The two day preliminary tournament conducted at Algoma under the management of Supt. F. F. Schlosser in the nature of an experiment was a decided success. Six games were played in two days and the second day winners were each given a place in a District Meet. The meet was such a decided success that the plan may be extended to other sections of the state where conditions of travel are such that a regular District Tournament is not justified by the number of teams available.

STATE TOURNAMENT

The 1930 State Tournament was the most successful ever held in Wisconsin. The attendance showed a total of about 16,500 with receipts equalling the previous record. The Friday evening attendance was over 2,600; 200 above the capacity of the University Gymnasium, with hundreds turned away. This was a remarkable turnout in view of the fact that no Madison team competed. Had seating capacity been available it is reasonable to suppose that the total attendance would easily have reached 24,000.

That Wisconsin high school basketball has rapidly improved during the last few years was evidenced by the fine play of a majority of the tournament teams. The games featured two distinct types of play with the man to man defense and fast breaking offense demonstrating, at least by tournament victories, superiority over the five man or zone defense and a slow breaking offense.

The meet produced a stronger defense on the whole than that exhibited in previous years. This is proven by the average winning score of 21 as compared to 23 in 1928 and 1929. The losing score average of 13 compared to 14 in 1928 and 15½ in 1929 also bears out this statement.

Free Throwing was not as good as in 1929 when 60% of foul tosses were converted. The 1930 record of 50% is not good. Many games are actually won from the free throw line and coaches would do well to emphasize free throwing during the season. It is significant to note that the State Tournament teams showing the best free throw average were those participating in the State W.I.A.A. Free Throwing Contest.

One of the outstanding features of the State Meet was the fine physical condition of the boys participating. All of the 27 scheduled games started on time. Few times out were asked for by competing teams. Less time out was asked for on Saturday, the last day, than on Wednesday, the opening date. The

second real tournament feature was the excellent sportsmanship shown by the coaches. Tournament competition and the fine contacts made there have improved the sportsmanship not alone of the coaches and participants, but of the spectators as well.

An unusually large out-of-town attendance, especially from Monroe, Beloit, Neenah, Oconto and Richland Center, was another feature. This loyal "home town" following did much to stimulate the boys to their very best effort.

Neenah, the ultimate winner, played splendid ball. A fine all around team, splendidly coached, won a clean cut victory. Few high school teams ever showed better ball than that produced by Neenah in the tournament.

Racine had a fine team, well coached and boys who never quit until the final gun. Their defeat by Neenah was not due to their own inability, but resulted rather from Neenah's brilliant play. Beloit and Madison-Central were two other powerful teams. Superior-Central, Monroe, Richland Center, Tomah, Wisconsin Rapids, Oconto, Wausau and Altoona ranked high while Platteville, Rhinelander, Barron and Menomonie were represented by good teams.

STATE TOURNAMENT FINANCES

The 1930 State Basketball Tournament was the most successful financially ever held in the State. The total receipts of \$6,565.96 were \$91.90 higher than the previous record of \$6,474.06 made in 1928. The actual attendance was 16,044 compared to 15,622 two years ago.

The amount paid to competing teams was the highest in the history of the meet. This increased allowance was due to the fact that travel and hotel allowance was made for ten instead of nine as previously. The total tournament expense, however, was only \$4,379.45 as compared to \$4,474.40 in 1928. The actual net profit of the State Tournament of the W.I.A.A. was \$2,186.51.
