

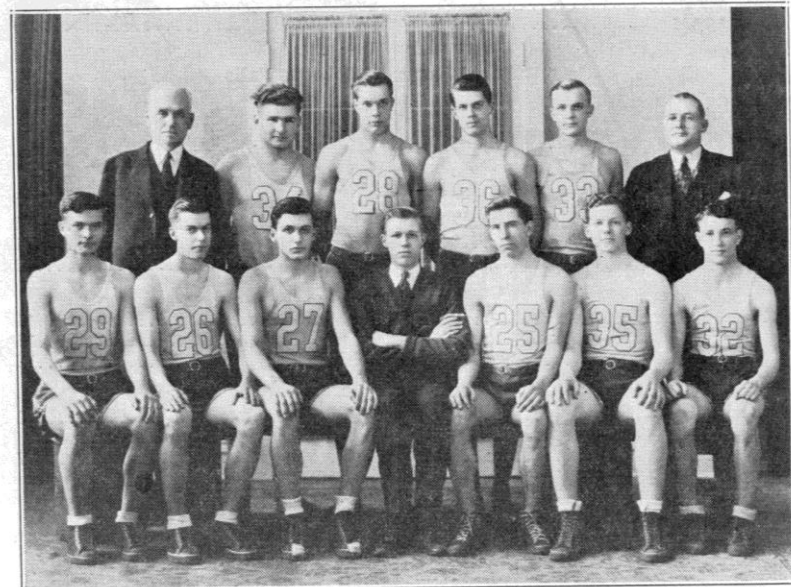
1935 STATE BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT

With the crowning of Superior-Central and Mayville, champions of Class A and B respectively, the 1935 State High school Basketball Tournament closed

in Madison on Friday, March 29, 1935. The tournament was unusually successful from a competitive standpoint. Beloit, which had won three successive championships relinquished the Class A crown to Superior-Central after winning its way into the finals by victories over Madison-West and Stevens Point. Mayville, which threatened in Class B in 1934 won after four hard fought and well played games. Weyauwega, the runner up, played good ball but was unable to halt the brilliant play of the Mayville five.

The attendance was below that of 1934. While the final championship games produced the largest crowd ever to attend a high school game in the State, the total was below that of last year. Poor crowds both Tuesday and Wednesday evenings were largely responsible for the drop in the total attendance. The total of the 11 sessions was 17,900 or 1,176 below that of last year. The total expense of the meet was slightly over \$4,200 while receipts exceeded \$5,600, leaving a profit to the W.I.A.A. of about \$1,400 compared with more than \$1,800 last year.

One point was demonstrated most forcibly. The Board of Control must, in the future, reserve the right to arrange the daily schedule of games. This year the nearby teams were scheduled for day games while those from a distance were scheduled for evening contests. This fact, no doubt, contributed to the reduced total attendance. The alphabetical plan of drawing should be followed as in the past but the schedule itself for the first day should be subject to adjustment.

Class A Champions**

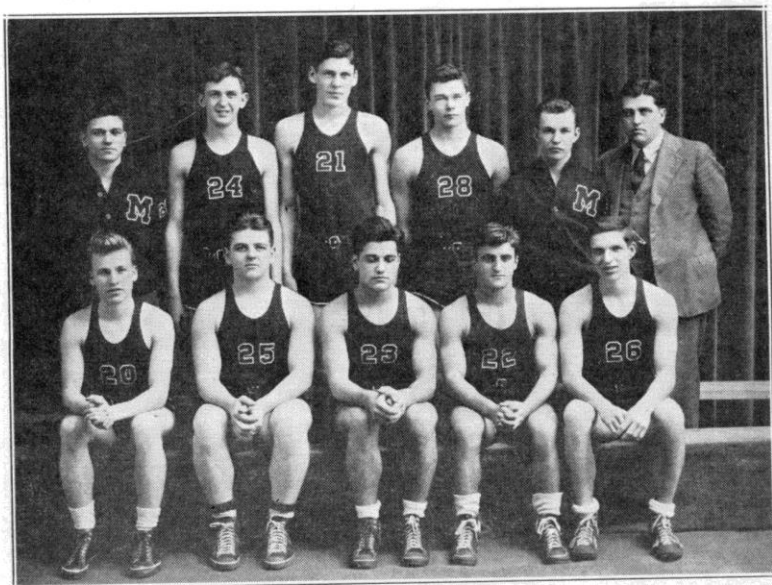

He was ably assisted by Tamulis, Simensen, Scott, Tilley and Johnson.

Consolation Winner

KENOSHA—After an extremely disappointing showing the first day when they were hopelessly beaten by Stevens Point, Kenosha romped through the consolation play in Class A for an easy bit of secondary honor. The team was a well balanced club led by an extremely clever center, Thompson. Their defeat by Stevens Point was the only one handed Coach Bauer's boys all year.
