Basketball

The 1972 versions of Wisconsin high school basketball championships belong to -

Milwaukee Hamilton – a gritty team which refused to believe there was anybody better in the whole state, and

Bloomington – a sparkling justification (if one was needed) of the return of the class system in the tournament program.

Hamilton stopped favorite Madison West in the semi-finals, then rallied from far back to stagger still luckless Neenah in the finals and emerge with the Class A title in its first trip to the State Tournament and only its fifth year in existence.

Bloomington had by far the most to show of the four small schools playing in a separate tournament for the first time in 32 years (since 1939) as it whipped Crivitz in the Class B finals to write a gaudy finish to also its first trip to the State.

The 57th annual WIAA event was witnessed by the customary capacity crowds at the University of Wisconsin fieldhouse in Madison, and the proceedings generally were regarded to be as exciting as in the past. Added interest developed with the inclusion of a three-game Class B tournament inter-mingled with the Class A competition which was the same as the past except for the elimination of three consolation contests.

Hamilton won the Class A title game by a 58-52 margin over Neenah while Bloomington was a 78-56 winner over Crivitz in the Class B championship contest.

Hamilton reached the finals by upsetting Madison West, 55-47, while Neenah nipped defending champion Janesville Parker in its semis clash, 59-57. West came back and won the third-place playoff from Parker, 57-53.

Bloomington kayoed Kohler, 79-64, in its opener while Crivitz was getting by Clear Lake by a 70-60 margin.

Quarter-finals activity in the Class A division showed these results:

Hamilton over Antigo, 71-61; West over Eau Claire Memorial, 72-60; Parker over Waukesha, 75-68, and Neenah over Kewaunee, 81-65.

Hamilton in becoming the 11th team to win a State championship in its first try (Bloomington earlier in the day was the 10th) found itself down by 11 points at 39-28 with less than three minutes to play in the third quarter. But the Wildcats, who were determined to finish the year with 21 straight wins, outscored Neenah by 30-13 in those last 10½ minutes to take the championship.

Randy Buchmann, Kevin Souice and Tim Stanczak made big baskets in the latter part of the third quarter although Neenah – led by Jim Crist – was still in command by 43-37 going into the last period.

Coach Jerry Warczak's cagers, however, were applying the pressure in no uncertain terms at this point and forcing the Rockets into numerous throw-aways. In less than a minute of the final period on a basket by Mike Hanke, two free throws by Soucie and a jump shot by Stanczak, the Milwaukeeans had tied the score, and with 6:41 to play peper-hot Mike Barton's only basket of the night but Hamilton in front, 45-43. The eventual champions never relinquished the lead thereafter although Neenah gamely fought back in the closing 1½ minutes. Trailing by 54-46 with 1:22 to go, Crist made two free throws and a little later Brett Huus had a layup to make it 54-50. But three fouls (not to mention some missed shots) on which Hamilton converted four times (all by Soucie) settled the issue in the final minute.

With Crist scoring four times and Huus getting a basket and six free throws, Neenah fashioned a 31-24 halftime lead on the strength of 12 straight points late in the second quarter that changed a 22-19 deficit into a one-time 31-22 command. Crist had six more points in the third quarter to help Neenah go in front by 11 before Hamilton came back with a vengeance.

The champions' diversified attack was led by Buchmann with 14, Stanczak with 13, Hanke with 12 and Soucie with 11 points. Buchmann also had 16 rebounds while Barton was invaluable in the "controls". Oddly enough, Hamilton had more turnovers (22-20) and fewer rebounds (37-39) than Neenah but it shot better (.438-.390) and was tough in the clutch.

Neenah which lost the 1969 and 1970 championship games by last-second baskets and was

nicked by Janesville Parker in the semi-finals in 1971, was led by Crist in the title game with 18 points and 10 rebounds. Huus in a reserve role had 12 points, including all six free throws, a category in which the Rockets as a team did not do well. While Hamilton finished with a 23-3

record by winning, Neenah compiled the same record by losing the title game. Coach Ron Einerson's team (he has been at Neenah only those four years) now has won 93 and lost only 11 during that span. The Rockets had a 17-game winning streak ended in the championship game. They won the State in 1930 but have had to settle for second or less in all other appearances, and they now have been No. 2 five times.

Bloomington grabbed a 2-0 lead on Greg Hermsen's rebound shot after 19 seconds of play, and the Class B titlists were never headed in their championship contest. Hermsen made four other points and Tom Martin had five as the Bluejays whipped to a 17-11 quarter lead. They were in front by 36-24 at halftime after Jeff Vorwald with six points and Hermsen and Martin with four more each setting the second-quarter pace. Coach Ron Benish's basketeers settled the outcome in the third period with a 23-point outburst which made the difference 60-37 going into the last eight minutes. The third-quarter assault was paced by Martin with 11 points and Ron Vorwald with five. It was Jeff Vorwald's turn again in the last period as he scored 10 times to do the most damage in the final stanza.

Crivitz' two-man gang was led by 6-8 Tom Neveln with 25 points and 19 rebounds. But Bloomington held the big center in the decisive frist half to just four baskets and the Wolverines of Coach Doug Carriveau were never able to get back into contention. Ron Kotecki got six baskets in the first half to keep the challengers within range. He wound up with 17 points.

As a team, the B champions out-rebounded Crivitz by a 53-44 margin, and they also outshot them by .452-.320. The turnovers were 16-15 with Crivitz having the most. The well-spread attack of the winners was led by Martin with 23 followed by Jeff Vorwald with 20. Hermsen had 16 and Ron Vorwald added 10. Hermsen, Jeff Vorwald and Ron Vorwald in that order had 16-13-10 in rebounds. Bloomington's win was its 18th in a row, and the Bluejays finished with a 25-1 season record. Coach Benish's team also had the distinction of being the only Wisconsin school not to lose a game in the state this year, its only loss to Galena, an Illinois school.

Only two schools played the regular season without losing a game, Turner (Beloit) in Class A and Iola-Scandinavia in Class B posted 18-0 records. Turner was beaten in the Sub-Regional finals, and Iola-Scandianvia lost in the Regional finals. There were a dozen schools which lost only one game. A schools included Burlington. Cuba City, Madison West, Mayville, Ripon and Superior, B schools were Blair, Bloomington, Cambria, Edgar, Fall Creek and Little Chute. While Madison West and Bloomington made it to the State, one other once-beaten team, Ripon, fell one step short by losing to Neenah while Cuba City, Mayville and Edgar all reached the Sectional round. While Madison West (22-1) and Bloomington (22-1) came into the State with once-beaten records, there were three which lost only twice - Clear Lake and Crivitz, each 22-2, and Neenah, 21-2. Three-time losers going into the State were Kohler, 21-3, Eau Claire Memorial and Milwaukee Hamilton, each 20-3, and Waukesha, 19-3. Antigo came to Madison with an 18-5 mark, Janesville Parker was 16-7 and Kewaunee was 15-7.

Hamilton's semi-final win over Madison West cannot be recorded without reference to the unfortunate injury to ace Bob Falk, generally acclaimed as the state's best player this season. He tore ligaments in the knee just before the half ended, and he eventually underwent apparently successful surgery. But his loss hurt the Regents, who had a 23-1 record going into the semi-finals, although it cannot be overlooked that Hamilton was in front most of the first half and by a 23-22 margin at intermission-time. Even without Falk, West put on a gallant bid, and took a 37-36 three-way lead. But quick baskets by Buchmann and Barton put Hamilton ahead at the start of the final period, and Milwaukee hung on the rest of the way. Still, it was almost West pulling it out down the stretch. Reserve Brian Leigh hit a basket with two minutes left to cut the difference to 48-47 but a minute later Buchmann with a layup and Hanke with another made it 53-47 to all but settle the issue.

With its ace sidelined in the second half and its vaunted go-go-go attack stifled by the pesky Hamilton defenders, West was led by Mike Stansell with 18 points and 23 rebounds. Steve

Bennett had 15 points. Falk had seven before being injured. Both teams shot in the .300's, and Buchmann and Hanke with 14 each and Soucie with 13 led Hamilton which also had 10 rebounds each from Buchmann and Soucie and another good game out of the 5-7 Barton, only a sophomore.

Neenah carved an 11-point lead in the second quarter and was in front by 13 points twice (40-27 and 42-29) as well as by 12 points (47-35) as late as with less than three minutes to play in the third period. But the Rockets as they were to do again the next night - fell apart in front of the Janesville Parker rush and almost lost it in the semi-finals. Crist with five baskets in the first half and Ed Hawley with 10 points in the first four minutes of the third quarter led Neenah to its big lead. But Parker got 22 points to only 12 for Neenah down the stretch and almost pulled it out. In fact, Parker did tie the score as early as 50-50 on Craig Brace's basket and even went ahead by as much as three (53-50) on the basket and later a free throw by Mike McGrath. There was still five minutes to play at this stage, and Neenah had a comeback of its own with Crist doing most of the damage, including a basket with two minutes to play that tied the score at 57-all. After both teams attempted to out-fox each other for a minute and a half, Neenah got two free throws from Dene Storch with 24 seconds left, and that was the eventual winning margin as Parker missed a last-second shot.

Neenah was led by Crist with 17 points and 14 rebounds while Hawley had 14 points and Storch 12. The Rockets shot .500. McGrath had 24 points and 16 rebounds for Parker which also had 14 points from Terry Ryan and 12 from John Bobzien as well as a plucky game from reserve Tom Scalissi.

Class B semi-final play saw Bloomington grab the lead at the start and stay in front all the way over Kohler as Jeff Vorwald scored 26 points for the winners and Joe Kleefisch 16 in defeat. And Crivitz was never headed after midway through the opening period in its win over Clear Lake as Nevelen scored 31 points in victory and Tom Clark 18 in defeat.

Class A quarter-final action saw -

Hamilton open up a lead down the stretch after leading by only 36-35 in the third period to beat Antigo as Soucie got 18 points for the

winners and Bill Reynolds 20 for the losers. Madison West broke from a 41-40 battle with Eau Claire Memorial in the third period to win as Falk scored 20 for West and Mel Ott 23 for Memorial Janesville Parker snapped a 34-deadlock in the second period and beat Waukesha as McGrath tallied 28 points for Parker and Jim Rappis 26 for the Blackshirts. Neenah change a 35-32 halftime lead into a comfortable margin over Kewaunee at the finish behind 22 points by Storch while Dale Koehler had 25 in defeat.

Bennett with 24 points lead Madison West to its win over Janesville Parker, lead by Bobzien with 17, in the third-place playoff.

Attendance dropped in the 1972 basketball tournament series.

But it was a drop which had been anticipated.

At the same time, the WIAA registered a fifth straight year of paid attendance surpassing the 400,000-mark.

The total was 401,214 for all levels of activity — Sub-Regional, Regional, Sectional and State. A year ago the total was 436,333, thus the drop amounts to about 8%. The record was set in 1970 when 444,915 spectators watched the tournament program.

The breakdown of attendance shows 328,332 for the pre-State levels. This figure compares to 335,233 a year ago, thus a drop of about 7½%. The record for pre-State attendance is 362,217 set two years ago. The State attendance was 72,882 this year. This is a drop of about 10% from the 81,100 of a year ago. The record was set two years ago with 82,698.

As indicated previously, the crowd control procedures were changed this year at the State Tournament, and the fact that each spectator had a reserved seat cut into the potential total. In addition, the number of seats set aside for the final day for schools with teams at Madison was more than was needed, accounting for a few hundred additional tickets.

The drop in pre-State attendance was due in part to (a) weather during the second weekend of play, (b) earlier elimination of larger schools because of the class tournament system and (c) absence of season tickets during first week of B tournament play and first two weeks of A tournament play.
