

1934 STATE BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT

With the crowning of Beloit and DePere, champions of Class A and Class B respectively, the 1934 State High School Basketball Tournament closed in Madison on Thursday, March 29, 1934. Voted unanimously by all concerned as the most successful tourney in history, the crowning of the two title holders brought two fine quints to the fore in state basketball annals and definitely stamped the split tournament as one of the greatest innovations in state high school sport programs ever to be established.

A total of 19,076 actually attended the State Meet. This figure exceeded the 1933 attendance by 7,513 and the previous record by a substantial figure. Had the weather the final evening been favorable the total would have exceeded 20,000. Through the excellent cooperation of the Business Department of the University and by Coach Guy Sundt the tournament expense was materially reduced. The basketball floor was not taken up at the close of the University season as in previous years. Neither were bleachers removed. This

eliminated the expense of putting down and taking up the floor and putting bleachers in place. Because of this the total expense was held to slightly under \$4,000.00. The cost of bringing 24 teams to the State Tournaments was a substantial item but one which was met and a profit returned to the W.I.A.A. because of the splendid attendance.



BELOIT-CLASS A STATE CHAMPION

Comments on Class A Champion, Runner-Up and Consolation Winner.

Beloit—To Beloit, the winner of the State "A" crown for the third successive season must go most the cheering of the tourney. Led by the sensational colored forward, John Watts, the state line team guided by Coach Jacobson, finished the tourney with a display of basketball such as only brings forth champions. The entire squad played brilliantly in the final game as they crushed a fine Wisconsin Rapids team with a margin of 32 to 18. The title is the third successive win for the Beloit five and sets up a state record that may never again be equalled in Wisconsin prep basketball tourney play. The champions in their record setting pace eliminated New London, Eau Claire and Wisconsin Rapids. Besides Watts, Farina, Dibbert, Osborn and Scalia with very capable reserve material, carried on for the perennial champs. It should be of great concern to all that the six first starting members of the squad will be out of competition next year.

Runner-Up

Wisconsin Rapids—Coach Klandrud presented a fine team for the tourney that in reality was the dark horse of the tourney. The upstate team drove

through to the finals with brilliance in beating two of the finest teams in southern Wisconsin, Madison-West and Kenosha before being upset by the champs. In Miller, Kaja, Weinbauer, Lambert and Konnen, Rapids had plenty of class but they could not stem to superb attack of Beloit in the final game.

Consolation Winner

Madison-West—One of the Class A favorites prior to the opening, West succumbed to the driving attack of Wisconsin Rapids in the first round and then beat back Superior-Central and Reedsburg to take the consolation honors in their class. In Smith, Davis, Becker, Rieder and Madigan, Coach Willis Jones offered a well coached array of talent that was at its height in beating Reedsburg in the consolation final.



DE PERE-CLASS B CHAMPION

Comments on Class B Champion, Runner-Up and Consolation Winner.

DePere—The new champion of the new grouping and a mighty one at that, is Coach Braisher's DePere team. Unheralded, this quint went through one of the greatest uphill fights ever to be seen at a state meet and eliminated in the semi-final, the favorite of many, Mayville, in a two overtime period tussle. The champions presented one of the finest, if not the finest defense of the tourney, holding their foes to an average of 15 points per game. The first five men played splendidly through the entire tourney with Vandelist named by all as one of the outstanding guards of the B meet. Zirbel, DeCleene, Smits and Maternoski, the last named star of the win over Mayville, were the supporting cast to the DePere leader.

Runner-Up

New Lisbon—Another unusual and unsung team was New Lisbon, the runner-up five of the B meet. Led by the outstanding forward of the B tourney, Mortensen, plus a giant six foot six inch center in Lamson, New Lisbon brushed aside all opposition to the final only to drop a desperate battle to DePere, with a score of 22 to 19. Mortensen proved himself the finest caliber of performer and piled up a superb total of 50 points in four games.

Consolation Winner

Delavan—Coach Webb Schultz presented a fast breaking bunch of youngsters who once had found their bearing swept through easily to take the consolation crown of the B meet. Delavan was upset by a giant Niagara team in the first round but roared through the rest of the field beating Brooklyn, Brodhead and St. Croix Falls for the consolation honors. Reed, Hunt, Brown, Klevin, O'Neill and Llewellyn carried the brunt of the hard labors for this squad.
