The reason we count the day they weigh-in during the season is because that day can count 1 time and as long as they are not using that day to make weight that day, they can use it to lose a pound for the next competition.

A.: Your understanding is correct. The date of skinfolding is establishing our baseline. Up to that point we are not able to know how much weight a wrestler may have gained or lost. Our experience suggests many wrestlers have attempted to be as trim as possible. Last time this was discussed there was no support for the process to afford an additional half pound drop.


Q.: I have a question regarding hydration testing for wrestling. We usually have our school nurse do the hydration test and trainer do the body fat tests. This year our school nurse is unavailable the night we are doing our tests. My wife is a registered nurse who is willing to do the hydration tests. Would she be able to do it or is that some kind of a conflict of interest having the head coaches wife do the hydration tests. I just want to check before we go ahead and do it I would hate to have to redo them. There is no reference to this in the regulations

A.: While the guidelines for who can perform the hydration tests are quite liberal and there is nothing in the text which would specifically prohibit your wife, an RN, from performing the hydration test, I would discourage it. In my opinion it is to critical a part of the minimum weight determination process to have it, you and your wife be made vulnerable to the assertions of suspicion. That's my opinion. The final call will be up to your school's administration. Ultimately, school administration is responsible for determining the eligibility of all their athletes.

Q.: My head wrestling coach wanted me to check on a new rule for wrestlers that was talked about at the rules meeting. When school is canceled do wrestlers get an additional pound only for the next school day (if there is a meet scheduled) or for the next scheduled meet that week?

A.: The allowance is made only if the meet is the next day. If there is a meet on the day school is closed due to weather and practice can not be held and the meet is rescheduled for the next day - one pound may be given. If school is closed due to weather on the day preceding a meet and practice can not be held, one pound may be given in accordance with the rules. If school is closed on Mon. or Tues. (for example) and the meet is not until, Thurs, or Frid., no allowance is made. For the new rule: in order for allowance to be given the cancellation must be on the day immediately preceding competition. Lastly, during the regular season, regardless the number of consecutive days of competition the max allowance for consecutive days of competition and growth allowance is one pound. Example: A wrestles B on Thurs. B wrestles C on Friday. On Sat. A, B and C are all in same tourney. Max allowance remains one pound. 103 can become 104 - at most. (until Dec., Feb. and

SITUATION 1: The officials go to their designated positions to observe the pregame warm-ups. They discover that the new free-throw lane-space marking lines have not been put on the

RULING: The officials shall direct game management to put two temporary 2 inch by 8 inch markings in the appropriate locations. Based on individual state guidelines, the officials may also need to submit a special report to the state association to report that the court is not in compliance with NFHS court specifications. (1-5-2; 8-1-

SITUATION 2: A team has members with No. 0 and No. 00 listed in the scorebook and it is discovered (a) with 14 minutes on the clock prior to the game, (b) with 8 minutes on the clock prior to the game or (c) after the game starts.

RULING: In (a), changes can be made without penalty. In (b), if a number is changed in the scorebook, a team technical is charged. The offended team is awarded two free throws and a throw-in at the division line to begin the game. The arrow is toward the offending team. If no changes are made to the scorebook, no infraction has occurred. In (c), after the game starts, there is no infraction if only one of the team members (No. 0 or No. 00) participates. If the second team member wishes to participate, the result is an illegal number when "discovered." The penalty is a direct technical foul on the head coach for an illegal uniform. Two free throws and a division line throw-in for the offended team and loss of coaching box privileges for the offending coach. The second team member (with the illegal uniform number) may participate without further penalty and is NOT required to change his/her number. Another possibility exists after the game starts when one of the team members wants to change his/her number prior to participating. The result is a team technical foul (no loss of coaching box) for changing the scorebook. COMMENT: No team should have both No. 0 and No. 00 on its regular roster. The infraction is likely due to bringing a player up or down a level. Therefore, it is possible the team has access to other legal uniforms to replace a uniform with an illegal number. (3-4-3d; 10-1-2; 10-5-4)

SITUATION 3: The home team wishes to honor a teammate by putting his/her initials on the headbands and wristbands worn by the team.

RULING: Illegal; headbands and wristbands must be unadorned. The only permissible adornment is either one manufacturer's logo or the school mascot/logo. The illegal items must be removed or made legal in order for a team member to participate. The initials may be put in the side insert or above the neckline of the team jersey. (3-5-3b, c; 3-4-2c)

SITUATION 4: A1 is using black pre-wrap around the entire head to keep his/her hair in place. In addition, A1 is wearing a black, moisture-absorbing headband above the pre-wrap, around the entire head.

RULING: Illegal; only one headband is permitted to be worn. One of the headbands must be removed in order for A1 to participate. (3-5-3b)

SITUATION 5: A1 is wearing a red headband and one red wristband on each wrist below the elbow. Red is the torso color of the team jersey. A1 is also wearing a multicolored "scrunchie" to secure the hair in a ponytail.

RULING: Legal; devices used to control the hair and that do not go around the entire head, are not considered headbands and, therefore, are not required to meet the same restrictions. (3-5-3d)

SITUATION 6: Team A is trailing by three points when A2 attempts a three-point try at the end of the game. A2 releases the try and is fouled in the act of shooting. The whistle for the foul is followed immediately by the horn sounding and the clock at 0:00. The try is unsuccessful.


RULING: The officials are permitted to put time back on the game clock if there is definite knowledge of the correct time or information relative to the time that elapsed after the whistle blew and before the final horn sounded. If time is put back on the game clock, A2 will attempt three free throws with the lane spaces occupied. If the officials cannot determine the amount of time remaining or determine that there is no time remaining, A2 will attempt three free throws with the lane spaces cleared. (5-10-1; 8-1-3)

SITUATION 7: While the ball is at the disposal of A1 for a free throw, B1, along the lane line, steps out of the lane space. The official displays the appropriate delay signal. Five seconds later, A2, along the lane line, steps into the lane followed by A1 releasing the free throw. The ball enters the basket.

RULING: A2's violation followed B1's; therefore, the second violation is ignored and the try is successful.

COMMENT: The penalty only addresses one violation being followed by the other. There is no timeframe associated with "followed by" in the rule; therefore, the second violation is ignored. (9-1-3d Penalty 4a)

SITUATION 8: A1 is dribbling in his/her frontcourt when B1 deflects the ball into A's backcourt. The ball is bouncing toward the end line in A's backcourt while A1 and B1 give chase. B1 and A1 each contact the ball, but neither gains control. Finally, after numerous attempts by each player, A1 gains possession deep in A's backcourt. When does the 10-second count begin anew for Team A?

RULING: The count starts as soon as the ball goes into the backcourt since team control has not ended. (4-12-3; 9-8)

SITUATION 9: Team members are leaving for the locker room at halftime when a fan taunts a member of the visiting team. The visiting team member immediately reacts, goes toward the fan and gets in a fight with him/her.

RULING: The referee rules a flagrant technical foul on the visiting team member for fighting and he/she is ejected. Since he/she is a team member during intermission, an indirect technical foul is also charged to the head coach (loss of coaching box). The referee is also within his/her authority to assess a team technical foul for unsporting behavior on the spectator. If this occurs, the technical fouls are offsetting since they occur at the same time. The penalties are the same with the exception of bench personnel being ejected. If both technical fouls are assessed, each team begins the second half with one foul toward the team-foul count and play begins at the point of interruption, which is an alternating-possession throw-in to begin the third quarter. (10-1-8; 10-4-1g) +

Mar. growth allowance is provided) The only exception to the one pound allowance is in the WIAA state tournament.

Q.: If a Tuesday wrestling match is postponed due to the cancellation of school and it is rescheduled for Thursday, do the schools still get an additional one pound allowance?

A.: No. It must be rescheduled the next day (consecutive days) in order to take advantage of the additional 1 pound allowance.

Q.: If school is canceled on Friday due to school policy, and that school has a Saturday tournament, will all teams involved in the tournament get the one pound additional allowance?

A.: Yes, if all teams involved in the tournament are properly notified. If not – No.

Q.: The school center web site lists the following: October 20 - Deadline for wrestling scale certification. Does this mean our scales have to be certified by this date or before we use them for a weigh-in? I don't recall ever seeing this before.

A.: Scales must be recertified prior to being used for skinfolding. As you know, beam scales must be certified each year. Digital scales every 3 years. Skinfold measuring can begin on the 20th. Bottom line is if the scale needs recertification, it must be done prior to conducting your skinfold sessions.

Q.: In the interpretation meetings, we addressed REPORT-ING TO THE SCORER'S TABLE READY TO WRESTLE. A question was asked - "could a wrestler report to the table and go directly to the mat (inside the circle) and stay at the edge of the 28 foot circle and have a conversation with his coach as

long as he was within the circle?" My immediate reaction would be "no"- that would be stalling. After reading the recently released NFHS rule interpretations (situation 4 -comments), the expectation is that the wrestler must report to the center of the mat and not go back to the corners. To me, having a conversation at the edge of the circle is "not the center" of the mat. Do you agree?

A.: The center of the mat is very specific text; not general. Leave the table and report to the mat ready to wrestle. Get lined up – let's go!

Q.: What happens if a wrestler does a back flip immediately after the buzzer goes off ending the 3rd period?

A.: This is considered part of the match. The back flip is an illegal hold and the opponent will get one match point for the illegal hold.

Q.: I received a question from a parent regarding the use of breathing strips over the nose. The only problem I see is that they may come off during competition. I see no safety issue or performance enhancing issue but would like your official position (I have never seen them used).

A.: The NFHS interpretation on the breathing strips for the nose is that they would fall under Rule 4-3 - Special Equipment, and would be considered legal special equipment. If allowed, I do not endorse stopping the match for replacing the strip. Make that clear before starting. If they come off, just throw them away. No time-out taken. Don't stop the match for that.

Q.: The new uniform rule 4-1-5 "uniform as intended with





Revisions/Clarifications to Case Book: (Underlining shows additions; strikethrough shows deletions.);

SITUATION: Page 10, RULING... The head coach of Wrestler A has a team point deducted for unsportsmanlike conduct as he has already verified that all of his wrestlers are properly equipped and ready to wrestle. (5-31-1; 7-3-6)

Pages 11-12, 4.1.1 SITUATION B: RUL-ING...and Wrestler B is awarded a match point. and the head coach of Team A is also penalized for unsportsmanlike conduct. ...(1-2-7: 5-31-1: 7-5-3: 8-1-1)

Page 12, 4.1.1 SITUATION C: RUL-ING...Wrestler B is awarded two match points. and the head coach of A is also nonalized for unsportsmanlike conduct. (1-2-7; 5-31-1; 7-4-2; 8-1-1)

18, SITUATION: Page 4.3.3 RULING...The head coach of Wrestler A is also penalized for unsportsmanlike conduct...

Page 42, 6.6.6 SITUATION H: RUL-ING...An injury time-out is also charged to the wrestler in order to correct what is needed. and the head coach is penalized. ...

Pages 48-49, 7.4.2 SITUATION B: RUL-ING...and the team would receive a threetwo-point deduction.

Page 53, 8.1.1 SITUATION B: RUL-ING... The head coach is also penalized for unsportsmanlike conduct and one team point is deducted from his or her team score. ...

SITUATION 1: A designated, on-site meet physician examines a wrestler with a skin problem. The wrestler has a proper form from a personal physician that states that he/she would not be contagious in two more days and cannot compete until then. The designated, on-site meet physician rules that the wrestler may compete immediately. May the designated, on-site meet physician make that rul-

RULING: The designated, on-site meet physician may overrule both a form allowing participation or one not allowing participation. A current examination is considered more accurate than one done previously. (4-2-3, 4)

SITUATION 2: A wrestler steps on the scale when the 125-pound weight class is called. This wrestler weighs 125.3 pounds.

Where may this wrestler compete for this event assuming that there is no weight allowance due to growth or consecutive days of competition and also is following his/her weight management plan?

RULING: This wrestler is eligible for both the 130- and 135-pound weight classes based on NFHS rules. This wrestler's actual stripped weight will be recorded when he/she steps on the scale at the 125-pound weigh-in. This wrestler will not weigh-in again to be eligible for the two weight classes allowed by the actual stripped weight.

COMMENT: Each member state association's wrestling weight management program may be more restrictive and, in turn, may not allow a wrestler to move up a weight class because of its individual wrestling weight management plan. (1-2-5; 1-3; 4-4-2)

SITUATION 3: The head coach is penalized a second time for unsportsmanlike conduct on the first day of a three-day tournament. What is the penalty?

RULING: The head coach is to be re-

moved from the premises immediately on the second penalty and two team points will be deducted. The head coach is removed for the remainder of the three-day tournament.


COMMENT: If the head coach is the only coach for this team at this tournament, the meet management should check with the respective state association to determine what rules, policies or procedures it has in place to deal with a head coach who has been ejected, leaving the team without another individual present to coach the team.

SITUATION 4: (a) Wrestler A reports to the scorer's table not properly equipped and not ready to wrestle; or (b) Wrestler A reports to the scorer's table and is properly equipped and then goes back to his/her coach in the corner; or (c) Wrestler A has reported properly to the scorer's table and then reports to the wrestling area on the mat and then returns to his/her coach in the corner.

RULING: In (a), Wrestler A is not properly equipped and he/she will be sent See Wrestling Rule Interp, page 17



back to the coach and penalized with a technical violation and a match point will be awarded to the opponent. Wrestler A will also be charged an injury time-out and will have 1 1/2 minutes of injury time in order to become properly equipped and ready to wrestle. In (b), Wrestler A is delaying the match and shall be penalized for stalling, and a warning will be issued the first time. In (c), Wrestler A is penalized for leaving the wrestling area without the referee's permission, which is a technical violation and a match point is awarded to the opponent.

COMMENT: A match begins when the proper wrestler reports to the scorer's table in dual matches and tournaments until the conclusion of wrestling. The proper wrestler is required to report to the scorer's table ready to wrestle, and then immediately report to the center of the mat and not go back to his/her corner. In some tournaments, one wrestler such as the one in the top of the bracket, is asked to pick up the bout sheet and deliver it to the scorer's table. This delivery would not be considered reporting to the scorer's table for purposes of determining ready to wrestle. (5-18-2; 7-3-4; 7-3-6; 7-6-6b) +

no modification" ie, "taping straps so the singlet fits the puny kid." We have a very hefty kid whose singlet is way too tight, so the Home Ec Dept. sews extensions in the straps so he can breathe. Do we just tell him to "suck it up" or let it qo? Consistent?

A.: It is not our desire to see a youngster unable to participate due to this rule. However, we do not consider it to be an unreasonable rule. The first, best way to avoid problems and disappointment is that schools and coaches should be prepared to properly equip their teams. If schools have an emergency they should contact the WIAA in advance and seek a uniform waiver. There is some precedent for providing temporary relief in an emergency.

Q.: What is the procedure for measuring the inseam of a singlet? We have old singlets from a previous team that we would like to use for a "throwback" meet.

A.: The measurement must meet minimum standards when it is being worn by the wrestler - minimum of 4" inseam. Bottom line. It's an 'appearance' rule.

Q.: We have a young man who would like to wrestle. He wears two prosthetic legs. Do we need doctor approval? Can he wrestle with the prosthetics? Would they be a safety hazard? Can he wrestle without them? We have not encountered this before, so are unclear of the procedure

A.: The WIAA does allow use of prosthetic devices to be worn in competition in


accordance with the rules of the given competition. Rule 4-3-2 allows a state to authorize the use of artificial limbs, which in its opinion are no more dangerous to competitors than the corresponding human limb and do not place an opponent at a disadvantage. In addition, Rule 4-3-1 requires that all equipment that is hard and/or abrasive must be covered and padded and allow for normal movement of the joints. Also, it must not prevent an opponent from applying normal holds. All pads must be tight fitting/snug to the limbs - loose pads are prohibited. With that being said, it would be legal for a wrestler to wrestle with a prosthetic limb(s) if it met the above criteria. This rule does not require doctor approval for the athlete to compete, but it may be in the best interest of the athlete and the school to do so. I would suggest that several pictures of the athlete with the artificial limbs be sent to the WIAA. One picture perhaps of just the limbs, one of the athlete with the limbs in place, and one with all the appropriate padding which would cover all hard and/or abrasive areas of the limbs. Keep in mind that even though the WIAA would approve the limbs, the athlete must pass inspection by the mat official at each and every contest. The official always has the final decision if the limbs meet the above restrictions (this may vary from official to official) on whether the athlete may compete on that given day. Regarding

weigh in - Rule 4-5-7 requires that if an athlete intends to wear the artificial limb(s) while wrestling, he must weigh-in with the limb(s). The limbs would not have to be padded at the time of the weigh in, but of course would have to pass inspection ASAP after the WI. If the limb(s) are not on at the time of weigh in, he may not wrestle with them on. If the athlete does not intend to wear the artificial limbs and weigh-in is a problem without limbs attached to the athlete, he may be held by another wrestler, iump on the scale and then subtract the weight of the other wrestler. If the wrestler weighs in with the limbs and later decides not to wear them, this is permitted by rule.

Q.: Quick clarification needed – June 2008 summary of recommendations stated that JV wrestlers can participate in 8 multi and 6 duals, but it is not stated that way in the winter regs book – which do I go by? Does adding the double dual or triple dual mean their total will be over 7 duals? I am not a wrestling expert obviously. My coach wants to add another tournament, but it could only be a double dual or triple dual – correct?

A.: The new text is intended to provide that you can schedule an 8th tournament, either individual or team event. AND – include other JV teams in all your varsity dual evenings, in order to see that there was adequate competition for JV kids. In the past you could only bring in additional JV teams to 2 or 3 of your dual meets. ÷

Hockey Rule Interpretations



Intentional Offsides

QUESTION: Last evening we officiated a varsity hockey contest in which we called an intentional offsides because a player caused an offsides in which there was no possibility of completing a legal play. The head coach for the team committing the infraction, who is a very tenured coach, became irate with the call and insisted repeatedly the intentional offsides rule was removed from the rule book over two years ago. The assistant coach insisted the rule in the NFHS rule book was "not to be applied to Wisconsin". I assume he was referring to a Wisconsin adaptation. It appears clear that rule 6-28-3 provides authority for this infraction, and the 2008-09 examination addressed this rule in its questions.

However, was there some attempt to strike this rule that these coaches may be confused with?

INTERPRETATION: Based upon the information you have provided, seems you made the correct call. NFHS Rule 6-28-3 was modified about five years ago and this may be what the coach was referring to. However, the change simply removed the description of a player having to be "deeper than the point of the circle" in order for an intentional offsides to be called.

The current language allows for a judgment call by the official for an intentional offside. You are correct, if the offside play is made for the purpose of deliberately securing an immediate stoppage of play, regardless of the rea-son, or where an offside play is made under conditions where there is no possibility of completing a legal play, then the play is blown dead and faced off at the end zone faceoff spot in the defending zone of the offending team. Equipment & Uniforms

QUESTION: Is there a "warning" in a WIAA hockey game for not using a mouth-guard?

INTERPRETATION: No, NFHS Rule 3-4-4 indicates: All players, including goalkeepers, shall wear and have properly inserted into their mouth during the course of play a dental guard which should cover all the remaining teeth of one jaw.

PENALTY: For initial violation, offending player shall be immediately replaced on the ice, and the referee shall warn the offending team that subsequent violations by any player of that team shall result in the player being assessed a misconduct. GOALKEEPER-Minor.

QUESTION: Do hockey uniforms have to have numbers on their sleeves?

INTERPRETATION: Yes, NFHS Rule 2-1-2 indicates that all players shall wear numbered uniforms. It is required that all players be numbered with at least 10-inch (25.4 cm) high Gothic, colored numbers on the back of their jerseys and the same numbers at least 4 inches (10.16 cm) in height on both sleeves of the iersey. The color of the numbers shall contrast with the color of the jersey.

QUESTION: Do ice hockey sweaters have to be "white" when a team is the home team during the regular season?

INTERPRETATION: NFHS Rule 2-1-2b indicates: "It is required that the visiting team wear dark-colored uniforms." This is currently the only NFHS regulation pertaining to the color of a sweater.

Visiting teams are to wear their dark jerseys/sweaters while home teams need to wear light colored sweaters.

During the WIAA tournament series, 2009 WIAA regulations require the second school alphabetically to wear light colored jerseys.

QUESTION: Last year goaltenders had to have a neck protector under their gear separate from the chest protector. Do they still need this?

INTERPRETATION: NFHS Rule 3-3-1 now reads as follow: "Required equipment for goalkeepers shall include gloves, skates, stick, protective full face mask, flapper-style throat protector, leg pads and helmet with chin strap. The regulation goes on to indicate the flapperstyle throat protection must be separate, commercially manufactured, unaltered and properly attached to the helmet or face mask.

Simply put, the flapper-style throat protector has now replaced the neck protector.

Four Penalties in One Game QUESTION: After receiving four penalties in a nust the plaver receiving these four pe be removed from the remainder of the contest?

INTERPRETATION: Yes, WIAA Season Regulations, 15., b., Any player receiving a total of four penalties (minor, major, or misconduct) in a game shall be removed from participation for the balance of that game. This does not include bench penalties served by the player or violations resulting in penalty shots. The ejection is not considered a game misconduct or game disqualification.

Number of Required Officials

QUESTION: Can a JV game be officiated by 2 officials, or does there need to be 3 to start the game? I'm looking in the NFHS rules book and it only says that a game shall be officiated by either a two or three official system. I know you need 3 for a varsity game. Can you clarify for me?

INTERPRETATION: WIAA Sr. High School Handbook, page 52, indicates—"Hockey (3)-Referee, Assistant Referee, and Linesman-at all levels of competition."

Three (3) WIAA registered ice hockey officials are required in order for an ice hockey game to begin.

Eligibility

QUESTION: I have been approached by a few of the players that were cut from the team that would be interested in practicing with the JV team but not playing in any games. Our coach is very interested in having the guys come out and have a red shirt type of season where they can work on their skills and become stronger skaters but not play in any games. We would also outline with these guys the team rules and the expectations for the season. They could also participate with the team as managers or assist the team with stats or other needed activities. Is there a problem with this at all? We would discuss it with all the current players as well to make sure that they understand what the program is all about.

What do you think?

INTERPRETATION: Past history in ice hockey has been to "cut" student-athletes and then they are allowed to return to non-school (WAHA) teams. Keep in mind that any studentathlete who is "cut" can be asked to return to the school team one time during the season. If a player returns to the school team and then competes on a non-school team, they are no longer allowed to compete with the school team. In the meantime, a student-athlete can be practicing and/or competing with a nonschool team.

If a school wishes to keep players they have "cut" and practice with them, the school is allowed to do so. There are no limits during the regular season to the number of players on a school team's bench. The school could develop an additional schedule for them if they choose to do so and are able to gain governing body support. Having student-athletes only practice with/against the varsity team can develop into difficult situations and may be an issue that school administrators want to think very care-

In an email the term "red-shirting" is used. Please keep in mind there is no "red-shirting" for high school student-athletes. Each studentathlete has four years of eligibility beginning with the start of their freshmen year. You may wish to review WIAA Rules at a Glance, III., B.

Regarding players remaining as managers, statisticians, etc., school programs are certainly allowed to have student-athletes handle positions. Keep in mind, they are limited and during the tournament series do have limitations to the number of coaches, managers, and players allowed in the box.

QUESTION: My son would like to play hockey but the school has no team. Can he play on a different high school team?

INTERPRETATION: Unless a co-op is established or if the student is still in 9th or 10th grade, the only options that now exist for this situation is for a family to make a full and complete move into a new community where the school in that community has ice hockey or play on nonschool programs.

Parents need to contact their school's athletic director in these situations if they have a student in 9th or 10th grade or attending a jr. high school or a middle school.

QUESTION: Before hockey began, I had a 9th grade player email me and ask my opinion to whether she should play high school hockey or play WAHA U-14 level girls hockey. Because the U-14 team had a returning 11th grade goal tender and another 11th grader who showed interest in the backup position, I recommended that she play at the U-14 level. We started high school hockey a week ago today, and the potential back-up goalie has informed me she does not want to play goalie leaving my team with just the one.

The U-14 player has already begun the U-14 season and has already played 2 games. Is it to late to invite the U-14 player to the high school team? If so, do I need WIAA approval to do so?

INTERPRETATION: WIAA provisions require students who were a part of the team last season may not delay reporting 'this' season and must be present on day one of practice.

As you describe this situation, with student being a 9th grader, we see no reason she couldn't come out for the school team at this

Obviously, once she reports to the school team she can no longer continue competition with the club team until the school season's

Out-of-State Tournaments

QUESTION: Our girl's hockey team is competing in the Schwan Cup later this month in Minnesota. Do I need to fill out a waiver to do this with the WIAA?

INTERPRETATION: Simply put, YES, the WIAA office does need to provide a waiver to any WIAA school team that participates in this tournament. There have been questions in past years regarding the actual "school" that is hosting this tournament and sanctioning issues associated with this tournament.

Fundraisers

QUESTION: We would like to do a fundraiser of some sort with our hockey team for a local cancer campaign. Can we start a program where spectators contribute a certain dollar amount for every goal we

INTERPRETATION: In simplest terms -

The WIAA's Board of Control and the other advisory committees which guide the Board, have taken a clear, firm position opposing any/all fundraisers which are based either on performance within a competition and/or based upon the outcome of a competition.

Both from the sportsmanship perspective as well as for the "flavor" of "gaming/gambling" which accompany fundraisers based on performance in competition/outcomes of games... our membership has zero interest in embracing this style of fund raiser.

Fund raisers based on - yards rushed, takedowns, shots on goal, goals scored...freethrows/assists, etc., ...etc., any/all of these (and others) are not acceptable/appropriate school/program fundraisers when connected to performance in a competition with another

Activities like collecting nonperishable goods, raffles, shoveling snow, getting groceries, running errands, raking a yard, etc., for a donation or a specific price are all acceptable programs for a high school team to be in-

Scrimmages

QUESTION: Can a school hockey program scrimmage a WAHA non-school hockey team?

INTERPRETATION: No, WIAA Winter Season Regulations, page 22, 4., a. indicates that one scrimmage, over one day, with another school, or schools, may be conducted in addition to the maximum allowed games, meets, or contests . .

If a non-school program is included in a scrimmage, the scrimmage must be counted as one of the school team's 20 contests.

QUESTION: Can the scorebook and/or scoreboard be used during scrimmages?

INTERPRETATION: No, neither the scorebook nor the scoreboard can be used during a scrimmage. WIAA Winter Season Regulations, page 23, 4., a., (4).

If a scorebook and/or scoreboard is used during a scrimmage, the scrimmage must be counted as one of the 20 contests for the school team's involved.

Number of Allowed Games

QUESTION: Can high school hockey teams play two games in one day?

INTERPRETATION: Yes, NFHS and WIAA language remains silent regarding the number of contests in one day. Each game played does count as one of the 20 maximum contests allowed during the regular season.

During the 2009-10 ice hockey season, WIAA member ice hockey teams will be allowed to schedule two multi-game contests between another school or schools, which will count as one of the maximum total contests provided no members of the team are dismissed from academic classes in order to play or travel.

QUESTION: Is there a limit to the number of contests a hockey player who plays both JV and varsity can compete in during the regular season?

INTERPRETATION: No, WIAA regulations remain silent regarding the number of contests during the regular season. It is the responsibility of a coach to be particularly concerned about overexposing students to the point of adversely affecting their health and safety. It is highly recommended that coaches who use players at more than one level of competition document the number of periods played for each individual.

OUESTION: Doesn't the WIAA five period requlation prevent two hockey games from being played

INTERPRETATION: No, the language related to playing in five periods in one day is for contwo different levels. In other a player goes from the JV to the varsity level, they may only compete in a maximum of five periods on that day.

As the regulation reads, coaches are also reminded that it is the responsibility of the coach to be particularly concerned about the overexposing students to the point of adversely affecting their health and safety. It is highly recommended that coaches who use players at more than one level of competition document the number of periods played for each individual.

Air Horn Blown After a Score

QUESTION: We have blown an air horn located outside the rink and the south end and opposite the spectator seating when we scored a goal in our varsity hockey games. The question is: Are we in violation of the rules or abusing the rules by doing this only for our home team?

INTERPRETATION: During the regular season, matters of neutrality for contests are the responsibility of the conference (if a conference game) or the host school (if a non-conference game). During the WIAA Tournament Series, the WIAA has responsibility for matters like this.

In ice hockey, the use of "Fog Horns" whether recorded or live has become quite popular during recent years. The problem with the use of "Fog Horns" is that a minor official, who is to be as neutral as possible, is usually responsible for blowing the foghorn. The WIAA informs host schools during our tournament series that if a foghorn is to be blown following a goal for the host school, it must also be blown following the scoring of a goal by the visiting team. Otherwise, it should not be

During the regular season, this is a regulation that many schools and conferences have applied to their school contests. Many times, because there are also non-school contests played at rinks, this is misapplied.

Warm-ups

QUESTION: During the pre-game warm ups, a team moves the goal from its correct position to a spot along the boards half way between the goal line and the blue line. They place one goalie in front of that goal, the other goalie at a similar spot on the other side of the ice, and play a three-on-three mini scrimmage. Is this acceptable? My view is that it isn't. There is no protective netting in front of the seating area for one, so a tipped shot could go straight up into the stands. It seems dangerous to me. Could you clarify?

INTERPRETATION: Most rinks now provide netting around the goal areas. This netting is not provided in many rinks around the entire rink. When a rink does not have netting encircling the entire rink or when a warm-up procedure described above is used without netting behind the goal, obvious liability/risk issues can easily develop.

This is a local-school-team-coach decision; however, the best advice is not to move the goal to an area where there is no netting provided behind an area where student-athletes are taking shots.

Ice Hockey Divisions

QUESTION: I'm interested in getting information concerning the possible division of hockey teams based on school enrollment. It seems every other sport is more evenly and fairly divided based on school enrollment. Hockey, a very cal sport, has small schools facing huge school populations. This seems unsafe and unfair. When will WIAA make this necessary change?

INTERPRETATION: In WIAA Ice Hockey we currently have 91 boys ice hockey school teams and 29 girls ice hockey school teams. In order for divisions to be identified, we need to have 96 school teams for consideration of two divisions to occur. In this way, an adequate statewide tournament with appropriate geography for travel can be arranged.

With the current economic situation, attaining additional ice hockey programs in our schools may be a struggle. This is something we continue to monitor. We are hopeful schools in Wisconsin continue to consider an interest in developing an ice hockey program. We view a two-divisional format as a positive move for WIAA member schools.

Shoot-outs

QUESTION: Our son played a conference hockey game last night. At the end of regulation play the score was tied at 3-3. The teams then played one regulation overtime period with neither team scoring. The referees then continued the contest with a three-man shoot-out. Could you please tell me if the rules for WIAA hockey have changed to include shootouts to determine the winner of a contest? In the past both teams stats reflected a tie and the goaltenders were not assessed any goals allowed. I was unable to find this info on the website other than in reference to the tournament procedure.

INTERPRETATION: WIAA Season Regulations for Ice Hockey specifically indicate, 15., f., pg. 24, "For regular season tournaments an alternate tie-breaking procedure may be determined by the host school. However, any hockey game where an alternate tie-breaking procedure is used (not including a sudden-victory during an eight-minute NFHS overtime period) is to be listed as a tie on a team's season

I have been informed this was a conference game and not a special tournament the teams were playing and there are no conference regulations allowing a shootout. Consequently, the same regulation does need to be applied and the game officially is identified as a tie. Both teams' records will need to reflect a tie and for seeding purposes for the WIAA tournament, this game will need to be identified as a

Eligibility Questions & Answers



Residence & Transfer

Q.: Our administration has recently been approached by a level 10 student who has inquired about transferring to our school as soon as possible. The family cites a frustrating academic experience at his existing school as the reason for a transfer. This young man is a basketball player ... is he eligible to transfer immediately? And if his transfer was granted, would he be eligible to compete this season for our school?

A.: If and when the student would transfer and become your full-time student, then you should schedule to meet with the family to discuss the circumstances of the transfer. You may refer to the Transfer Rules and Waivers Tips on our website, I will also make you aware that transferring while still in the soph. year affords some added potential for eligibility albeit at the non-varsity level for one calendar year, provided both member schools agree and their are no objections. This mutual agreement would not negate opportunity to request a waiver of the member's transfer rule if extenuating circumstances as defined in the tip sheet are present and can be documented.

Q.: For an in-state transfer, I know the form we need to use and the protocol. When a student transfers from another state, is it a similar protocol?

A.: I'd suggest the protocol be identical. Best practice to always fax out an EVTS form. You always want to know a student has no code or other issues that you should know about. Even if the transfer has been a complete and total move of the entire family and you would not need to come here via the waiver process - always, always protect yourself by securing the EVTS form for your records at least. My opinion is - that form is the cheapest, simplest insurance an AD can take out for themselves and their school.

Q.: We have a child who switched from private school A to private school B after attending School A for four weeks of her tenth year. She switched because we felt a smaller school was more beneficial to her. She is currently playing non-varsity sports at School B. However, in the spring, she would like to play a sport which has only a varsity team. 1) Can she seek a waiver to play on the varsity team if a non-varsity is not available? 2) Will she have to wait four weeks to play varsity sports next fall?

A.: To this point the Board of Control has determined that a member school not sponsoring sub-varsity programming does not mitigate the rule. The student will be restricted for four weeks of the fall sport season as well. The period of restricted eligibility in the circumstance you described is one calendar year from the date of first attendance at your school.

Amateur Status

Q.: I've got a couple questions that are somewhat similar. 1) A local committee coordinates our city field. They've requested pictures of our team playing there so that they can put them on their field website. Is this OK? My impression so far is that they want to have a photo section that shows various pictures of the many teams that use the field. Not sure if they are selling advertising on this site to outside businesses. Would that be a factor in determining acceptability? 2) We're doing a fundraiser where our team sells cards full of coupons to local businesses. Is it OK to put pictures of our athletes on such a card?

A.: 1) Can't say with any certainty. What's on the site, how the photos are used is essential to know and see before being able to say. Selling advertising is only one of the concerns in this type of idea. If they wish to do a mock up/prototype, we will be glad to proof. 2) ABSOLUTELY not. Team logo and/or schedule would not be a problem.

Q.: Can a booster club at a school help pay a fee that an athlete has to pay to be on a club volleyhall team?

A.: Athletes may be reimbursed actual and necessary costs associated with competition. So the answer to your question is yes - so long as the same opportunity to have club fees paid are available to any/all kids interested in playing club (an athlete

may not receive benefit that is not available to all students).

III-F and III-C of the Rules At A Glance relate to your question.

Q.: You mentioned something about a sport team losing eligibility over an endorsement for a pizza parlor at the AD meeting, could I get some more information in terms of what happened that caused them to lose their eligibility.

A.: To begin, a player of the week, team of the week, e.g., do not need to be troublesome. The recognition may be afforded without peril. But school administration and coaches must have oversight. The sponsoring business should have some moral/ethical perspectives as well. In the case I referred to at WADA, an area TV station and an area pizza vendor - under the guise of selecting a "team of the week" picked several area HS's over the course of the fall season and when the team was notified they were team of the week and would receive a pizza dinner for the team (which can be allowed - Bylaws Art. XI, Sect 2A). The pizza arrived but so did a video camera which was given to the students. The students were asked to shoot several minutes of video which was then placed on the internet. The videos we reviewed were ripe with product placement and with what could only be seen as product promotion/endorsement and NOT seen as the businesses purely/simply endorsing, promoting the students. What appeared on the internet was seen only as an advertisement for the pizza co. and an exploitation of kids. With some education of students, oversight by coaches and AD's and the business promotions staff a lot of distress and a year of probation could have been avoided.

Q.: A local restaurant has offered to feed our football team free of charge this Wednesday. I looked at the Handbook to make sure this was not an amateur status violation and was not sure after reading it over a few times. Could you please clarify? We have some kids that are involved in wrestling and basketball. The last thing I want to do is jeopardize those seasons.

A.: So long as it's voluntary, not attached to some other "promotion" and is available to any on the team interested in attending you can allow this. See Sr. High Handbook, Art. XI, Sect, 2A (p. 29).

Q.: I have an athlete that will be participating at the AAU national CC race in Virginia and the USATF national CC race in Alabama. Her mother would like to solicit sponsors to help defray the costs of these trips. Does that endanger the runner, a junior, of her amateur status?

A.: On something like this I recommend caution. A student can be reimbursed actual and necessary costs associated with competition. That might be achieved without peril through solicitation. Be certain then that the eligibility is not compromised by the student turning around and promoting/endorsing the sponsors and contributors. Of course, the school may also have policy and/or opinion on whether you wish to permit private student solicitation of area business. See Rules At A Glance: Art. III-F and III-C.

Q.: We have a group that would like to run some halftime contests where gift certificates could be awarded. Are there any restrictions outlined by the WIAA? Does the WIAA have any statements regarding advertising at games?

A.: Halftime contests is a broad description. They can take on many forms. Some may be specific skill of sport performance, others like an egg or water balloon toss having nothing to do with skill of sport performance. Depending on how a student is provided access to the opportunity whether by random draw, or by simply purchase a ticket and everyone gets a chance to play, as well as what a student will be doing in the contest will determine what a student athlete might be allowed to receive for winning. Of course for adults and nonstudents, WIAA rules and amateur status provisions have no bearing. In addition, what you choose to do during your own school's regular season will otherwise be largely up to you. WIAA tournament procedures identify that gimmicks and fundraisers are not allowed as part of WIAA tournament events. Here is some discussion about random draw based contests for some additional detail. 1. You are always most wise to take a "wide berth" around amateur status concerns. 2. With respect to the "lucky ticket holder" and random draws - the rules say an athlete may not receive benefit as a result of "being an athlete"... on their ability, potential or performance as an athlete. Thus, you must always see the person whose name is drawn is the person that "performs" the skill. 3. When there is a legitimate contest where a student athlete's name is drawn by "luck of the draw/serendipity"... they did not receive opportunity or benefit because they were a talented player...but rather just buy luck of the draw...and if they make the field goal or half court shot e.g., they may keep the

Q.: I have a question regarding the distribution of t-shirts and sweatshirts at a basketball league in which non-basketball players play in the winter. The league consists of teams from three communities. None of these players play basketball at the high school, but most participate in other WIAA sponsored sports. They simply join this winter league and play at church gyms within the communities. Is it acceptable for the winning team and second place team in the tournament at the end of the season to receive a sweatshirt (first place) and a t-shirt (second place)? I have read the "Amateur Status" requirements and stipulations, but am still uncertain

A.: T-shirts have been identified by the members as acceptable for a student to receive. Sweatshirts have not been approved. See Bylaws, Art. XI, Sect. 1A and Sect. 3 for specific text and references. (HB p. 29) Also: What ROE Article IV provides is that (paraphrase): A student must be an amateur in ALL WIAA recognized sports in order to be eligible - in ANY WIAA sponsored sports. Thus, since the Association does not presently sponsor interscholastic bowling amateur status restrictions do not apply. Same as we do not sponsor lumberjack events, bass fishing, snowmobiling, motocross, BMX or rodeo, e.g., - there are a number of school-aged student athletes who do right well for themselves in these non-WIAA recognized sporting events and suffer no peril when playing any WIAA offered interscholastic opportunity. Important: On the other hand, however, even though student plays school football, basketball and baseball - golfing with dad or buddy in summer event - hits closest to the pin and wins a sleeve of balls, or sandwich at the club house, or a new drive, e.g. - BIG PROBLEM/Amateur status violation! Because even though the student does not take part in school golf program our members rule requires amateur adherence in ALL WIAA sports in order to be eligible in ANY WIAA sports.

Competition & Practice

Q.: Our conference has a rule that states "each game of a baseball double header will be five innings in length" - can we do that? Or, do both games have to be scheduled for seven innings in length?

A.: Baseball has no provision within the rules which allows for scheduling five inning games. Baseball is seven innings.

Q.: A friend was telling me that there was a rule within the WIAA that kids can not be "cut" off of high school teams. I was wondering if this is true and if there was somewhere on your website that shows this and how it applies to high school sports.

A.: There is no WIAA rule of this kind - except - when it comes to co-op teams. If a school is running a co-op program, one of the conditions for approval is that no students will be cut.

Q.: Is there any rule prohibiting a boys team from scrimmaging a girls team from the same school during practices in basketball?

A.: No, none. II-E of the Rules At A Glance identifies that there is a limit to the

number of practices/scrimmages you can have with another school's team. But you may practice with or against kids from your own school (either gender) any time you wish during the season.

Participation Issues

Q.: What does the WIAA define as a "full-time student"?

A.: See Sr. High Handbook, p.35 Art. V, Sect. 1A-note. Since there is broad diversity across our 500+ member schools and how their local Boards identify full-time student status, e.g., four period blocks, six, seven or eight periods (more) traditional schedule based determination, some go by semester credits, etc. The WIAA's "definition" of a full-time student must come from a broader perspective. In our member's Senior High Handbook, p. 35 Rules of Eligibility Art.V, Sect.1A-note, provides: "A full-time student is a student where the member school is responsible for programming 100 percent of the student's school day. The student is eligible for like or similar awards, privileges and services as all other students and meets all obligations and responsibilities as other students, without exception." From another perspective then, a full time student - could be - class president, prom king, homecoming queen, class speaker or even, valedictorian and grand scholarship winner. Instruction is provided or paid for by the school. Course work is counted towards GPA/class rank, graduation, hon-

Q.: I have a student who went to school A last year as a freshman, did not play any sports and has transferred to school B. Due to credit deficiencies, this student is a freshman again this year at school B. Does he lose a year of athletic eligibility or is there a process to allow him four years of athletic eligibility?

A.: Review ROE Art. V, p. 35. Students have up to four years/eight consecutive semesters of potential HS eligibility. Based on your description, student will be ineligible his fifth year of HS unless a consecutive semester waiver is sought/provided. That process should occur just prior to the student beginning his fifth year.

Q.: We have a student who wants to attend the local technical college and begin work on his HSED. He will still be considered a student of our HS but will be taking classes at the tech school. Will he be eligible to play athletics at our high school?

A.: So long as student is still enrolled as a full-time student and/or full-time equivalent with your school, it is possible for him to be eligible. A word of caution; be sure you have immediate access to his grades. There are times when the local college campus' grading periods are different from your high schools. If the student becomes academically ineligible but is allowed to compete due to you not receiving his college/vocational tech grades - the events

he takes part in as an academically ineligible athlete would be forfeit.

Nonschool

Competition/Participation

Q.: Would it be permissible to use some of the money that is in the school's boys soccer fund to help with the cost of playing winter soccer at an indoor complex? The money is kept in an account outside of the school, not a school activity account. Would they need to have a player on their team that is not from our school, so it would not resemble our high school team participating during the school year?

A.: Since the money is not "school money" it could be used as described. (School \$\$ can only be used for "school sponsored programming.") ROE Art. IV provides that an athlete can be reimbursed actual and necessary cost associated with competition. Best practice is not to reimburse the student directly, but rather to cover the league entry fees. Only caveats are to be sure that all students interested in having fees covered at this complex have same awareness of opportunity and access to the money as all others. Amateur status interpretations further provide that an athlete may not receive "benefit" which is not available to any/every other student because of athletic ability, potential or per-

Coach Contact

- **Q.:** I have a question regarding out-of-season contact. Our basketball coach was wondering if he could take students who signed-up for his team to watch a practice at the local college. It is not a clinic, just a practice of the college team. Could they attend this?
- A.: Yes. So long as the opportunity is voluntary and available to any who wish to attend, we consider this sort of assembly as acceptable under the Bylaws Art. XI, Sect. 2 which allows for group entertainment.
- **Q.:** I am a varsity girls soccer coach and we have an opening for our freshmen coach. We have a candidate who coaches in our club at the U17/18 age group. I have been trying to find the rules on this. Am I correct in that as long as she would not be coaching the players that she worked with in the summer that would be OK? I am having trouble finding the Article 1 rules on this topic.
- A.: It may be possible to employ a coach to work with 9th graders, who has worked with, coached, "upperclassmen" out of the season. The caveat is that the coach would have ZERO interface and involvement with the JV and varsity teams. Coach does not participate in "try-outs" for those levels, the frosh do not scrimmage the JV or varsity teams, the coach is not on the sidelines or assist with those levels in games or scrimmages.
- Q.: In past years, I've e-mailed you these questions about youth clinics...and after looking over the Bylaws and Rules of Eligibility, I'm fairly certain that policy has not changed...but I hate to assume things! Any info you can give me is appreciated. 1) In the past it's been OK for an outside group (Kiwanis, Rotary) to sponsor a clinic during the high school season for students in grade eight and below with HS players and coaches serving as instructors. Is this still OK? (HS players and coaches would be asked to volunteer as clinicians). 2) Can registration fees still be donated or "gifted" back to the school program by the sponsor? 3) Would school team members be able to instruct at such a clinic held on a "day off" after six consecutive days of practice/competition with the school team?
- A.: Yes to all three questions. Be certain that you document that the day is "off" and participation is voluntary. There have been no changes in this rule.
- **Q.:** I am an assistant JV girls volleyball coach. Where can I find the rules regarding what players I can coach during the volleyball club season?
- A.: In a nutshell, club coaching, while also a JV level coach at a member school: you can coach your own children; you can coach students still in grade school and middle school; you can coach students from any school except where you coach a school team (if you intend to continue to coach there next season). Whether paid or

volunteer, a coach is a coach, is a coach, is a... You should review Article I for additional details.

- Q.: I am the HS baseball coach, and I am wondering if it is OK for me to conduct a meeting during the school year for kids and parents concerning information relative to a nonschool club team (costs, schedule, start/end dates, travel, tournaments, etc.) even though the team members will in all likelihood be playing at our school this spring? The meeting would be off-site from our school and no instruction would occur...just organizational things to be communicated to the families so they can plan and budget for it.
- A.: A club can hold organizational meetings as they wish and determine. Remember an acceptable nonschool program is one which is not limited to students based on school and/or team status. (Sr. High HB-p. 38, C-1). The sponsors should see that the opportunity is made widely known and is available and accessible to any who are interested and of appropriate age/grade. There is no reason you could not attend such a meeting.
- Q.: I am contacting you from a residential/boarding school. The question arises from the Article VI, Section 2 - Out-of-Season C. 3) c. "This provision shall not prevent a coach from having supervisory responsibilities outside of the designated season of a sport. Supervisory involvement, however, does not include situations like club team coaching, driving (or accompanying) student to competition or training (clinics, camps, etc), conducting drills... or any other activity which could be regarded as coaching or instructing." This seems to imply that my soccer coach could not drive soccer players to a "club" game/practice outside of the soccer season. As residential students, this often keeps our kids off of club/travel opportunities. Would it be within WIAA rules for our coach or other faculty member to drive players to a clinic/camp/club game or tourney?
- A.: Residential schools, acting as the parent, can provide transportation to the sort of events/activities you describe, same as a parent might. Be sure opportunity is available to any interested student who resides full time with you and that participation is voluntary. Best advice/recommendation would be to find or contract a qualified driver other then school's coach.
- Q.: We had a parent who coached many of our girls this summer at camps. He has never been a coach for our HS teams. He coached the girls four days this summer. We have a young basketball coach in my conversations with him, I suggested he find an older volunteer assistant to bounce ideas off. He would like the person who coached the girls those four days this summer. Our coach used his unrestricted contact days but this parent was not involved in that at all. Is this legal and okay with WIAA rules regarding summer contact and coaching?
- A.: As described, we would consider this individual an ineligible coaching candidate. While there is precedent for waiving the coaching contact restrictions when school administration identifies a coaching emergency, we are not able to recognize an emergency within this situation. This individual could of course attend your games just like anyone else who purchases a ticket. If he and your coach wished to confer, nothing prevents that. Coaching contact with the same athletes during the upcoming school season as this person worked with out side of the season, above and beyond the unrestricted contact days, would not be in compliance with the member's provi-

Out-of-Season Concerns/Equipment

Q.: At our conference AD's meeting on Wednesday we had a lengthy discussion about the "out-of-season" Handbook language, specifically "that while athletes should not be unreasonably restricted, except during the actual school season of a sport, no activity in which they are engaged during the school year should resemble in any way a school team practicing or competing out-of-season." What we couldn't get our arms around was the definition of a "school team." Would a school be in compliance of this rule under each of the following situations: 1) a

team has at least one member on it from a different high school, 2) a team has at least one member on it that is an incoming freshmen and this individual has not been out for the school sponsored sport yet (example - a freshmen plays on a fall league softball team and wasn't on the high school team the previous school year)?

A.: No pre-season team should be made up exclusively of students from same school. Merely grade level diversification is not acceptable. The way the questions you advanced are framed - I am inclined to say that neither conform with the spirit and intent of the rule as we have heard the members discussion in this office. The question to ask vourself is - does this feel like compliance or circumvention? You can recognize that having my nine returning players from the same school and adding one guy, somebody's cousin from another school does not address the desires or discussions we have heard from our members. I would advise organizers, especially in pre-season leagues to see that teams are as diverse as as they can possibly be. The best practice advice we've provided in the past - stands; i.e. Non-school teams should be as diverse as you can possibly make them. You are aware of the "hard numbers" the board has already advanced one time.. They were guite narrow. By the same token, the attitude of the "token wrestler" seems to no longer be acceptable. I can tell vou there has also been discussion of not more then 50 percent of the roster and 50 percent of participants on the floor/field at anytime should be from same school. So that may be a guide. If the members wish to allow year around assembly of their school teams then they should be prepared to voice those sentiments in the area meetings. It has not been what we have heard. While the "hard numbers" limits given earlier this spring for defining non school teams have been placed in moratorium and are not in effect in this school year. Thus the status quo prevails; i.e. The former rule: "an acceptable non school program is one which is not limited to students based on school and/or team status" - and - nonschool activities in which students are engaged "may not resemble in any way a schools team practicing or competing out-of-season." Given the current text then, our members must still acknowledge that the status quo does not diminish the very real threats to them, their teams and tournament opportunities. But, they have been advised. Best friendly advice, best practice - we can offer to make sure the school's team is not placed in peril - is to be certain the club/nonschool team is diverse and is not able to be identified as just the school's team assembling and competing outside the season. The distractions created by the allegations of violation we receive at tournament time would seem to me to be reason enough to strive to make the school's team as bullet proof as possi-

Health & Behavior

- O.: There is a situation at our school while during the skinfold/hydration wrestling tests, someone was caught cheating (not sure what he did). Somehow it was determined then that everyone who took the test must have cheated (although there was no evidence of this) and so all tests were thrown out, but the rest of the team would be allowed to stay and take the hydration test and skinfold measurements. Those who had not yet taken the test did stay and take it. Those who had already gone through the hydration test, left as they did not think they would be able to go again for awhile. Some of the team then went to a local hospital and had the test retaken two days later by a certified technician/trainer. Now the AD at our school wants the whole team to retake the test again at school. Most parents and the coaches think this is ridiculous. The whole team is being punished for one kid's mistake. Are there rules on this type
- A.: Our membership's Bylaws provide that school administration is 100 percent responsible for the eligibility and compliance of their school's teams and programs. Since this is a health and safety related

- rule, if school administration determines that the best way to assure the safety and well-being of their students and to restore credibility and integrity to the program's reputation is to require a complete re-testing, it is completely within their authority to do so.
- **Q.:** I have a transfer student that moved here from Michigan this year. He had a physical last year in Michigan on May 6, 2008. The physical is on the Michigan High School Athletic Association card. Does this physical card work for this student for this year, or does he need to get another physical in Wisconsin on the WIAA card.
- A.: There is not a requirement that a physical must be on the WIAA form only that the student have a valid/current physical that has been signed by an MD and/or APNP (double check that on your student's form)

You may allow the Mich. physical so long as it is appropriately signed. Since it was taken after Apr. 1, it will be good for the 08-09 and 09-10, school years.

- Q.: A student came in and has been working at a nice restaurant for the past five years. The owner asked if he would bartend when he turns 18. He asked if it was OK as he turns 18 in the middle of the swim season. I told him that I would get back to him. We do not have anything in our code specific to that and I was wondering what the WIAA would say about that subject. Philosophically I am leaning towards saying no due to our presence at a party clause and asking him to wait until his athletic career is over.
- A.: Your initial reaction is understandable and it may be where you end up on this when all the dust settles. I suggest talking it over with your principal/administration and see where your school wishes to line up. It's great the student or parents are coming to you to ask. As far as what we see, this is not altogether uncommon.

Kids working in their family's restaurant, bartending at the country club, selling beer at the grocery as a checkout, e.g. So long as the student is acting within the law, the WIAA does not equate employment and the legal selling or serving of alcohol by a student as part of their employment, to be an automatic violation of the members rule. We recognize the legal vs. illegal dimensions within different scenarios. Friendly advice if you decide to allow, meet with student and parent and remind them of how vulnerable they will be if they even act silly and just "pretend" to be consuming alcohol, etc. They will be in the public eye. They may also feel pressured by friends to provide.

Fundraisers & Booster Clubs

- Q.: I have question regarding our volleyball team. Our National Honor Society wants to have a fund-raiser for a local family and another local charity. They want to put on a volleyball tournament. The teams involved would pay an entry fee to play in the tournament. They would also ask for admission to be paid to watch the tournament. They would like the winner of the tournament to play our varsity volleyball team. Our team would not pay anything to get into the tournament or receive any financial compensation for their participation. Would this participation jeopardize the varsity volleyball team's eligibility?
- A.: There are a number of possible concerns inherent in this idea as described. First; when is the event planned? Keep in mind the National Honor Society is a school sponsored organization, thus, it becomes "school sponsored" volleyball and member schools may only sponsor interscholastic volleyball during the actual school season of the sport. If this would be done outside of the school season, then it could only include seniors and others were not a part of the school volleyball team "last season." Do not allow underclassmen who have remaining volleyball eligibility to take part in an out-of-season school volleyball event. Lastly, remember that you are allowed X number of interscholastic volleyball competitions. Do not exceed that number. Perhaps the club should consider finding a nonschool entity, like optimists...to sponsor the tournament and then "gift" the fund-raised dollars back to the club. +

Freres also is a mentor of interns in Sports Management for UW-Parkside in Kenosha, a host for numerous conference and WIAA tournaments in many sports, and she is Sportsmanship Committee leader for Midwest Classic Conference.

The WADA Awards Luncheon sponsored by Healy took place before an audience of almost 400 athletic directors and activities directors from the state's approximately 500 schools in attendance at the state convention. It is the organization's single-largest event of the school year. 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EDITORIAL

Recognizing Worthy Causes Easily Accomplished Within WIAA Guidelines

A trend is sweeping the land that has organizers and advocates of various causes identifying high school sporting events as a method to further advance their charity.

This movement continues to gain momentum and enthusiasm, and the WIAA and its members are working with causes desiring help to find cures or solutions to problems facing our society.

No one that we know of at the WIAA, from the Board of Control and Executive Staff to the administrators and coaches in our member schools, would oppose helping find a cure for cancer, heart disease, diabetes, Alzheimer's, Parkinson's, muscular dystrophy, world-wide hunger, alcoholism, childhood obesity, child abuse, addictions, eating disorders or animal abuse to name just a few worthy causes.

We all have lost loved ones or know someone in the fight of their life with these afflictions.

Regardless of the cause that individuals and segments of society endorse, our membership is adamant about preventing the exploitation of student-athletes. The membership's prerogative is to direct the attention to the achievements and accomplishments of those competing in educationbased activities. Locally, our members can choose to involve their programs during the regular season as their school administration chooses.

The most recent movement gaining popularity is the "Think Pink" efforts aimed at increasing awareness for breast cancer research and recognizing survivors.

The WIAA Executive Staff has been working with member school leaders interested in recognizing any number of these good causes identifying interscholastic athletic events as the impetus. With this model, everything would seem to be in concert with everyone on the same page. However, problems may surface when members assume anything goes for the "good of the cause" and neglect to consult the membership's rules.

The WIAA, or any other regulatory agency that is responsible for the enforcement of rules, is placed in the uneasy position of being in the crossfire when plans to recognize any cause swelling with emotion is outside of what is permissible through member-established rules and policies.

Perhaps the two most identifiable rules to be considered in promoting a cause that involves interscholastic athletic events are the membership's amateur status provisions, as well as the rules of the contest as determined by the National Federation of State High School Associations, of which the WIAA is a charter member.

The amateur status article of the WIAA Constitution declares a student shall be an amateur in all sports offered by the Association. The article, in part, states an amateur status violation occurs when a student-athlete "accepts, receives and/or directs to another reimbursement or award of salary, cash, merchandise of any kind, or a share of game or season proceeds for achievement in athletics."

The rule further asserts a student-athlete may receive an award "symbolic in nature...and that has no intrinsic or utilitarian value," but among those items not allowed are game jerseys.

Therefore, any plan to provide pink game jerseys for players to keep as a memento of the event would not be permitted. However, if the school has ownership of the jerseys for continued use, it is permissible to wear the pink jersey if it is in accordance with NFHS uniform rules.

In a number of sports, the use of pink jerseys is not an issue-not so in basketball or football, however. NFHS rules mandates the color of the home team jersey shall be white and a contrasting dark color for the visiting team. This doesn't need to hinder efforts to promote a great cause. Other ideas within the rules will also accomplish the goal. Different sock colors, jerseys with pink trim, pink shoe laces, pre-game and half-time recognitions or a fan "Pink Out" all serve as creative alternatives. Most of us would contend recognizing a specific cause is much more significant than the various details of how it is recognized.

A number of member schools have already experienced successful events promoting a charitable cause that are within the framework of WIAA and NFHS regula-

Any frustration with the WIAA's position on the promotion of a cause during interscholastic athletic events may derive from the well-meaning intentions of those who are emotionally and personally connected to a cause but are not necessarily well-versed in WIAA regulations.

Working together with the membership, high school sporting events can bring recognition to a cause without compromising the integrity of the rules established by representatives from our schools. +
